## GRAIN LOANS DEPEND ON STORAGE

Although loans are available to support the farm prices of grain sorghums, they cannot be made unless the grain is stored properly, the Briscoe Agricultural Conservation Committee told farmers this week. Details of the loan program, together with specifications for proper storage, may be obtained at the county ACP office, located at Silverton, Texas.

Providing enough storage for a record crop of all grains has bethe county is 800 million bushels short of enough storage space for the 1948 crop. Officials point out that every bit of the large crop is needed and none should be allowed to spoil through improper stor-

There is little chance to expand county and terminal elevator storage, so if the crop is all to be put under cover it will have to be stored on the farm, the Briscoe County Agricultural Conservation Committee said. 
