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Crash Claims Life Quitaque P. T. A. To Panthers Shoot Down Owls 79-47

Juan Ricardo Talamentes, 21 years old, was killed last Sunday 1962 UPLAND COTTON afternoon about 5:45 in an automobile accident 4 miles east of QUOTAS ANNOUNCED Quitaque on the Turkey highway.

As far as can be determined there were no witnesses to the accident and it appeared that young Talamentes lost control of his late model car, and flipped over, winding up in the edge of the cotton field alongside of the road.

The car was heavily damaged, and according to Johnny Cagle, who towed the car back to town with his wrecker, the engine was brokncompletely loose and fell out on the ground when he picked the car

Talamentes was alone when the accident happened.

Juan Ricardo Talamentes was born Feb. 8, 1940 at Big Welles, Texas, and the body was sent back there for burial. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Florencio Talamentes; three brothers and one sister.
