ans today asked the state to recognize the underground water as belonging to the owner of the land under which it is found.

The request was made in a resolution by more than 700 farmers and other representatives of the high plains irrigation belt at a 1day meeting held here today which was called by the Texas farm bureau federation.

Underground water, the resolution said, should be recognized 'the same as oil, gas, sulphur and other underground resources." It was further urged that dis-

tricts be created for underground water control and such disticts be completely under local control. The resolution asked that agriculture take precedence over other



You are to register your car in the county in which you live. This money goes for upkeep of county roads.

If you trade for a car, the papers are to be filled out within 10 days from date of assignment, else you are subject to a \$5.00 penalty.


