## New Treatment For Victim Of Rare Disease

In response to a plea in last week's issue of the paper telling of the need for a certain type of blood for transfusions for a small Lockney boy, one more Quitaque man had his blood test checked and is ready to help when needed. Smooth Boyett's rare type of blood was used before to combat an illness that threatened the life of the infant grandson of Mr and Mrs Joe Graham, and has offered to come to the aid of the Lockney child.

The Lockney boy's need was widely published and Tuesday's Amarillo Globe-News carried the following article:

A desperate battle is being waged to save the life of a little 4-year old lad from Lockney who has been struck with the dread disease, leukemia.

A rare chemical compound, a discovery announced only two weeks ago, has been brought into use to save the life of Kenneth Don Hill, son of Mr and Mrs. James Hill. Presence of the disease was discovered in the lad four months ago and since that time everything known to science has been tried.

At first blood transfusions were used to keep up the red corpuscle count in the lad's blood but not enough blood could be transfused into the boy to arrest the destroying action of the white corpuscles. Only AB-Rh negative type blood could be used for transfusions and two men—Fred Shipman of Lockney and Charley Carpenter of Quitaque were the only ones found with that type. The pair have furnished blood for five transfusions under the direction of Dr. Jerrell Wagoner of Plainview.

When the boy continued to lose ground he was hustled to the Maxfield Clinic at Dallas where he was subjected to the radio-active isotopes—by-product of atomic energy production—which have been used with a small degree of success in some cases.

However even this new development failed to make any change in the lad's condition.

Back home two weeks ago the Hills read in the Amarillo Daily News about a new medical discovery put into use just the week before at John Sealey hospital at Galveston. The story said that it had been tried on one leukemia patient and that the patient had shown marked improvement. The new chemical compound is supposed to arrest leukemia.

Mr. Hill took the article and rushed to Dr. Wagoner, who phoned an associate at the Galveston hospital. The lad was accepted and was put on a plane the next day for the South Texas city.

Dr. W. Jacobson, of Cambridge, England, a visiting English physician who is working on the new chemical compound, today said the Hill lad is under treatment but would not divulge whether any improvement had been noted. He said such information must go to relatives and not the press.

The urgency of the whole matter is told in physicians' diagnosis of the lad's condition as acute leukemia—which all say ends in death in three to six months. Less serious cases result in death after several years.

## Showers This Week Brighten Prospects

A light shower fell at Quitaque Tuesday night, lifting the spirits of the farmers and laying the strong hot winds that had been blowing the past two weeks. The fall in the immediate vicinity was not heavy but as usual varied reports have come in. South of town from an inch and a quarter to more was reported, and northwest of town, about a quarter inch or less. Out Gasoline way about an inch was reported.

Out at Flomot three inches was reported, and at White Flat, a small flood. Quitaque river was running pretty high, and a salesman said that the rains started about Lubbock becoming heavier as he came this way, but light in the Matador area and east.

The hot blasting winds were threatening more damage than the hail and the farmers have been in the fields from dawn 'til dark trying to save what they could.

This latest moisture is as spotted as the previous rains, but the wind was not blowing Wednesday and faces were brighter and more hopeful.

Each bit of moisture recently has been accompanied with severe electrical storms and Tuesday night was no exception. There have been more electrical displays in the heavens this year than we can remember in this area.

Bill has resumed his studies at Wayland college to prepare himself for the ministry, and Mrs. Ebbs is employed at the City National Bank at Plainview. He will preach his first sermon Sunday, June 27, at a church near Plainview.

All of his Quitaque friends and neighbors will have the opportunity to hear him in his home church here Sunday, August 1. The local pastor, Rev. Ray Riley, asks that you "be much in prayer for this earnest young couple. They have a great future before them, but the pathway is filled with trying obstacles."

## Items of Interest From the SCS Office

Contour plowing of wheat stubble will increase moisture penetration. The small ridges thrown up by either the oneway or sub-surface type of plow will hold water back and let it soak into the soil. Hard fast showers, such as we have experienced recently, tend to seal the soil over allowing excessive runoff. Unless some way of holding this water on the land is used it will be lost as far as crop use is concerned.

Recently a hard rain of approximately two inches fell in a very short time near Silverton. Considerable runoff occurred yet the soil was wet only about two inches deep. If the rainfall had been held on the land it would have wet the ground many inches deeper.

Proper handling of wheat stubble will also increase moisture penetration and control soil blowing. By leaving the stubble mixed with the top soil it tends to reduce crusting and sealing over. Sub-surface plowing on the contour will increase moisture supplies in the soil as well as control blowing.

Proper tillage methods and good stubble management will save practically all the moisture that falls for next year's crop.

A high point was located for an irrigation well on Mrs. Carl Vaughn's farm which is operated by Seymour Brannon and is situated three miles southeast of Silverton.

A tank dam was staked off last week for Tom Pierce, a cooper of the local district. His place located four and one-half miles east of Quitaque in the Hamlet Conservation Group. Mr. Pierce plans to build this dam in near future.

Mr. T. J. Campbell, a cooper of the local district, had technicians stake off a tank this week. Mr. Campbell's ranch located below the cap rock twelve miles east of Silverton water stored in this tank will prove grazing distribution ranch.

Wiley Bomar, who owns a farm just southwest of Quitaque made a trial planting grass in the spring planted sweet clover legume crop. His experience with this grass legume indicates that it is a summer pasture. That the grass is hardy and produces very good forage. Seed is obtained locally all seed drilled. Local soil technicians are making information on seed.

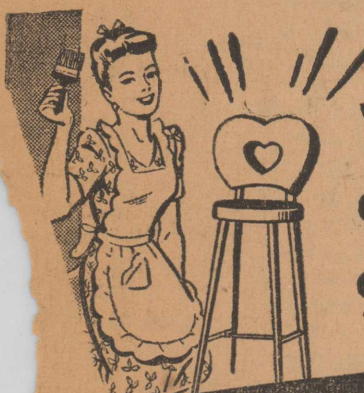

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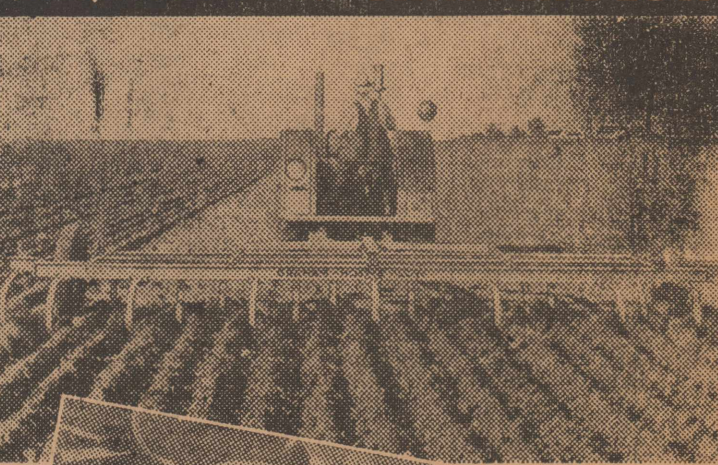

The other day we asked one of the best informed financiers in the Southwest why it was that stocks with high earning power were selling so low.

"That is the kind of money," he concluded, "that would ordinarily be going into factory expansion and jobs and development. Now, it goes to the Government to spend and the Government is not a producer."

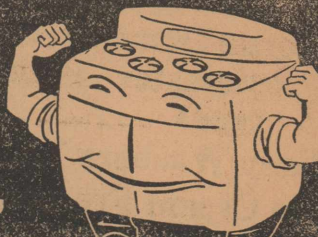

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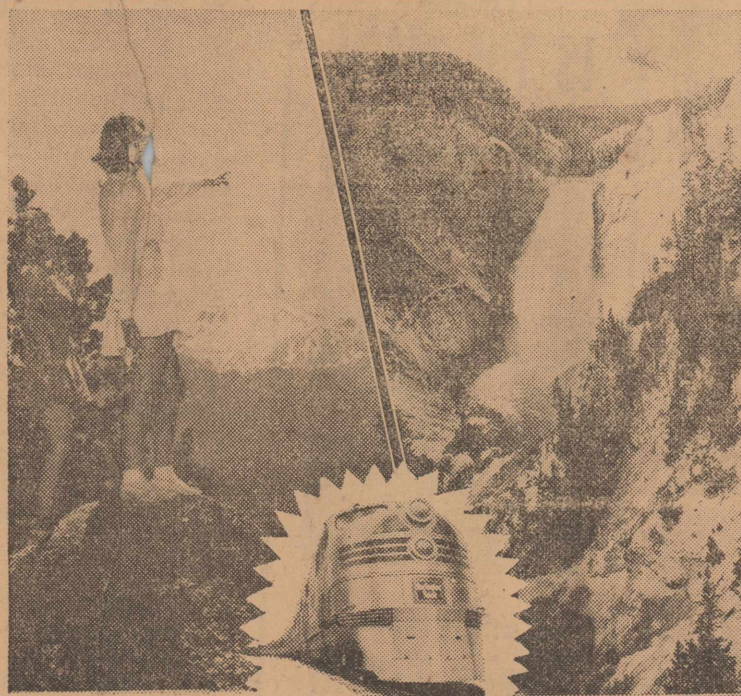

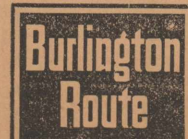
