EVERYDAY RELIGION

COMMON BURDENS

By E. B. Thompson

Dr. Frank W. Boreham, the fine old philosopher of Australia, has this very suggestive paragraph in his charming essay on "The Luggage of Life.'

"Life is largely a matter of luggage. So soon as a child can toddle he displays an insatiable passion for carrying things. He is never so happy as when he is loaded. His face beams with delight when his back is burdened to the point of breaking. A few months later he cries for a wooden horse and a cart that he may further gratify his inordinate longing for luggage. And if these appetites be not humored he will exhaust his unconsecrated energies by pushing the chairs, tugging at tables and carrying the cat. The instinct is there. You can no more deny him his load than you can deny him his lunch. The craving for both is born in him."

God made us that way. There was, and is, so much work to done that actually a lazy person is not normal. However we have noticed that this childhood craving for a burden is not others-centered but self-centered. If the child longs for a burden, he no less longs for that table or that wooden horse and cart to be his own. That is true because at that stage of his development he is selfcentered. Jesus must have looked about Him to see people who had never outgrown that early biological level of life. They were still grasping and greedy, wanting the things of life for themselves. He knew that if the world was ever to come into the best life possible for it, people must learn a higher and more Divine law, and that law He so impressed upon His followers was the law of unselfish sharing. The law was expressed simply and directly, as sharing one another's burdens.

It is the ability to feel others' needs and sorrows. As someone has beautifully and aptly expressed it, "Sympathy is your pain in my heart." Then, it suggests our insight to the common load or luggage of life about us. The community projects—schools, churches and other agencies in whose benefits we all share-must be borne by all of us. He who is willing thus to bear and share is a good citizen. Anything short of that isn't true citizenship. Are you a good citizen? Are you carrying your part? If you are not someone else is, for it is all being carried!

Only slightly higher prices were received by farmers during the month for turkeys, dairy products and alfalfa hay. Other farm prices did not change significantly during the period.






