FARM BUREAU MEETING SCHEDULED NEXT WEEK

A series of 13 district Farm Bureau meetings will be conducted throughout the state of Texas during the month of October, it was state Farm Bureau president.

One of the meetings will be held in the Lubbock Hotel at Lubbock months, 10 months overseas. He re- on Wednesday, Oct. 9. W. R. Tilson of Meadow, state director, will preside. The meeting, which will begin at 10:00 a .m., will be attended by Hammond and State Organization Director Marvin Carter.

Another meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 8, at Amarillo.

Principal topic for discussion at the forthcoming farm meeting will be the proposals of officials of government and other groups with reference to the future of agriculture. "A careful study of agriculture's program as proposed by these people," Hammond said, will reveal that they are the same plans offered and adopted following the first World War which led the nation into depression that not only wrecked agriculture but brought ruin to business, finance and industry. The present-day trend is toward cheaper prices for farm products."

"If the right plans are not adopted now," Hammond continued, "we cannot hope for anything but a recurrence of the disaster following World War I. An agricultural program must be maintained that will stabilize the prices of stabilize business and industry. 


