The financial statement of the association for 1947 shows that at ed \$180,935 in stock and had ac. cumulated earnings of \$69,215, bringing the total member_owned capital to \$250,150. It also reveals that the association's loans during the year totaled \$2,295,000, bringing its total loans in 14 years of oper. ation in excess of \$15,000,000.

In retiring virtually all of its Government capital, officials of the association pointed out that Production Credit was organized in the early thirties when farmers and ranchmen were hard pressed to obtain credit.

In setting up provisions for this form of agricultural credit, Congress authorized the investment of Government funds, stipulating that as the association became able
