COCO COLA JELLO SALAD

1 pkg. cherry Jello 3/4 c. chopped nuts.

2 bottles coco cola 1 c. strained and sweetened cherries.

Heat one coke and dissolve jello, add the other coke. Let stand a few minutes until bubbles disappear. Then, chill until it starts to congeal and add nuts and cherries. Serve on lettuce leaf, topped with grated cheese and mayonaise.

ORANGE CAKE

4 eggs 1 1/2 c. sugar
1/2 tsp. baking powder 1 1/2 c. flour
1/2 c. orange juice

Cream sugar and yolks adding sugar slowly. Next add orange juice, then flour sifted well—with baking powder. Last, fold in well beaten whites. Bake in square pan, with oiled and floured paper on bottom. Bake in slow oven. Ice with powdered sugar, 1 tbs. butter, and orange juice. Cut in squares to serve.

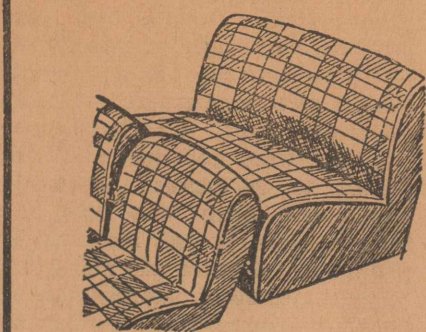
