WHEAT LOANS

Farmers, there will be a wheat loan this year. However we are not sure of the loan price. We have been informed from our state office that details of the program are being worked out.

SUMMER FALLOWING

A number of farmers have prior approval from the county committee for summer fallowing land. Payment for the approved practice will not be made unless the practice was reported by June 15. In making the report, farmers are asked to sign, date, and mail the prior approval plan to this office before JUNE 15.

FARM PLAN SHEETS

A number of farmers have not signed their farm plan sheet for 1946. Please come by the office the first time you are in town, so that we can expedite this matter.

WHEAT INSURANCE

As soon as harvest is over, farmers who have wheat insurance, are requested to make a report on the number of bushels of wheat harvested, so that the insurance can be settled.

DAIRY PRODUCTION PAYMENTS

Dairy production payments for the months of April, May and June 1946 will be made on July 1, 1946.

CROPS NOW BEING PLANTED

In order to receive payment for contour farming of intertilled crops the practice must be reported before the practice is completed. The payment for this practice is 75 cents per acre.

DR. PRICE WITH VETERANS ADMINISTRATION AT LUBBOCK

West Texas veterans and their dependents living within the 81 counties under the jurisdiction of the Lubbock VA regional office will have their claims for compensation, pension, hospitalization and related benefits passed on in the adjudication division by their former neighbors and fellow West Texans. "It is my direct purpose to staff this office with West Texans to serve West Texans," said Robert W. Sisson, VA regional manager, and native West Texan.

Serving as a medical member of a rating board in adjudication is E. C. Price, M. D. a former practicing physician of Quitaque and veteran of World Wars I & II. Chief of the rating section is A. M. (Jack) Armstrong, former resident of Sweetwater.

A long-time resident of Lubbock is J. H. Goodman, rating claims specialist.

Others members of the office personnel are C. H. Crotty, formerly of San Angelo, A. V. Weaver, a well-known Lubbock attorney; Samuel K. Charness, Henry L. De Busk from Abilene; Tom Main former Cochran county attorney; Hervey Chessley, formerly of Moton; Frank W. Laurant, prominent San Angelo attorney; former attorney of Big Spring, C. W. (Bill) Barcus; Robert G. Smith, Lubbock attorney, and Jeff G. Smith, prominent West Texas school administrator.

These men are responsible for the preparation, technical accuracy and legal correctness of awards made by the VA.

Transfer of files from the Waco office to the Lubbock office was accomplished by June 5 and full operations are now under way at its temporary quarters at Lubbock Army Air Field.

It was a spreading oak tree—it stood at the front gate of the home of a lovely old couple. "She is a saint if ever one lived. He, under her loving influence, was transformed from a typical Indian Territory frontiersman to a strong Christian character who was called "Dad" by a whole community of folks who lived in a valley on the west bank of the Brazos river.

Character—to the point of stubbornness at times—was his, and he was unafraid of anybody or anything, but himself. He knew his own limitations and fought against them daily. No man dared try to push him around, and all good men loved an respected him.

It was under that oak tree one summer day, that we talked about these values of life. "This is my standing place," he said, "I will leave town to avoid trouble, but I won't retreat past this tree." I knew he meant just that! It was just an oak tree, but to him it was more, for it stood for everything fine and noble that the home whose portal it guarded represented. It was his way of saying that he loved those ideals; and would fight for them always.

We have gone far, and returned all too seldom to that home which sheltered us with its strong arms of love and confidence. But, our steps have been made steady, and our heart brave, because of the strength it imparted. We have been able to find some oak trees of our own, beyond which we dare not retreat, in the fight for justice and righteousness. So, we would say this little word of honor and homage to the lovely lady who presided inside, and the strong man who stood guard at the gate of a modest home in the Brazos Valley.

GIRL SCOUT LEADERS MUST HAVE HELP TO CONTINUE

FORMER RESIDENT PASSED AWAY JUNE 2 AT ADA, OKLA.

A note to the editor from Mrs. John Felton of Seminole, Okla., tells of the passing of her mother Mrs. W. G. Gentry, formerly of Quitaque, who died June 2, in the Valley View hospital at Ada, Okla.

Mr. and Mrs. Gentry made their home in and near Quitaque from 1924 until 1937. They are well known and have many friends here who will be grieved to learn of the passing of their former neighbor.

Two of her children, Charles Gentry and Mary Edith Gentry finished high school in Quitaque, Charles in 1928 and Mary Edith in 1937. Another daughter Mrs. Felton taught school at Gasoline from 1929 until 1936 and then moved to Quitaque and lived here until 1937.

One son, William Gentry, Jr., the only one to precede his mother in death, is buried in the Quitaque cemetery.

Kent Turns Thumbs Down On Consolidation

In the school election held Saturday to determine whether or not the Kent common school district would consolidate with the Quitaque Independent school district, the proposition was rejected.

Two elections were held, one at Quitaque where 45 votes were cast unanimously in favor of consolidation.

In the election at Kent, 52 votes were cast, 37 rejecting the proposition and 15 in favor.

Public Hearing On Dam Sites Slated For June 26

Information has been sent to the newspapers and other interested parties, including mayors, boards of directors of the projects, etc., of a public hearing to be held June 26 at Mangum, Okla., to be conducted by C. H. Chorpuning, colonel, corps of engineers.

The notice received from Col. Chorpuning states: "Pursuant to several authorizations by congress and committees thereof, a comprehensive report covering flood control, irrigation, and other purposes is being prepared for the Red River and its tributaries in Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

"The investigations on that portion of the Red Basin above the Washita river are approaching completion and it is expected that the report will be forwarded within the next few months to higher authority."

The authorizations for the report, together with information on projects which are being considered for the report include the dam site on Red river north east of Quitaque where three tentative dam sites have been designated, and also the dam site on Quitaque creek southwest of Quitaque.

In order that the report may contain the present views of local interests relatives to the matter, a public hearing will be held by Col. Chorpuning a 10 a. m. on June 26, in the Community Building at Mangum, Okla.

The record of this hearing will be forwarded for consideration by higher authority. Records of public hearings held previously are also under consideration by higher authority.

In view of the fact that Quitaque and Turkey have spent considerable money and lots of time fostering the Red river and Quitaque creek projects, good representation from each town should be present at the Mangum hearing.

James Mullins Buckelew, 64, farmer of Quitaque, was killed instantly Tuesday afternoon when the small truck in which he was riding overturned after a rear tire blew out three miles east of Electra on the IowaPark-Electra highway.

Four other persons were injured, one of them seriously. Most critically injured was Miss Opal Lee Cannon, 18, Gladewater, Texas, who sustained a broken leg, head injuries and lacerations and bruises about the head and body. Miss Cannon's condition at the Electra hospital was described as serious.

Virgil Frank Buckelew, 24, was driving the pickup and had started to pass another vehicle when the left rear tire blew out causing the pickup to roll off the shoulder and into the ditch. The elder Buckelew was riding in the bed of the pickup and was instantly killed.

Besides the driver there were three others in the front seat. Two of his sisters Miss Veda Mae and Miss Dorothy Jean, 14 and 16, and Miss Opal Lee Cannon, 18.

The younger Buckelew and his two sisters received minor injuries, mostly cuts and bruises. Miss Cannon was seriously injured. All four were taken by ambulance to the hospital at Electra for treatment. All but Miss Cannon were released after emergency treatment.

The body of the elder Buckelew was held at the James B. Totten Funeral Home pending funeral arrangements.

Dorothy Jane Buckelew narrowly escaped possible death as she had been riding in the bed of the pickup with her father up until the group had reached Electra. She then moved into the front seat with the others.

The party had been on their way to Tyler Texas, to bring Mrs. Buckelew, wife of the victim, home. Mrs. Buckelew had been visiting Mr. and Mrs. Richard Buckelew, another member of the family.

Buckelew and his family had moved to Quitaque nearly four years ago, and he was employed as a farm laborer on the H. P. Finney farm. Their former residence was Troop, Texas.

The above account of the accident which resulted in the death of a citizen of the Gasoline community appeared in the Wednesday issue of the Wichita Falls Record News and according to members of the family is a correct report.

The body was brought to the Stewart Funeral Home at Turkey Wednesday afternoon. Funeral arrangements are not complete pending the arrival of a daughter from Waco. Burial will be held from the Gasoline Community House with interment in the Quitaque cemetery.

Survivors are the wife; four sons, Barney Buckelew of Roscoe, Richard Buckelew of Whitehouse, Thomas and Frank Buckelew of Gasoline; and five daughters, Miss Lennie Louise Buckelew of Waco, Mrs. Annie Lee Cagle, Misses Dorothy Jean, Veda Mae and Barbara Ann Buckelew of Quitaque, and eight grandchildren.

The condition of Miss Cannon was reported Wednesday to be critical with slight hope for her recovery. Her home is in Gladewater and she had been visiting her sister Mrs. Tom Buckelew at Gasoline.

A five pound-eight ounce son was born Wednesday night at a Matador hospital to Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Henkle. Mrs. Henkle who is a daughter of Mrs. Matthews of Quitaque has been making her home here with her mother. The boys dad who is in the Navy is overseas, somewhere in the Pacific.

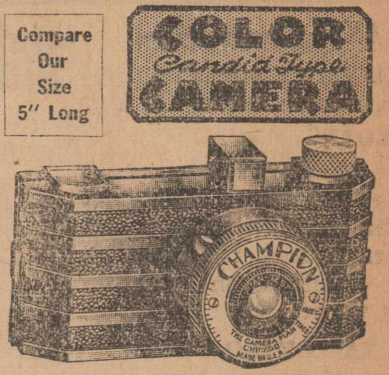

in securing Hairy Vetch seed make their needs known to him or to the clerk at the local Soil Conservation office immediately so that arrangements may be made to secure these seeds while they are available. It was impossible to secure Hairy Vetch seed locally at planting time last fall and the seed shortage is expected to be even greater this year. Quite a saving can be made now by securing seed while they are being harvested. Hairy Vetch is being seeded alone and in mixtures locally. If seeded in a mixture usually 4 pounds is used per acre and 15 pounds is used when seeded alone. H. H. McPherson, Edwin Crass and Jack Jowell, cooperators, have requested that approximately 450 pounds be secured for them.

Bench marks for irrigation well locations were made for W. A. Stephens, Oliver Savage and J. A. Ziegler by Soil Conservation Service technicians last week.

ditches so that a uniform water distribution may be effected on his farm.

Now is the time to make preparations for seeding fall pastures to legume-grass mixtures according to local irrigation farmers who have had previous experience in seeding these mixtures. If early grazing is expected these seedings should be made between August 15th and September 15th.

Seed for these plantings may be secured in this area from seed stores by placing orders now so that sufficient time will be allowed if the desired seeds are not in stock.

Land seeded to improved mixtures should be floated and re-floated to insure even water distribution and prevent drowning out in low places and drying out in high places as this crop is expected to occupy the same land from five to ten years.

Tom Whitely and Jack Haynes, cooperators of the Crass Conservation Group, have recently established an irrigation well on their farm and are constructing irrigation ditches for the watering of row crops. Technicians for the local Soil Conservation Service office assisted in making the irrigation layout.

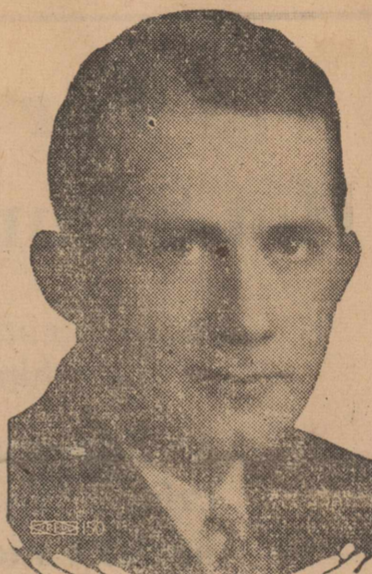

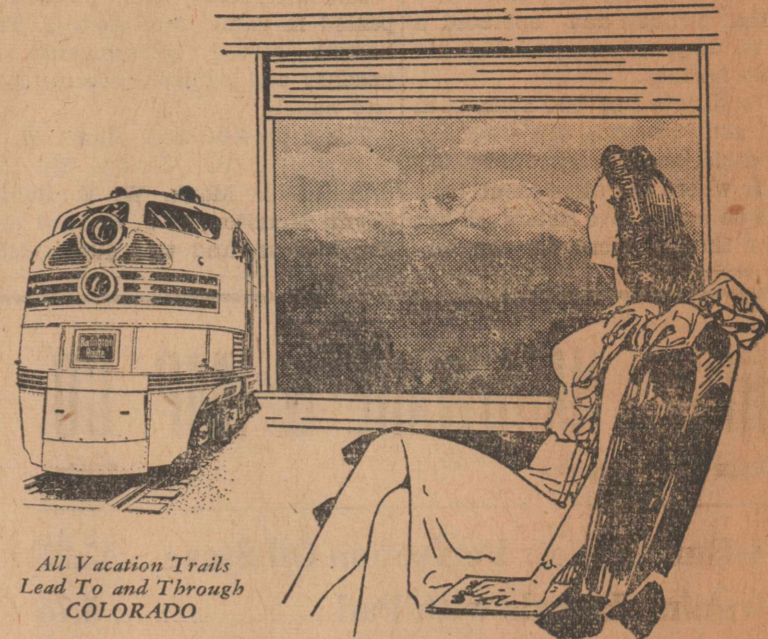

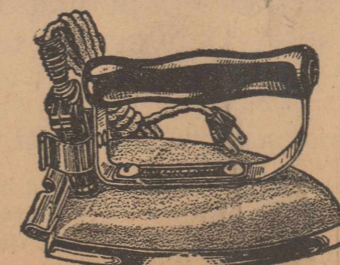
