Items of Interest From the SCS Office Conservation District are urged to have a maximum amount of crop residue on the land. Grazing should be limited to waste grains
and excess forage on all cropland. and excess forage on all cropland.
Clean tillage should be avoided in order to permit field grasses such as Colorado grass and Crab grass to furnish a cover crop. If land is plowed, the crop residue should be incorporated as near the top of
the soil as possible. The greatest amount of crop residue that can possibly be left on the ground will keep wind erosion at a minimum. Soil Conservation technicians ran irrigation ditch lines October

Abruzzi rye and about ten acres of vetch mixed with Abruzzi rye, also several acres of Abruzzi rye in a pure stand. With the exception of a few small spots, a good stand
was obtained on all these plantwas obtained on all these plant-
ings desplte the adverse moisture conditions this fall.
These plantings have a twofold purpose; they should furnish graz-
ing superior to wheat on this type ing superior to wheat on this type
of soil and if not grazed too close of soil and if not grazed too close
furnish adequate protection against wind erosion. The vetch and peas being legumes will also restore some nitrogen to the soll for
the use of succeeding the use of succeeding crops.
These plantings will be watched with considerable interest by both the farm operator and Soil Conservation personnel of this district as their success may point the way in deep sandy land areas, and fertility improvement of these areas.
