FT. WORTH & DENVER FREIGHT TRAINS TO BE DIESEL MOTORED

Time freight trains of the Fort Worth and Denver City and Colorado and Southern Railways will be dieselized under a \$12,800,000 program authorizing the acquisition of 30 new Diesel-electric locomotive approved by the directors of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad meeting at Omaha last week, it was announced by Vice President C. D. Peckenpaugh of the Fort Worth & Denver City Railway.

Delivery of the new diesel locomotives, which is expected to com-

mence late next year, will permit the Burlington Lines to make important improvements in its freight service and schedules between Texas and Colorado and the Pacific Northwest, Mr. Peckenpaugh said.

The Diesel purchase program authorized by the C. B. & Q. directors provides for fifteen 6000-HP freight locomotives, four 2000-HP

passenger locomotives, one 4000-HP passenger locomotives, one 4500-HP freight locomotives, and nine 2000-HP road switch locomotives.

ARMY SURPLUS DISPOSAL IS WINDING UP

The past twelve months has witnessed the disposal of more than three-fourths of war surplus personal property in the five states of the southwest zone, according to figures released this week by C. B. Rucker, War Assets Administrator of the zone office at Grand Prairie.

During the year inventories of surplus materials declined from \$285,000,000 to \$71,000,000, even though \$136,000,000 worth of goods had been added to stocks meanwhile. Disposals were made by sales of approximately \$350,000,000 in materials to veterans, wholesalers, retailers, manufacturers, governmental units, non-profit institutions and non-priority purchasers.

Surplus real property, consisting mainly of government-owned installations in Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Mississippi and Louisiana, also has decreased significantly despite recent additions to the surplus list. Real property in the zone reached a figure of \$1,081,160,370 in August, but at the beginning of December was down to \$1,069,270,306, a drop of \$11,890,064. The intervening four months had seen the addition of \$253,409,593 worth of real property. Like personal property, realty was being

disposed of at an ever increasing rate by war assets, more than 50 million dollars in real property having been sold in the final month of 1947.

Southwestern schools and colleges have received almost half of the country's surplus buildings disposed of under the public benefit allowance plan, a War Assets Administration report disclosed. In the five states of this zone, educational institutions got 4,138 of a national total of 9,652, thereby saving hundreds of thousands of dollars in campus construction programs. Within the state of Texas, schools acquired 374 buildings with an original cost valuation of \$36,424,393.

TEXANS LIVE A LONG TIME

That's the opinion of E. P. Simmons, president of Sanger Bros., Dallas, after a state-wide search for 90 year old Texans whose birth-dates coincided with that of Sanger Bros, disclosed three oldsters who were also born on November 7, 1857.

In observance of the occasion, Mr. Simmons sent birthday greetings to the three old timers and asked each what they would like for a 90th birthday present.

Mr. B. S. Montgomery, White-wright, Grayson County, decided he would like an easy chair and an ottoman. Both were presented to him on his birthday at a party attended by three of his ten grandchildren.

Mr. G. F. Bomar, McKinney, Collin County, shut-in, asked for a battery radio to help him pass the time.

The third 90 year old, Mrs. W. E. Pinkston, Chireno, Nacodoches County, has not yet told Sanger Bros. officials what she wants for her gift.

"We are happy to salute these pioneers," Mr. Simmons stated in extending birthday congratulations to the three old timers. "That they have defeated life's adversities so long is ample proof that they are hardy, determined stock—the kind which builds great states such as Texas."

Mr. Simmons also said he deeply appreciated the hundreds of letters sent in about other venerable Texans. "The response was beyond our expectation and we are honored by the interest shown," he declared.

SMALL CHECKS TO GOVERNOR HELP FEED HUNGRY EUROPE

That traditional "big heart" of which Texans so often boast was

evident again to Governor Beauford Jester during the early part of this week when an almost continuous flow of checks and money orders for the American Silent Guest Plan begin to reach his office.

The plan, which was launched in Texas Thanksgiving Day, is part of a nation-wide program designed to help the hungry people of war-devastated Europe. It is sponsored by the chief executives in each of the 48 states and is supported by all religious denominations.

Texans have been asked by Governor Jester to invite one "Silent Guest"—a war orphan, a widow, or as old person in distress—into their home to share a meal, and then, to mail a check or money order in the amount that such a meal would cost. Cash contributions and material gifts cannot be handled in this particular project.

These checks and money orders would be made payable to the American Silent Guest Committee

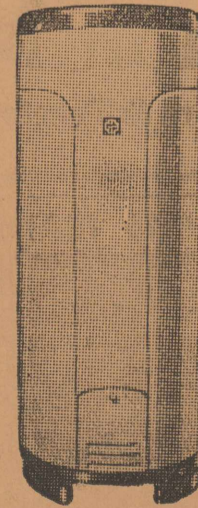
