EVERYDAY RELIGION

SERMONS AND SANDWICHES

By Rev. E. B. Thompson

Attendance at a recent business luncheon inspires me to ask, "Just how close together are church and worship; business and eating?" Isn't the church and the club pretty close together after all? Shouldn't business and religion go hand in hand, if we are to be as practical as Jesus was?

The Bible is never far from hand, and one of the very earliest announcements in this regard in the ancient record of the Hebrew people is "And they saw God, and did eat and drink-"." That is revelation and revelry in one sentence. When one looks into the matter a little, it is found that all of the great sacred religiously significant days in the Old Testament were feast days-the Feast of the Passover, the Feast of the Tabernacles, the Feast of Trumpets, the Feast of Dedication, and others, "too numerous to mention.'

When one crosses over into the New Testament with this symbol it is beautified still more. Jesus' first miracle was performed at a wedding feast; and from that beginning He went on to feed multitudes if, when and where, the occasion demanded. After His resurrection, He revealed Himself to two bewildered disciples "In the breaking of the bread," and, again by serving a breakfast of fish and barley cakes by the waters of the Sea of Tiberias.

Jesus attended at least six luncheons-five as guest, and one as host to His disciples. Each of these is interesting. Matthew gave Him a great feast to celebrate his going into Jesus' group. Many high and noble persons attended and "Many believed on Jesus-". In the little City of Nain, He was a guest of the richest merchant, who had Him for business reasons! Failing to accord the common niceties of life to his guest; the honors were done by a her tears, and drying them with her flowing hair. In the woman who came in from the street, bathing His feet with house of a leading Pharisee, Jesus noticed grasping for places of honor by the invited guests and showed them how to seat themselves lower down. He invited Himself to the house of the tax collector Zacheus in the ancient City of Jericho and so inspired the host that he gave away half of his ill-gotten wealth to the poor and paid back all he had cheated four dollars to one! (He had to borrow money.) In the humble home of Mary, Martha and Lazarus in the suburb of Bethany. He came and went at will, and it was there Mary anointed Him on His last visit, with perfume that cost her three years wages. (She couldn't afford it, but Jesus blessed her for it.)

Then the Lord's Passover Supper, which has come to mean so much in the Christian world! The sermon and the sandwich are not far apart.


