"WHAT ABOUT THE REVISED STANDARD NEW TESTAMENT?"

By Rev. E. B. Thompson

That question has been asked this scribe no little recently, now that publishing companies are offering the New Translation of the New Testament for sale. The question comes from honest hearts, who just seem never to have gotten the whole idea of what the matter of translation of scripture is. There is always the thought back of these questions that somebody is "tampering with the Bible" when a revision of scripture is made.

Stated simply the problem is this-translation is necessary because we can't all read Greek and Hebrew. If we could all do that, no translation would have ever been necessary for us. But because we could not all read those languages, such men as William Tindale, John Wyclif, Miles Coverdale and the seventy scholars appointed by King James, brought the scripture over from the ancient original languages into current English. That is-the English that was spoken on the street and in the homes of the day.

Revision, and retranslation of the Bible into present day usage in no way reflects upon the earlier works, but rather strives to do exactly for us what the scholars of yester-years did for their people-namely to bring the text of the Bible over from the original language into as near the same meaning as can be expressed in the English language which the people speak familiarly.

Additional manuscript discoveries which shed light on difficult passages, plus the ever changing aspect of the English languarge itself are but two reasons revisions are considered wise from time to time. This latest revision of which we speak, "The Revised Standard New Testament" was begun eight years ago under the sponsorship of more than forty denominations comprising the Federal Council of Churches, and just as sure as is the scholarhip and character of such men as Dr. James Moffat (who died two years ago), Dr. Edgar Goodspeed, Archibald T. Robertson, Andrew Sledd, Kyle M. Yates, and many others who have worked on this great task, high and noble, just that sure you can be that this latest Bible Revision is trust-worthy and worthwhile.

We have today every reason to believe that our Bibles contain as nearly the same thoughts and expressions that were written by the original writers, as those of any generation of English speaking people. For that fact we should take courage and study our scriptures with gratitude and
