## Puckett Asks Voters To Study The Record

To The Voters Of Precinct 2:  
Seeking a first elective term as your Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, I ask your consideration of the record during the period I have served on appointment. Here are some facts which the people should know about the operation of the business of this precinct.

When I assumed the duties of the office, the Road and Bridge fund showed on  
April 1, 1947, \$4,486.83.  
This fund now shows on  
July 1, 1948 \$9,455.55,  
an increase of \$4,968.72.  
In addition, new equipment bought and paid for amounted to \$2,849.00. Use of this equipment has paid into the precinct fund a net of \$3,441.85, charges for terracing and other labor, or \$592.85 more than cost of the equipment.

Taxes in the precinct were reduced when indebtedness on road bonds was retired, and on Jan. 1, 1948 a special road tax of 40c was removed. The present county tax rate is 95c on the \$100 valuation.  
In following a policy of economy, I want to express my appreciation to my helpers for their full cooperation and loyalty in every way. They have taken excellent care of the county machinery, using it conscientiously and carefully, keeping the equipment in excellent condition and the overhead and upkeep at the lowest possible expense.

In addition to presenting the facts to show you that the financial condition of Precinct No. 2 is in good order, I want to assure you that I am doing my utmost to promote the best interests of the Precinct in every way, and if elected to the office, I will continue to do so.

As you know, several road improvement projects are pending, and I am doing every thing I can toward the completion of these.

Feeling that the experience I have had in the office will be helpful to me, and again assuring you that I am guided in every action by what I feel to be the best interests of the Precinct, I respectfully submit my candidacy for your consideration. I will appreciate your influence and vote in the coming Primary, July 24.

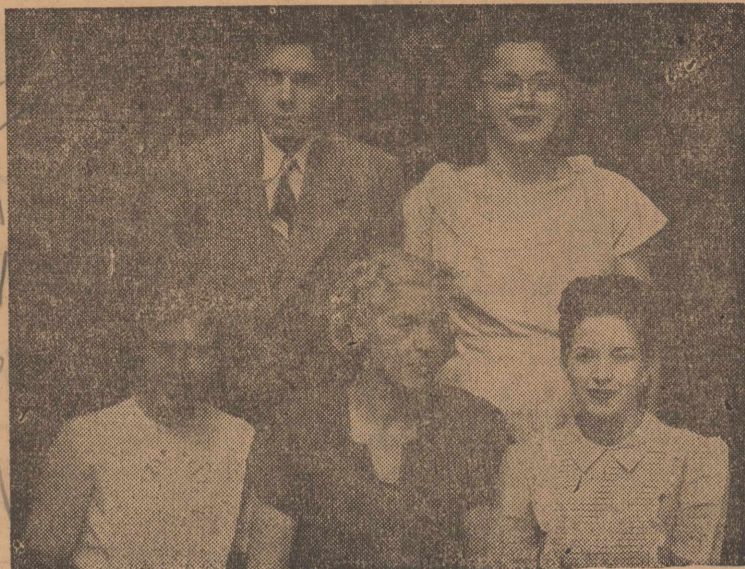

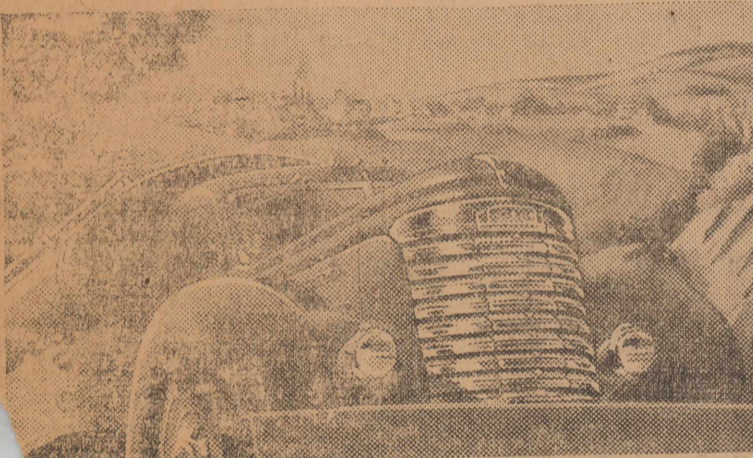

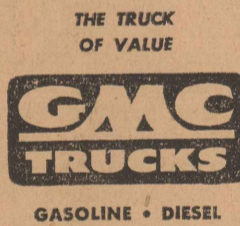

### From the SCS Office Items of Interest

Special efforts will be necessary to keep wheat straw on top or mixed with the top two or three inches of soil this year. The short straw we have this year can easily be covered up during normal plowing. When this straw is covered up it loses its value as a protection against blowing this coming winter and spring.

Long straw such as was common last year is hard to completely turn under, thus, in practically all cases, good wind protection was evident throughout the district this past winter. Only those fields that had the stubble burned off suffered from blowing.

Stubble management must be practiced year in and year out to give the best results. One year's stubble may furnish protection for two or three years following, depending upon how fast the straw decomposes and becomes a part of the soil.

Sub-surface tillage to leave most of the straw on top is recommended and in most cases will prove practical. The use of a one-way type plow, unless properly set, may produce a serious blow hazard this winter. Stubble management is a very essential part of a conservation program on any farm and is one of the easiest to apply. It re-

quires no special tools or technical aid, only a wise use of existing crop residues.

C. M. Flowers, who owns a ranch across the Tule thirteen miles northwest of Silverton, has started some mesquite eradication work with 2-4-D sprays. He is merely making some trial experiments now to see if some method of spraying will prove satisfactory.

A high point was located for Elmer May who operates Mrs. Maude Marshall's farm sixteen miles southeast of Silverton. Mr. May plans to drill an irrigation well soon.

The Soil Conservation Service which is assisting the local Cap Rock Soil Conservation District has moved its office from the Gunter Building to the second floor of the Bellinger building.


