Registration For Draft This And That About Begins August 30

The Governor has issued the Building Notes proclamation calling all young men between the ages of 18 and 26 to register for military service. Registration is in effect now, and will begin August 30th. T. D. Northcutt of Silverton is in charge of the setup for Briscoe county and stated Monday that the office for registration was located over the Ballinger Dry Goods store in Silverton, in Garner Guest's office.

Following is the schedule for registration.

Austin, Aug. 24—Registration this time will be between the dates material, pumice blocks which are of August 30 and Sepetmber 18, both dates inclusive. Men 18 through 25 years of age will register at places designated by their

Specific days when men will register in the different age groups are as follows:

Men born in 1922 after August30, 1922, will register on August 30. Men born in 1923 will register on August 31 and September 1.

Men born in 1924 will register on September 2 and 3.

Men born in 1925 will register on September 4 or 7. This means there into an apartment house.

Men born in 1926 will register on September 8 and 9.

Men born in 1927 will register on September 10 and 11.

Men born in 1928 will register on September 13 and 14.

Men born in 1929 will register on September 15 and 16. Men born in 1930 before Sept-

ember 19 will register on September 17 and 18. Men born on or after September 19, 1930, will register on the day

they are 18 years old or within five days thereafter. This means that men will register as they become 18. They will register with their local boards.

Hours of registration at the local board registration spots will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.


