Student Strike Closes College At Canyon

Canyon—The 250 students left on the West Texas State College campus Monday morning met in secret session to consider further action in the campus strike now in

No report of action taken in the meeting was forthcoming immediately following the meeting but persons on the campus said the students, most of them veterans who live in Canyon, were anxious to end the strike because of the possibility of subsistance checks from the veterans administration being cut off if the students fail to attend classes.

The college was closed Saturday by the board of regents after the 1241 students had gone on strike to enforce their demands for the resignation of college business manager Virgil Henson. In addition to the closing of all buildings on the Canyon campus, work at Amarillo Center was also suspended. Dr. A. J. Hill, college president, in a written statement to the center officials declared:

"Much as I regret to make this announcement, it has become necessary to suspend work at Amarillo Center until further orders from the Board of Regents are received. While you are in no way responsible for the conditions that make this necessary, we urge your cooperation and patience pending the re-opening of the institution. Scholastic credit will not be impaired by this action.'


