MANY GRAVES UNMARKED IN FLOMOT CEMETERY

Some interesting items came to light in a recent survey of the cemetery at Flomot which the officers of the association made in order to determine the location of all the graves and in an effort to identify them.

Many graves have no markers at all. Some are cared for, in a manner, but some are completely neglected. Listed in the map of the cemetery are 25 unidentified adult graves; 30 small graves unmarked which are listed as child's and infant's graves. Some of the latter are cared for, with flowers and shells. There is one grave marked T; two Smith girls undated; two children's graves, one marked MWH and the other UBS. Of the something over 200 graves in the cemetery, more than 60 are unidenitfied.

The earliest grave is dated 1893 that of Phel Martin.

The survey and mapping of the west half of the cemetery was just about completed when the following names were recorded. Several weeks ago the names were set up in type and since then several more graves have been identified, west side of the cemetery which is not named in this list, it will be helpful for you to contact the secretary of the Flomot cemetery association, Mrs. L. 
