Here's the orange cake that Mrs. F. C. Benson served Tuesday night: 2 cups sugar 1 cup butter 1 pkg dates or raisins 4 eggs 1 1/3 cup buttermilk with 1 teasp. soda added

4 cups flour 1 cup pecans grated rind of one orange Mix as you would any cake; flour nuts and dates. Bake in loaf pan eating. in slow oven (about 250 to 300 degrees)-cook 21/2 to 3 hours. Filling

2 cups sugar 1 cup orange juice grated rind of one orange Mix well, let stand until dissolved. (Do not cook or heat filling.)


Put on cake by spoonful while cake is still hot. It is easier to put on cake before it is turned out of pan.



The regular monthly meeting of the supervisors of the local Cap Rock Soil Conservation was held Sept. 8, in Silverton, Texas. The following members were present: Earl I. Cantwell, Chmn of the Board Bill Helms, and Luther Mc-Jimsey. Visitors that were present are: Sid Payne, Tulia, Member of the State Soil Conservation Board; Louis B. Dawkins, Plainview, Engineer for the State Soil Conservation Service; and Jesse D. Jenkns, Tulia, Acting District Conservationist,Soil Conservation Service. Plans were made to elect a supervisor in zone no. 5 in the southeast part of the District. Election will take place on October 5, 1943

and all landowners within this particular zone will be eligible to vote. This zone is bounded on the east and south by county lines, on the west by the cap rock and on the west by Little Red River.

The board of Supervisors for the local Cap Rock Soil Conservation District is composed of 5 members, each member is elected for 5 years and one new member is elected each year. Eligible candidates must be actually engaged in farming or ranching and must operate land within the zone of the District for which they are elected.

Compare this with only 85,000 tons back in 1936-37. The 1939-40 records show an increase of 116,000 tons. And just a year ago in 1946-47 the sales were slightly over 401,000 tons.

Dr. Fudge says the big increase in the use of fertilizers since 1936 is because more people are finding out that increased yields from fertilizers are paying off. When prices are up, it means a difference between profit and more profit for the farmer. But when prices are down, it means a difference between profit and loss.

The big thing that is limiting the amount of fertilizer Texas farmers

will use under present conditions is the supply. Tight, now, the demand is far more than can be supplied. There isn't enough to go around to everybody who wants it. Slowly Texas is building her soil.


