Flomot Pioneer Buried There Wednesday Aft.

Last rites were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Methodist church at Flomot for Lee Titus, pioneer Motley county resident. Rev. Bob Jameson officiated at the services, assisted by Rev. Bain. Burial was in Flomot cemetery.

Lee Titus was born in May 1874 in St. Jo, Missouri, and moved with his parents to Lone Oak, Texas when a few months old. He married Miss Ollie Payne at Lone Oak on Jan. 16, 1897, and they moved to Motley county in 1913, making their home at Flomot until 1942 when they moved to Plainview.

Mrs. Titus preceded her husband in death by only a few months, passing away May 30, 1948. Mr. Titus passed away at the Plainview sanitarium following a weeks illness, at the age of 70.

Ten children survive, five sons and five daughters. They are L. B. and Melvin Titus, Flomot; Joe and Troy Titus of Plainview; Roy Titus of Levelland; Mrs. H. M. Stanley of San Jon, N.M.; Mrs. W. F. Slover, Mrs. W. W. Slover and Mrs. W. O. Taylor of Whiteflat, and Mrs. A. J. Noble of Seminole.

There are 33 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren; two brothers, T. J. Titus of Lone Oak and E. R. Titus of Dallas.

Precision work on three standard type motors will be studied by automotive mechanics from this area at the Perfect Circle Doctor of Motors School.

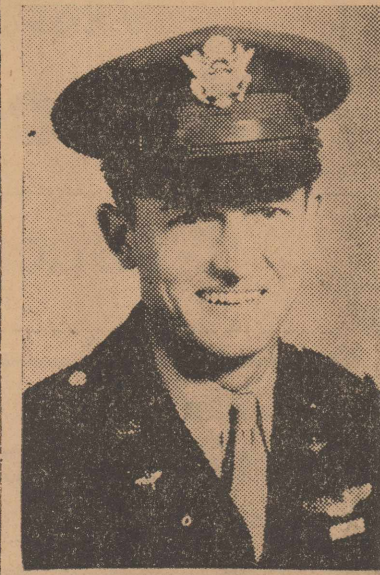

Reburial Services For Lt. Orville Graham



Reburial services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the funeral chapel in Durango, Colo., for Lt. Orville Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Graham of Durango, who died overseas in World War II. Full military honors were accorded and interment was in the beautiful hill-top burial ground at Durango where a plot is set aside especially for veterans.

Lt. Graham met his death at Palermo, Sicily, on May 10, 1943, when the B-17 of which he was pilot, crashed. He had reached his 21 birthday in April, just a month before his death.

Lt. Graham was a graduate of the Quitaque schools, an honor student and was attending Texas Tech when he volunteered for military service, and entered the army air corps. He had passed scholastic examinations for appointment to the U. S. Naval academy at Annapolis, when he was given overseas orders.

Besides the parents, survivors are two brothers, W. L. of Denver and Leon of Durango; and four sisters, Mrs. T. H. Allen of Pampa, Mrs. J. P. White of Quitaque, Mrs. Rex Faulkner of Morton and Mrs. A. C. Bickford of Phoenix, Ariz. All were present for the reburial services, and also a friend Mrs. A. L. Trout of Phoenix, who made the trip by plane to Durango with Mrs. Bickford.

The floral offerings which were sent from five states and in great quantity attest the popularity of this splendid young man who gave his life for his country, and the high esteem in which his family is held.

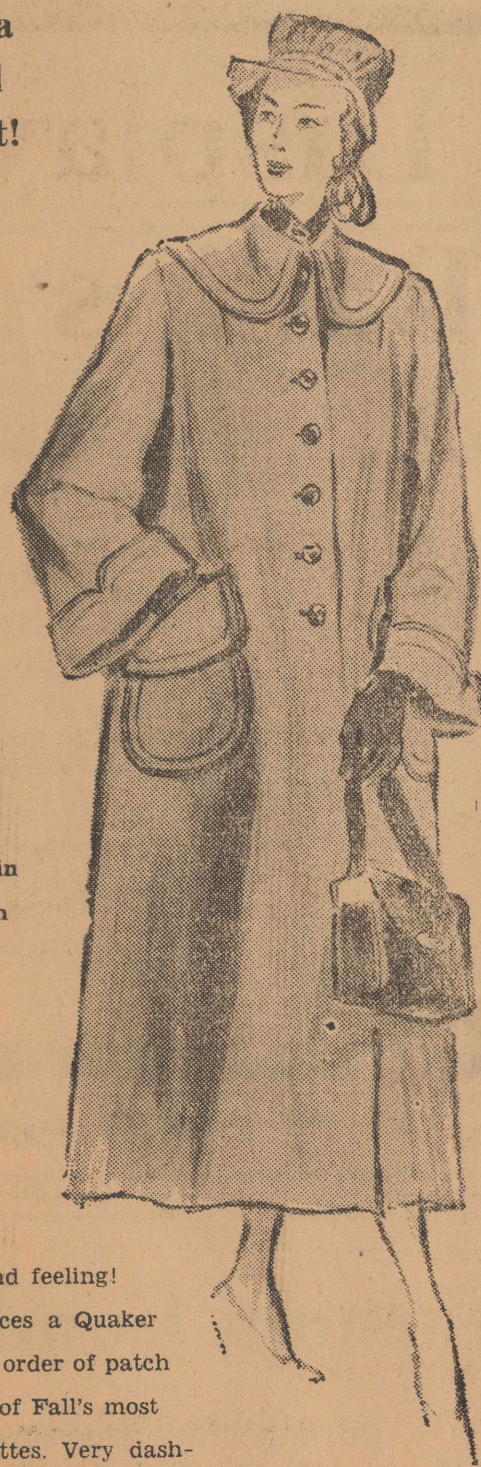

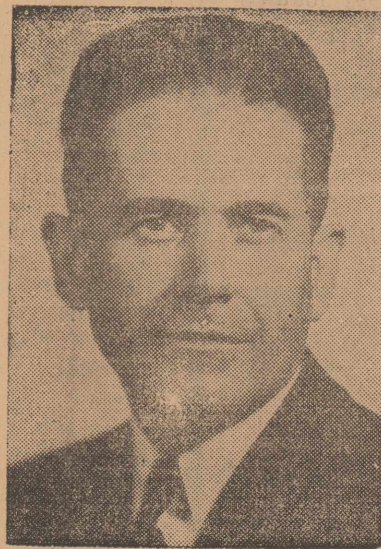

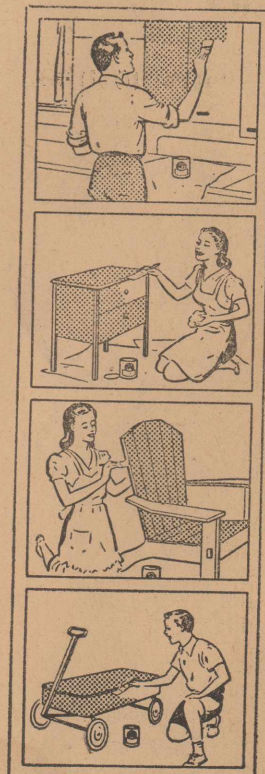
