Clinic For Crippled Children November 30

On Saturday, Nov. 30, there will be held a clinic for crippled children at the Plainview sanitarium and clinic. In charge of that clinic will be Dr. Sim Driver and Dr. Eugene P. Legg of Dallas, Doctor Driver, formerly of the Carroll-Driver Clinic of Dallas is one of the most prominent orthopedic specialists in the State. He is a professor at the Southwestern Medical Foundation and he is chief of the orthopedic division of Baylor hospital. Doctor Legg, also a staff member at the Southwestern Medical Foundation, and is associated with Dr. Driver.

This is the first of regular clinics these men will hold in Plainview, since they have been designated to supervise the orthopedic care for the polio patients of the West Texas Center, at Plainview.

All polio patients who require orthopedic examination, regardless of when or where they had the disease, are invited to attend the clinic Saturday, Nov. 30. Also any other children in this area who need care will be seen.

Those wishing to attend the clinic should write Mr. Harry N. Emmannelsen, Plainview Sanitarium, for an appointment. In case not all can be seen Saturday, Nov. 30, the rest will be seen Sunday, Dec. 1.

QUITAQUE GIRLS DEFEAT TURKEY GIRL CAGERS 37-7

A terrific battle between the A-team basketball girls was fought Tuesday evening at Turkey. Quitaque won 37 to 7. All the players did some swell playing. Adkins was high point man, scoring 23 points.

The B-team played long and hard for their victory and won 19 to 15. Starks and Morris ran a close race for high point man. Starks outscored Morris one point, by making 10 points.

All the girls played but they didn't have to put out their best, because the Turkey girls are not very dangerous adversaries.

The girls have a good team and probably won't have many—if any—defeats this year. Games will be matched each week with some team, playing either here or elsewhere, so let's all be there to yell for them and the boys.

NEW SCHOOL BUS

The Quitaque school system has a new school bus which was delivered last week to George Owens, president of the school board, and Alva Davis, who went Childress for the bus and drove it back.

The new bus is assigned to the Edgin and all are delighted with it. Seating 36 normally, the cost of the bus was \$3600. Thus the first cost is \$100 for each person accommodated. At \$3.50 per month per pupil it would take about 30 months to pay for it, and that is more than three school years. (Just something to think about, folks.)

FOOTBALL TEAMS DISQUALIFY

In the football hearing at Canyon a few days ago, regarding the protest lodged by Flomot against Silverton for playing alleged ineligible men, both Silverton and Flomot were declared ineligible and were suspended from the conference, according to report.

Neither Turkey nor Quitaque have won a game this season, their own game resulting in a tie, so it would be "peculiar" if these two teams should have a play-off for the district championship—but this isn't likely.

Raid At Turkey Nets Bunch Of Lawbreakers

The strong arm of the law cast its net around Turkey Saturday night and made four "drags" which netted 32 miscreants. Eight were white men, the other 23 being Mexicans and Negroes, all taken in raids on the places of abode of two colored citizens. Three or four of the raids were made on one residence and one raid on the other. Three of the darkies arrested in the first raid were later arrested a second time at the same place on the same offense.

The raids were led by Sheriff Earl Hill assisted by Deputy Grant Evans and Peace Justice Baker, of Memphis, Deputy Sheriff Roy Edwards and Constable Emmett Arnold of Turkey.

Charges of gambling were lodged against the 32 taken and a fine of \$21.50 was assessed against each, three paying off twice.

All of the whites and enough Mexicans and negroes to fill a truck were taken in the first raid, and due to the darkness and the large number involved, four other darkies made their escape—just faded into the night.

This is the first raid of this nature that has been made in Turkey community for several years, and is probably the largest in Turkey history.

RUMPHS SELL THEATRE, HOME AND ARE LEAVING QUITAQUE

Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Rumph have sold the Queen theatre and their home and are leaving Quitaque which has been their home for many years. The property and business was sold to Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Ham of Turkey who assumed management of the last week and will move here in a few days.

The Queen theatre was opened by Mr. and Mrs. Rumph in the present location in October, 1925. Prior to that Perrin had been working here as a mechanic. He bought a small equipment from Red Simmons which was operating here about once a week, had the present building constructed, installed new equipment and has been operating without interruption for 21 years. They built their home in 1929.

In 1942 Mr. and Mrs. Rumph bought the movie theatre at Silverton, and for the present they will continue to operate this show, making their home in Silverton.

Active in church, fraternal, club and civic movements, and always cooperative and capable, they will be greatly missed in the community. The best wishes of their many friends will go with them wherever they decide to locate.

Quitaque Fire Dept Is Re-organized

The Quitaque volunteer fire department has been re-organized, new officers elected and plans set to have a well set-up, smooth running, active department.

The group is composed of Frank Gillespie, Joe Bedwell, Elmer Lanham, Marion Roberson, Edgar Morrison, John Lindsey, Charlie Carpenter, Jake Merrell, Morris Wilson and Bill Middleton. These ten men have met the approval of the city council which sponsors the fire department. Officers are Elmer Lanham, fire marshal; Frank Gillespie, fire chief, and Joe Bedwell, assistant fire chief.

The boys have been meeting every Tuesday night for instruction and practice—and to plan future activities. They are cleaning up and re-arranging the hall where the fire truck is kept, and will install tables and chairs to make a comfortable place to hold meetings. A much needed telephone is to be installed.

The city council has assured the boys of their cooperation and assistance, and has ordered new equipment. The fire truck is to be overhauled and put in good condition, new Siamese-twin nozzles, two gas masks, fire extinguisher and other needed equipment will be furnished them.

These boys are working and studying and practicing to make good firemen, and deserve the support and cooperation of the community. One way to help them, is not to get in the way and interfere when they are fighting a fire.

Do not enter a burning building, open a window, or do anything, until some one from the fire department arrives. Much needless loss and useless damage is done by well-meaning persons, who are anxious to help, when the fire siren blows. The most valuable assistance they can offer is to stay out of the way, until the fire boys arrive, and then follow instructions if they are needed.

WORK ON THE WATER TOWER SCHEDULED FOR THIS WEEK

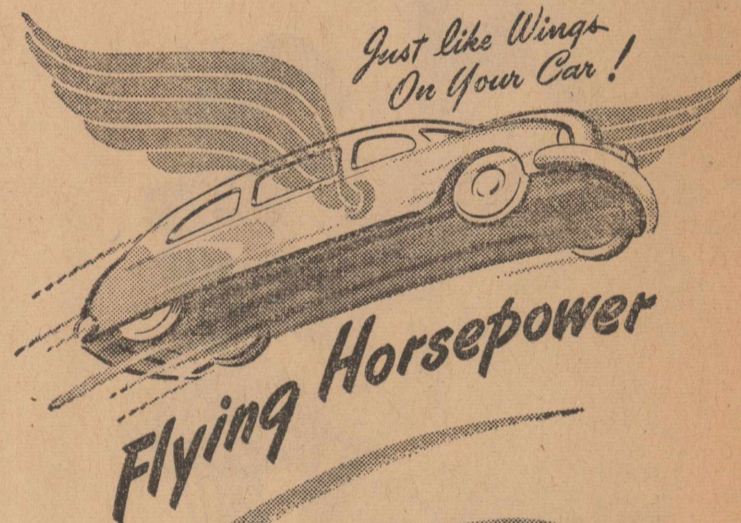

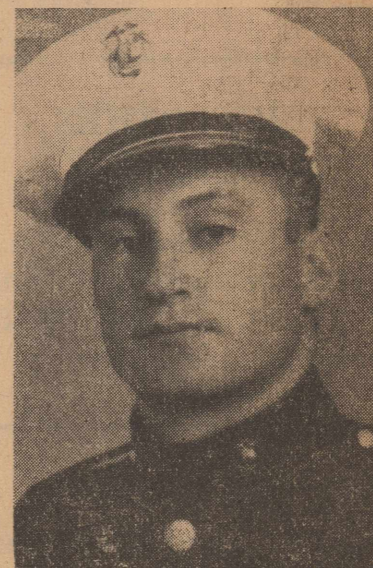
