Items Of Interest From Cap Rock SC District

Supervisors: Earl L. Cantwell, chairman; Louie Kitchens, Obra Watson, Pierce White, Bray Cook.

Bert Hawkins, cooperator with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District, started construction of a dam on his ranch, five miles west of Quitaque, last Friday. Paul Reid is building the dam with his crawler trype tractor and carryall. Mr. Hawkins states that this dam will give him a better distribution of grazing as it will greatly decrease the distance the stock will have to travel to water.

Merle Graham, another District Cooperator, constructed irrigation ditches on a twenty acre native grass pasture last Thursday. Mr. Graham, who lives one and a half miles southeast of Rock Creek, expects to double the grazing of the pasture by watering it and stated that "one big advantage of watering grass land was that the grass did not have to be bundled in the

Fulton Gregg, who was the first farmer to become a cooperator with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District, constructed irrigation ditches on his place three miles west of Whiteley this past week. Soil conervation technicians assisting the District ran the lines for the ditches. In order to keep from building an elevated ditch, which requires a lot of extra labor and upkeep, the irrigation system required special designing to irrigate the entire acreage.

Terrace lines were run on the Clyde Tunnell farm, three miles west of Quitaque in the Scheid group last Wednesday by Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the district.




