## Saturday Is Second Primary Election Day

Saturday, August 28, is election day again, the second Democratic primary. The ballot for Briscoe county is very brief, with only two places to be filled.

The run-off for United States Senator, between Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson, will be decided, and locally, the Justice of the Peace for Precinct No. 2 will be decided between Gus Gibson, who is present acting justice, on appointment, and W. F. Brittain. Neither of these candidates are expending much effort to be elected.

In a meeting of the Democratic Committee this week it was decided to consolidate the voting boxes of the county for the election coming up Saturday, August 28, 1948, in the second primary.

Voting boxes No. 1, No. 3, No. 7 and No. 8, will all vote at the county courtroom in Silverton.

Voting boxes No. 2 and No. 6, Quitaque and Gasoline will vote at Quitaque.

San Jacinto, voting box No. 4, will vote at their usual place, and Box No. 5, Antelope will also vote at their usual place.

## First Bale of Season Brought In Tuesday

The first bale of cotton for the 1948 season was ginned Tuesday afternoon at the Paymaster Gin at Quitaque. The bale was brought in by Orb Payne from his place south of town.

Field weight of the cotton was 1935 pounds, and it ginned 463 pounds of lint, 900 pounds of seed.

Merchants and business men in Quitaque contributed a premium of \$109.20 in cash and merchandise for the first bale which was bought by Wise-Herrington Cotton Co., for 30c.

Payne said he had about 100 acres of cotton ready to gather, but he was not pushing the harvest as it was pretty hot in the fields and there was no rush. This cotton was planted around the latter part of April and has caused quite a bit of comment. It has been watched very closely, since early in the summer when it showed definite promise of early maturity. Payne estimates that it will make around a bale to the acre, or better.

The cotton was ginned at the Paymaster gin, which Mgr. Earl Wise says is ready to go. Some new machinery has been installed at the gin and it has undergone general overhauling and tuning up. A new burr machine and new cleaner have been installed and more new machinery will be added later when it is delivered.

A new Lee-Roy natural gas engine has been installed at the Farmers Co-op gin and other new machinery, and repairs have been made to take care of the damage to the gin caused by the fire just before the season closed last year. This gin will be ready to go in another week, it was stated.

## Quitaque Schools Will Begin Sept. 6

Quitaque schools will open Monday morning, Sept. 6, Supt. H. W. Cross announced this week. The faculty is complete, with the exception of an additional teacher who will be added. The schools this year have been allotted this additional teacher to relieve the overloaded condition which previously had to be met by the limited faculty.

School will begin at 9 o'clock Monday morning and the first day will be for registration only. Supt. Cross extends a cordial invitation to all parents and patrons who wish to visit the school on opening day. There is no planned program but there will be general assembly in the auditorium and since there are a number of new teachers (including the superintendent) this opportunity is offered those who wish to meet them.

Classes will begin Tuesday morning.

The lunch room will operate again this year, with Mrs. N. B. Herrington in charge, and it will also open Tuesday ready to serve lunches. About \$300 worth of new equipment and improvements, including a much needed hot water heater, have been added to the lunch room.

The school buses have been overhauled and put in best possible condition, and everything is just about ready to go.

The faculty this year is composed of the following:

Primary teacher, Mrs. Novelle Wise; 2nd grade, Mrs. Dora Hawkins; 3rd grade, Mrs. H. G. Gardiner; 4th grade, Mrs. W. J. Rice; and departmental work in the grade school will be under Mrs. H. W. Cross and E. P. Lewis, with Mr. Lewis serving as principal.

In the high school, Mrs. Irene Kuykendall, English; Mrs. Jake Merrell, commercial studies and probably math; Mr. Donald E. Siler of the University of Oklahoma at Norman, coach and science; Supt. Cross, social studies and the additional teacher yet to be supplied.

Finding a qualified teacher for this position will not be an easy matter, the superintendent stated. He has experienced great difficulty in finding teachers at all. As an example of the scarcity of qualified teachers, Mr. Cross cited that out of an enrollment during the regular session at Canyon of 1200 students, only 75 were training for teaching positions.

Frank Gillespie got a little statewide publicity last week when he won first place in the tie-down roping event at the Wellington rodeo. Frank's time as 19.4 or .5 seconds on Tuesday night and 17.8 seconds on Thursday night, giving him the best average as well as the best time in both events. He was the only roper to tie under 20 seconds.

Frank said his competition was pretty stiff as there were 36 ropers entered in the event, and the calves were fresh, frisky little animals that didn't lay down and hold up their feet to be tied.

A team of ropers from the Quitaque club will go down to Crosbyton next Tuesday to compete with a team from that club.

## Registration For Draft Begins August 30

The Governor has issued the proclamation calling all young men between the ages of 18 and 26 to register for military service. Registration is in effect now, and will begin August 30th. T. D. Northcutt of Silverton is in charge of the set-up for Briscoe county and stated Monday that the office for registration was located over the Ballinger Dry Goods store in Silverton, in Garner Guest's office.

Following is the schedule for registration.

Austin, Aug. 24—Registration this time will be between the dates of August 30 and September 18, both dates inclusive. Men 18 through 25 years of age will register at places designated by their local boards.

Specific days when men will register in the different age groups are as follows:

Men born in 1922 after August 30, 1922, will register on August 30.

Men born in 1923 will register on August 31 and September 1.

Men born in 1924 will register on September 2 and 3.

Men born in 1925 will register on September 4 or 7. This means there will be no registration on Labor Day.

Men born in 1926 will register on September 8 and 9.

Men born in 1927 will register on September 10 and 11.

Men born in 1928 will register on September 13 and 14.

Men born in 1929 will register on September 15 and 16.

Men born in 1930 before September 19 will register on September 17 and 18.

Men born on or after September 19, 1930, will register on the day they are 18 years old or within five days thereafter. This means that men will register as they become 18. They will register with their local boards.

Hours of registration at the local board registration spots will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

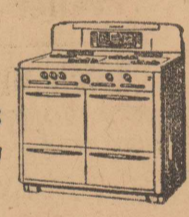

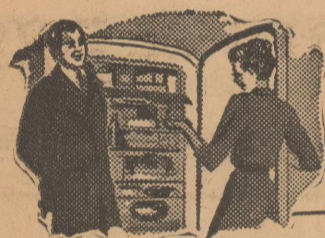

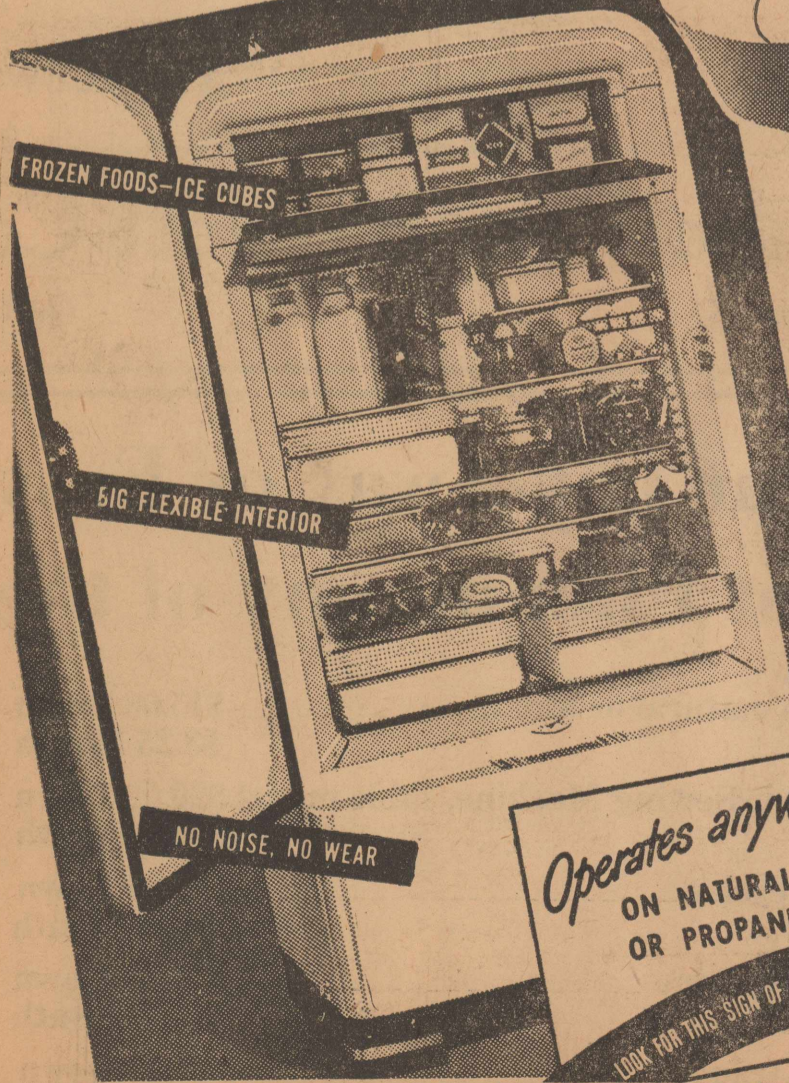
