MENTAL HABITS

By E. B. Thompson

Bishop Paul Neff Garber, in charge of Methodist Churches in war torn Europe, has made revealing reports about human suffering and human longing in that hardpressed and pathetic land. Recently a preacher came to see him, to present his needs. He had seen his Belgian village looted by the enemy, his church blasted to bits, and his people scattered by cruel invasion. He himself had been imprisoned in a concentration camp for nearly five years. His feet were wrapped in sacks, his clothing was in tatters, and his face bore abundant evidence of prolonged hunger. But he talked of none of these needs; here is what he said to the good Bishop, "The worst privation of all was to be starved of mind. I have not been able to read a book in almost five years, and my soul is hungry-hungry to the point of pain! Can you help me get a book?'

Imprison a man's mind and you defeat him. That is because his deepest needs and noblest longings are mental and spiritual. When a Nation starts out to enslave a people, freedom of speech and press is the first to go! Here in our own land, let us cherish the fact that our minds are free. We have a wealth of good literature to readand a wealth of bad-and we should be careful to choose for ourselves that which elevates our spirits and makes us grow mentally-in short, that feeds us and makes us







STATE HIWAY MAP LURES TOURISTS TO TEXAS

Another bid for out-of-state tourists is in the making as the Texas State Hiway Department announces limited quantities of its first postwar color travel map are now rolling off the presses.

The exepcted bumper crop of summer tourists in the Lone Star State will be guided over Texas highways with the aid of a map that will give visitors a brief introduction to a few of the State's points of interest. In addition it will afford a complete, accurate, easy-to-read travel map for the use of all.

The de luxe map is expected to be the most popular feature at the Department's Information Bureaus which have been reopened at strategic points to supply post-war tourists with reliable, up-to-date facts on highway and tourist attractions which support one of the state's largest and fastest growing 'cash crops.'

The postwar edition carries a small scale map of the United States, the usual large scale insets of the State's metropolitan areas, strip maps of the main Texas travel routes and the Pan American Highway into Mexico. It gives mileages between towns and carries a supplementary mileage chart. The highway marking system is explained with illustrations, there is a column of miscellaneous facts about the nation's largest State.

Shown also are the State and National parks, some of the old Missions, and other points of historical interest. Twenty-six color pictures, which will be changed in each subsequent edition, depict typical Texas scenes.

The outside of the map, when folded for mailing, bears a picture of the State Capitol and another of Governor Coke Stevenson. Below the Govenror's picture is his official greeting "To Motorists Everywhere." In his message Governor Stevenson extends to the people of other States and Nations a cordial inviation to visit Texas and enjoy the hospiality of its people. "The highways of Texas are yours," he says. "Use them freely for your business and pleasure."

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

Owing to the fact that there will be many new voters this year and that Texas has a special election ballot, the following information together with a copy of the ballot, will be a guide to follow for the July Primary Election,

The voter shall vote by RUNNING A LINE THROUGH the names of such candidates as he or she shall desire to vote against and leaving the name of the candidate for whom he wishes to vote, and leaving only one name for each place. According to the Statutes of the State of Texas a check mark is no vote at all, but the voter must run a line through the name of the candidate he desires to vote AGAINST.

REMEMBER SERVICEMEN that you are eligible to vote even if you have not paid a poll tax. Just take a copy of your discharge with you and present it to the presiding judge of the election in the precinct where you claim residence. The presiding judge has full power to pass on your qualifications and the issuance of a ballot to you.
