## Bailey County Is Fifth In State In Bond Sales

In a report issued by the Treasury department, Bailey county has achieved 83.6 per cent of its goal and stands as the fifth county in the entire state in the percentage of its Security Bond Drive quota attained, as recorded through May 8.

Bailey county received a quota of \$30,000, the largest since the war years. According to the report, received by Jesse Osborn, county savings bond chairman, Bailey has a total of \$15,075 in series E sales and has total sales amounting to \$25,075.

The only four counties which have surpassed Bailey county in the bond sales are Hockley, Reagan, Hansford and Irion.

### 24-D Weed Killer Over Stimulates

Lubbock—The "Waterloo" for pesky weeds, namely 24-D, will take care of weed eradication promptly and efficiently, but is not a poison, George O. Elle, assistant professor in horticulture at Texas Technological College, assures potential users.

"Actually what happens to 24-D

weed victims is they go 'berserk,'" Elle explains. The weed killer is a hormone which over stimulates the plant, causing it to die. The solution has been used effectively for sometime in this area to get rid of broad leaved plants, as dandelions and clover, in lawns without affecting the grasses.

Criticisms that "24-D doesn't work" are made usually by users who expect the weeds to shrivel before their eyes as soon as the solution is sprayed, or those who have not applied quite enough of the liquid hormone, Elle said.

He explained that solution must have a little time to affect the plant, and occasionally it is necessary to spray more than once. The best time to treat the undesirable

### Santa Fe Aims For Recognition As Safest Railroad

The new development is a one-man mobile visual education unit, first of its kind on any railroad, designed to carry safety motion picture messages to employees at outlying points throughout Santa Fe's far-flung system.

Dubbed the "Axy Dent Chaser," the unit is a converted panel sedan delivery truck equipped with a 16-millimeter motion picture projector, floodlights, public address system, record player and a 1500 watt generator to provide operating power.



### Range Watering Device

AS soon as weather permits, many poultrymen put their pullets on ranges. Proper range feeding not only is health-building, but also is economical. Often it saves up to 20 per cent on feed bills.

Pullets raised on a clean range with plenty of alfalfa, oats or other green feed available return considerably more on the farmer's investment. Range feeding also saves time in the care of chicks, especially when an efficient system of providing drinking water is employed. A device such as that pictured here will eliminate much of the labor ordinarily required. It can be constructed easily. The float attachment can



be obtained from almost any dealer in poultry supplies. The purpose of the wire screen under the drinking trough or dish is to help keep the water clean. A 3/4-inch mesh is recommended. The water in the barrel will remain sufficiently fresh if the inside of the barrel is kept clean, the cover kept on and the barrel is placed in a shady location.

Range feeding affords the chicks protection from diseases which might be contracted if they are raised in poultry houses with older hens. It is advisable to put the pullets on clean ground that has not been used as a poultry range for two or three years.







### Husbands Can Be Wrong



Husbands have an annoying habit of describing housecleaning as a "soft touch". "It could be — but it isn't," claims Dr. Elaine Knowles Weaver, noted home economist, who recently made a study of typical housecleaning methods. Dr. Weaver, who checked cleaning habits in a typical group of homes over a four month period, finds that Mrs. America is spending too much time at her cleaning job and does too many hard-jobs by hand.

Made at the request of the manufacturers of Eureka vacuum cleaners, the study showed that women using average methods of cleaning, including old vacuum equipment, spend 5 hours and 41 minutes a week at their cleaning tasks; remove an average of four-fifths of a pound of dirt from the home weekly and spend 76 per cent of their time on jobs requiring hard work with manual tools such as brooms, wet cloths, mops and dust cloths. Even with all her hard work, she only removes one-third of the dirt possible to remove with modern electrical equipment — two-thirds of the dirt merely gets pushed from place to place in the house; thus increasing the amount of work to be done at the next cleaning. When Dr. Weaver introduced a modern "Complete Home Cleaning System", consisting of an upright vacuum cleaner in combination with a tank-type cleaner with attachments, the women were able to cut their cleaning time 35 per cent; cut their hard youth-robbing jobs by over 75 per cent and remove a pound and three-quarters of dirt from their homes weekly — almost three times as much as with old methods. Best result of the test for the husband harried housewives who participated in the test was proof that "Spring and other seasonal housecleaning can practically be eliminated" if papa will come through with modern equipment.





**Sanitary Milk Houses**

THE increased emphasis by many farmers on production of whole milk for sale to dairies, rather than diverting it to other uses, has focused attention on the need for good milk houses. Farms which market their milk must meet rigid sanitary requirements, and that involves proper milk house facilities. With cleanliness so essential, it is to the farmer's advantage to build his milk house with materials that are easy to keep clean. For that reason asbestos cement board is being employed extensively as lining for interior walls and ceilings. It frequently is used as exterior siding and roofing as well. The smooth, hard surface of asbestos board is slow to gather dirt. Moreover, it can be hosed, washed and scraped without damage.



The illustration above shows one type of milk house in which asbestos board has been utilized efficiently as a structural material. The board is rat-proof and practically everlasting. It requires no initial painting or subsequent preservative treatment.

For maximum convenience, the milk house should be located near the center of milking operations and on well-drained ground. In the interest of sanitation, however, it should not open directly into the barn. Regulations regarding milk houses vary in different areas. It is wise to consult local milk authorities before starting to build.





## Nests For Turkeys



Crowding of turkeys in nests will be largely eliminated if enough space and enough nests are provided. ## Swine Diarrhea Curbed With Proper Nutrition

Proper nutrition plays an important role in control of swine diarrhea and scours, a source of considerable loss to most pork producers, according to Wise Burroughs of the Ohio station. Nursing pigs are susceptible to the disease, feeder pigs get enteritis and even older animals sometimes scour. Deficiencies in any one of five different B-vitamins may cause diarrhea, Burroughs warns.

## Safflower Crop Thrives Without Heavy Rainfall

Safflower poses no serious question of competition with flax in humid areas where flax prospers. It seems to thrive in areas of less rainfall, where normal precipitation is only 12 to 15 inches annually and where flax generally does not yield so well. Normally, too, under "dry-land" conditions, safflower does as well as wheat or better. It is resistant to most diseases and insects.

## Three Diseases Take High Toll of Turkeys Heaviest Loss Occurs During Growing Period

Nearly a third of all turkeys hatched are lost during the growing period. This statement is based on findings of Utah Agricultural college survey.

Of considerable importance to a control program is the fact that the three diseases known to be the greatest killers of turkeys—paratyphoid infection, pullorum disease and infectious sinusitis, which may be transmitted through the egg from parent to the offspring—cause 51 per cent of the brooder loss.

If a grower starts with a healthy, vigorous poult, the job of keeping the bird healthy is relatively simple. Thus the first problem for a pro-

ductive turkey producer is to buy poult from hatcheries that have a reputation for producing healthy poults. As it may be impossible for a single grower to know the poult source, cooperative effort may be helpful in investigating the breeder and hatcher.

Proper housing and proper use of brooding equipment are essential to health of the poults. Basis of sanitary procedures is to prevent healthy individuals from coming in contact with the infectious agents of disease. All weak-looking poults should be kept separate from the healthy fowls and strict sanitary practices must be maintained during the brooding period.

## Early Spraying Advised For Black Cherry Aphid

Sprays applied before the buds break, say insect specialists, are more consistent in controlling the black cherry aphid than sprays made after the buds are open.

Feeding of the black cherry aphid, if present in large numbers, affects the size and flavor of the fruit. Also, a secretion known as "honeydew" produces a sticky and unattractive appearance of the fruit, especially if it is to be sold as fresh fruit. Development of a sooty fungus in the honeydew may contribute further to the unsightly appearance of the cherries. Sweet cherries are more commonly infested than sour cherries.

### Good Fertilizer Will Increase Crop Yield

College Station—A couple of questions have come up dealing with Irish potatoes and onions in the spring garden. The questions are: Are you supposed to pinch off the flower buds of Irish potatoes? Is it a good idea to pull the dirt away from onion plants so they will produce good bulbs?

J. E. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College says pinching off the bloom or leaving it on does not change the yield of the potato crop. Pulling the soil back from around the onion plants when they have begun to produce bulbs seems to hurry

along their maturity. Instead of worrying about pinching off the blooms, the things that will increase your yields are a good supply of fertilizer and plenty of water when the potatoes begin to make. From the time the potatoes get to be about the size of a twenty-five cent piece until they are full grown they will need lots of water to produce smooth, well-fed tubers.

During the day, if the potato plant foliage begins to wilt, this is a sign that the potatoes are suffering from moisture. In this wilted condition, the leaves cannot do their work. Therefore, in this time of year, and especially later on, it is important that the potatoes get a generous supply of water.

Even though pulling the soil back away from onion plants helps them grow faster, this practice will not increase the yield, says Rosborough.

And if the grower is careless about pulling the soil back and does not harvest them at the proper stage, the upper part of the bulb will turn green from the sunlight. This will give the bulbs an unusual green appearance, and the farmers and consumers agree that all bulbs should be white. So, looking at it from all around, horticulturists say the practice of pulling dirt back away from the onions is not much of an advantage.







houseflies, and destroy their breeding places. Every effort should be made to secure garbage collection systems and safe water supplies. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should maintain standards approved by the state Department of Health, which includes maintenance of proper chlorine level.

Only approved milk should be used, and raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use, and protected from flies, filth, and insects. All foodhandling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided, and they should not visit homes where there is illness. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of

this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches and theaters be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

### Bag The Bag Worm, Says County Agent

During the month of May arborvitae, Italian cypress, and similar plants should be examined ev-

ery few days for bag worms. When the bag worms are young, they are so small that they are hard to see. Camouflaging is a fine art these little worms practice right along.

They spin a cone-shaped, waterproof silk protector, which they cover with bits of bark and leaves, says Mrs. Laurette Williamson, County Home Demonstration agent. As they grow larger, they add to their tent like home. They never leave it, only stick their heads outside to feed on the tender tips of the plants.

The cone-shaped cover grows with the insects, and may be as large as three or more inches by August. Don't let them get that big. If sprayed once a week with lead arsenate, they can be killed before they destroy or seriously damage a plant.

Mix three tablespoons of lead arsenate in one gallon of water and spray once a week and after every rain, because a rain will wash the poison off.

If you let the trees go until the worms are full grown, says Mrs. Williamson, many of them can be pulled off by hand and burned. But that's more tedious, and it's easier to kill with spray when they are young before they can do any damage to the plants.

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

### Paint It For Protection

College Station—Painting a house or a barn does make it look nice, but the real reason behind painting is to protect the building. If your home or farm building has not

been painted during the past four or five years, now is the time to tend to that job, says W.S. Allen, extension agricultural buildings engineer of Texas A. & M. College. To let the job go any longer means that the surface of the siding may need more careful and expensive preparation for repainting. Local conditions play an important part in the selection of paints.

### Great Jersey Bull Is Dead



SANDIA, TEXAS—Leaving some 750 sons and daughters to continue improving the production and type of dairy cattle in America, Masterman Golden Jolly, one of the world's outstanding sires, is dead. Old "Masterman," in service many years at Knolle Jersey Farms, Sandia, Texas—the World's Largest Jersey Herd—was classified as Very Good in type conformation and was rated by the American Jersey Cattle Club as a Silver and Gold Medal Senior Superior Sire because of the outstanding production and type demonstrated by his daughters.

With the prospect of soon being credited with more officially tested daughters than any Jersey bull in history, he now has ninety-three daughters officially tested for production, each having an average lactation record of 8,132 pounds of milk consisting of 5.83 per cent butterfat. When converted to a 305 day twice daily milking mature basis, each daughter produced an average of 474 pounds butterfat lactation. He already holds the record for the greatest number of daughters of one bull to have been officially classified for type by the American Jersey Cattle Club, with a total of 304 classified daughters averaging a score of 84.97 per cent, at the very top of the "Good Plus" bracket.

Setting a goal towards which America's dairy farmers should strive, "Masterman's" owners have done much in leading the way to an increase in the world's food supply and lowering costs to the consumer, simply through breeding better dairy cattle. "Masterman's" many daughters have produced nearly two and one-half times the average yearly production of all dairy cattle in the U. S.



### Make a date to OIL-PLATE!

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For example, in warm, humid climates harder types of paint that contain greater amounts of zinc oxide usually stand up better than soft paint. And in the extra dry sections, it is the other way around. Soft paints containing mostly white lead are better.

There is a good supply of ready-mixed paint of high quality to suit local conditions, and it can be had in nearly any color.

Allen says to remember that a paint job is no better than the application. A good painter will take off all the old loose paint ... make sure the surface to be painted is dry before he starts his job. Even the best paint will fail if it is applied right after a shower or in foggy, humid weather.

One of the important things to do before starting a paint job is to be sure the paint is mixed right. Too much oil causes the paint to dry slowly, get dirty and fade. And, not having enough oil causes the paint to wear off rapidly. Cracking is caused by hard, quick drying paints. Wrinkles in the coat of paint are made by improper brushing of heavy, oily mixtures. Too much thinner in the paint or not enough coats will usually cause chalking.

Two coats of paint is all right when the surface is in good condi-

tion after sanding, brushing and scraping. Otherwise, says Allen, three or four coats are needed. The cost might be more, but you can rely on having a more lasting, satisfactory job.




