### FRUIT CAKE CAN BE MADE MORE TASTY

For a rich moist fruit cake, baking time and temperature are just as important as the ingredients. Dry, crumbly flavorless cakes are caused by too-high temperatures or over-baking.

According to Margaret Spader, home service editor for the Gas Appliance Manufacturers' Association, a 2-lb. fruit cake (baked in a 1-lb. coffee can) should bake at 300 degrees for 21/4 hours in a gas oven.

The first twenty-eight hybrids and varieties yielded so nearly the same that they are considered equal in ability. The least significant difference in this test was 621.34 lbs. of grain per acre. This means that there must be at least this much difference between the yield on any two hybrids or varieties before one

the other, Dr. Collister said.
