KINGDOM KEYS

By E. B. Thompson

Rev. E. D. Landreth spoke on the general theme "The Church" recently, and read the familiar text "I will give unto you the keys to the Kingdom, and whatsoever you shall bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatsoever you shall loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. The speaker did not follow the age old and bitterly controverted interpretation to the effect that Jesus in those words gave out temporal or even spiritual authority. In fact said he, "I cannot read the teachings of Jesus through and feature Him giving authority to anyone. His mark of greatness after all was humble service rather than overlord authority."

Then the speaker took from his pocket his car key and concluded his sermon with the purpose of the key. It was interesting! The key is older than we know. Its use in many forms has been long, long in existence. It does not denote authority quite so much as it spells power. Power to liberate, power to imprison. Power to bind and shackle, power to loosen and set free. The key is either the instrument of one of these forces, or the other. Its character is determined by its holder and user.

Jesus' Kingdom always brings liberty and freedom to lands where it is preached and lived. The heart in bondage to sin is unbound, the life fettered by fear and distrust is set at liberty to live in the glorious freedom of joy. And, these Kingdom values are timeless for they last into eternity. Their choices have eternal consequences. To refuse the message of liberation is to bind one's own life over into the judgements of these eternal values.

Christianity holds the golden key to love and life. It unlocks doors, lifts shutters, and removes the hanging draperies of dread and gloom from human life. It can shut out these same storms that would enter life to mar and destroy, making it secure and peaceful from within. And best of all, it is ours, yours and mine, for the Master has given it to us! "I will give unto you the keys of the Kingdom.

"Farm trainees can now resume training under the original plan and with full subsistence payments", William T. Murphy, Director of education in the Dallas Branch advised.

"The order is retroactive to the date on which the much protested reduction interpretation went into effect. If a veteran has had a deduction made from his subsistence. VA will repay him. This is good news for some 7,500 veterans in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. It means they will get their full 65 and 90 dollars allowances from VA as they did in the past. The order rescinding the earlier interpretation has been wired to all VA Regional offices throughout the three states. We are instructing all regions to resume operations under the original full payment

According to Eldon F. Fuller, Vocational Rehabilitation and Education Chief, of the Lubbock VA region office, this new ruling will materially effect approximately 1, 000 West Texas veterans enrolled in County Vocational Education Schools.
