### **EVERYDAY RELIGION**

BEGINNING AT THE QUITTING PLACE By Rev. E. B. Thompson

In the first chapter of that strange book Revelation, the author, no less a strange man, introduces himself. He says: "I John your brother, and a sharer with you in the Kingdom, found myself in the Island of Patmos for my loyalty to the word of God."

Scholars down through the ages have wished this introductory of John's had, been more informative about himself. They have wanted to know just which John he actually was. Was he the Apostle from Jerusalem-was he the John at Ephesus who wrote the Gospel-was he another John who wrote only Revelation? These critical questions may never be settled, but in spite of that fact, John here tells some very fundamental and interesting facts about himself.

He says "I John your brother," "I John a sharer with you in the Kingdom". He was therefore a brother in Christ to the brotherhood of Christ. Likewise he counted himself a partaker of Divine blessings and Divine responsibilities. But, I think the most arresting thing he says here is that his religion had gotten him into trouble! " . . . found myself in the Island of Patmos, for my loyalty to the word

The Island of Patmos was a Roman concentration camp! So, John was at his row's end when he started his book. He was in a mighty tough spot! He was in a good place to quit—but he didn't quit—he began! For, if he was the same man who wrote the Gospel and the little John tracts he began all over again, by changing his whole style and symbolism of writing. If, on the other hand, he was a different man, he started his book at the darkest moment of his whole life.

Another thing amazes us here, this suffering man wrote to fellow sufferers. Having every human right to be discouraged and heart-broken, he so launched himself out on the spirit of God that he was able under Divine inspiration to bring a message to other discouraged people. When that message is de-coded, for it was certainly written in code, its heart-warming song in the face of bitter persecution warms our hearts, and gives us courage to carry on in spite of overwhelming odds. It is a message from a man who began at the quitting place, and because he did, we are eternally obligated to him.

### FORD PRODUCTION REPORT

Detroit, Mich., April 8-Production of cars and trucks by the Ford Motor Company since last July 3 had passed the 200,000 mark on April 1.

With the output of Thursday, March 28, the total number of units made in the Ford plants was 201,829. This total is made up of 102,114 automobiles and 99,715 trucks.

M. L. Bricker, vice president in charge of manufacturing, said Thursdays production alone was 1,850 Fords, 281 Mercurys, 56 Lincolns and 1,044 trucks.

He said numerous obstacles still remained, including procurement of steel, threat of a coal strike and the fact that many Ford vendors still are closed due to labor difficulties.

J. R. Davis, director of sales and advertising, has forecast Ford production of 100,000 units in May if there is no halt in output.
