(moderate)
Mix together thoroughly $1 / 2 \mathrm{cu}$
soft shortening, $2 / 3$ cup suga
tsp. grated lemon rind, 1 egg.
Stir in 3 tbsp strained lemo juice, 1 tbsp water.
Sift together and stir in $13 / 40$
