We hate to admit it but we're running low on recipes. Have just a few left to publish, and hope that those kind friends who have been saying for sometime that they intend to send us a recipe, will do o soon. (Sure hope Mrs. Pat will take that hint, as we can guarantee some of her cake recipes—when she does the baking.) Mrs. Patterson is one of those who hoped we'd find room soon for the vinegar pie recipe. She recalled those her mother, the late Mrs. W. P. Hall baked and how they enjoyed them. Here are our vinegar pie recipes, four of them, all different:

Old Fashioned 2-Crust Vinegar Pie Mrs. J. C. Rhoderick, Sr. 1/4 tsp. nutmeg 1 cup sugar

4 tbsp flour 1 small cup vinegar 4 tbsp. butter

Mix and pour in unbaked crust, top with another crust, sprinkle with sugar and bake.

Mrs. Trudy Taylor 3/4 cup sugar 1 cup boiling water 2 tbsp. flour 2 egg yolks 1 tbsp. flour 2 egg yolks 1 tbsp butter 1 tsp lemon extract

dash nutmeg 2 tbsp. vinegar Mix sugar and flour in boiling water, add butter and egg yolks; cook until thick. Cool then add extract and vinegar. Pour in baked pie shell and add dash of nutmeg.

Mrs. Otis Purcell 3 tbsp. flour 1 cup sugar 2 tbsp. vinegar 2 tbsp. butter 1/2 tsp. lemon ext

2 tbsp. butter ½ tsp. lemon extract

1/2 tsp. mace or nutmeg

Beat egg yolks and sugar mixed with flour; add vinegar and butter and pour in boiling water. Cook until thick. Add salt and flavoring and pour into baked pie shell. Top with meringe, brown in slow oven.

WHAT'S AHEAD IN CROPS

What's ahead in the crop situation for next year?

This question may be asked by a great many Texas farmers, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A. & M. College. And here's his answer.

There's a caution sign out for the wheat and feed grain producers, Prices of these crops will probably drop about a third this winter and early spring. So they will be about a third lower next year than they were in 1948. Exports may still be as large next year, but are being trimmed in places by large demands for durable goods and armament.

Figuring on average weather conditions, cotton farmers should have a good year. The agricultural economists figure twice as much cotton will be exported next year as last. At the same time, the nation here at home won't use quite as the big things that will affect these

much as in 1948. The support prices will hold at 90 percent of parity which means the government loan prices will be around 27 cents for middling seven-eights inches in Texas markets. Here again, says Bates, an acreage boost next year might bring production control problems into the 1950 picture.

Peanut growers do not know yet whether marketing quotas will be in effect. Support prices announced for 1949 will average about \$210 per ton. So to get guaranteed prices, the goober growers may have to comply with acreage controls authorized by last year's referendum

And the way it looks now, the acreage goal for peanuts next year is likely to be down 10 percent or
