## BAPTISTS SCHEDULE DEACON ELECTION

## Stray Dog Bites Quitaque Woman

Jane Hamilton, employee of Pioneer Drug Store was bitten by a stray dog Friday morning while she was walking to work. The animal's fangs sank through her overboots into the muscle of the calf of the leg.

The dog made no sound whatsoever or showed no signs of ferocious intent before attacking Mrs. Hamilton. After biting her, the large brown animal turned abruptly and followed children who were enroute to school.

Mrs. Hamilton saw a Matador doctor who stated that while her wound was not potentially dangerous because it did not completely penetrate the muscle, the dog should be penned for observation. He treated the wound, but did not prescribe rabies shots. She is recovering and able to work in spite of her frightening experience.

School children were kept in at recess periods that day and teachers have been vigilant all week so that their charges will not suffer a like experience.

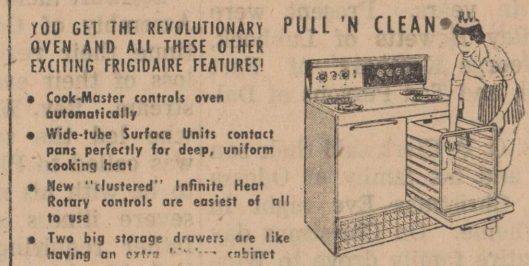
