If more than two-thirds of the farmers voting over the nation approve marketing quotas, penalties will apply on farms having excess cotton acreage in 1962 and price erators within the range of 65 to 95 percent of parity, the exact level

If quotas are not approved, the allotment program will remain in effect and the price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.
