EVERYDAY RELIGION

AVAILABILITY TO GOD

By E. B. Thompson

Dr. Thomas F. Chilcote Jr., has written a suggestive word in the following statement: "We do not miss God because He has not made Himself available, but because we have not made ourselves available."

We have always had much preaching and teaching about accountability to God, and it certainly is a timely and necessary theme-for without it, life would be left without restraint, and as such would become utterly unresponsible and therefore beset with hazards and excuses. But, there is another theme which is equally important— this theme of "availability to God!"

Paul was aware of this needed emphasis when he wrote, "-present your bodies as living sacrifices, wholly acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." And in that beautiful Book of Revelation, John the Divine, represents the Spirit as saying, "Here I stand, knocking at the door. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will be his guest-" In the everyday language of our own homes, "If anyone makes himself available to me I will enter his life with the blessings already available for him."

Prayer is more the laying hold of God's willingness, than the overcoming of His reluctance. Certainly He stands ready and anxious to bless and save. It would hardly be necessary to beg, chide and persuade Him to give us His life and His spirit. Our problem in these sacred matters is in becoming available— of getting on the beam— of tuning in the wave-length or frequency of the Master. Once that is done and maintained, His power is ours, and the usefulness of our lives is His.


