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Panthers Clip Clarendon High

The Quitaque Panthers took a 69-56 win over the Clarendon Broncs at Clarendon last Thursday night.

The Pantherettes dropped their game to a strong Clarendon team, 57-40.

Thursday night games closed out the 1961 basketball season for the local teams and found the Panthers with a respectable 14 wins and two losses for the current season, while the Pantherettes have won 9 and lost 7.

News From The County Agent's Office

We hear a lot about the use of wheat and grain stubble and cotton burs to increase the organic matter content of the soil. But, what is organic matter and what function does it have in the soil.

You might say that organic matter is the storehouse of plant nutrients in your soil. It is literally the "Fat of the Land." Organic matter results from the decomposition of plant and animal materials by soil organisms. On the average it contains about 56 percent carbon and 5 percent nitrogen.

You may ask, of what value is organic matter in the soil? Organic matter improves soil structure with a corresponding increase in the rate of infiltration and water storage capacity. Organic matter improves soil aeration loosens dense, compact soils, at the same time granulating loose, open, sandy soils to give them a fragile crumb structure. Organic matter exerts a strong influence on the exchange capacity of the soil, and also acts as a buffer to prevent rapid changes of fluctuations in soil acidity or alkalinity. During the decomposition of organic matter, a continuous supply of carbon dioxide, nitrogen in various forms, phosphorus and other nutrients so essential to plant growth, are liberated. Organic matter serves as a storage facility for mineral nutrients such as calcium, magnesium, nitrogen and many others making them less likely to be lost in drainage or water seepage. Organic Matter makes the Soil more favorable for vigorous, rapidly developing root systems of young plants.

Continuous cultivation without attention to regular additions of residues gradually lower the organic matter of your soils. This level may become so low that maximum production cannot be obtained. Regular additions of cotton burs to your land will offset this condition. Cotton, a clean-tilled crop, does not produce much residue; for this reason, you need to restore regularly organic matter which is lost during cultivation of the crop.

Soil organic matter decomposes relatively fast when Ph, moisture, temperature and aeration conditions are favorable. In this area conditions are favorable for rapid decomposition over long periods. Therefore, we are not able to accumulate in our soils a high content of organic matter. For maximum production, regular additions of residues

should be made to such soils to maintain a favorable balance.

Cotton burs and other crop residues are relatively high in carbon and low in nitrogen. Their decomposition process temporarily uses up much of the available nitrogen from a chemical source.

Nitrogen plowed down with cotton burs is beneficial in the following ways:

1. It hastens the transformation of cotton burs or other residue into active organic matter.
2. It results in a larger amount of active organic matter from a given quantity of crude cotton burs.
3. It provides an additional supply of available nitrogen for the crop that follows.
4. It prevents any depression in yield which may result from plowing down heavy applications of cotton burs which are high in woody materials and low in nitrogen.

We also should remember that decomposition of materials is accomplished by small organisms in the soil. These organisms are only active when the soil temperature is 60 degrees or higher. Also, a good rule of thumb when applying chemical fertilizer to burs or stubble is 20 pounds of actual nitrogen should be applied for every ton of residue applied. Sometime where you have extra heavy wheat or grain stubble and the carbon-nitrogen ratio is very wide, you may need to go to 30 pounds of nitrogen.

Looking at some of the research information obtained at the Lubbock Experiment Station we can easily see the value of burs.

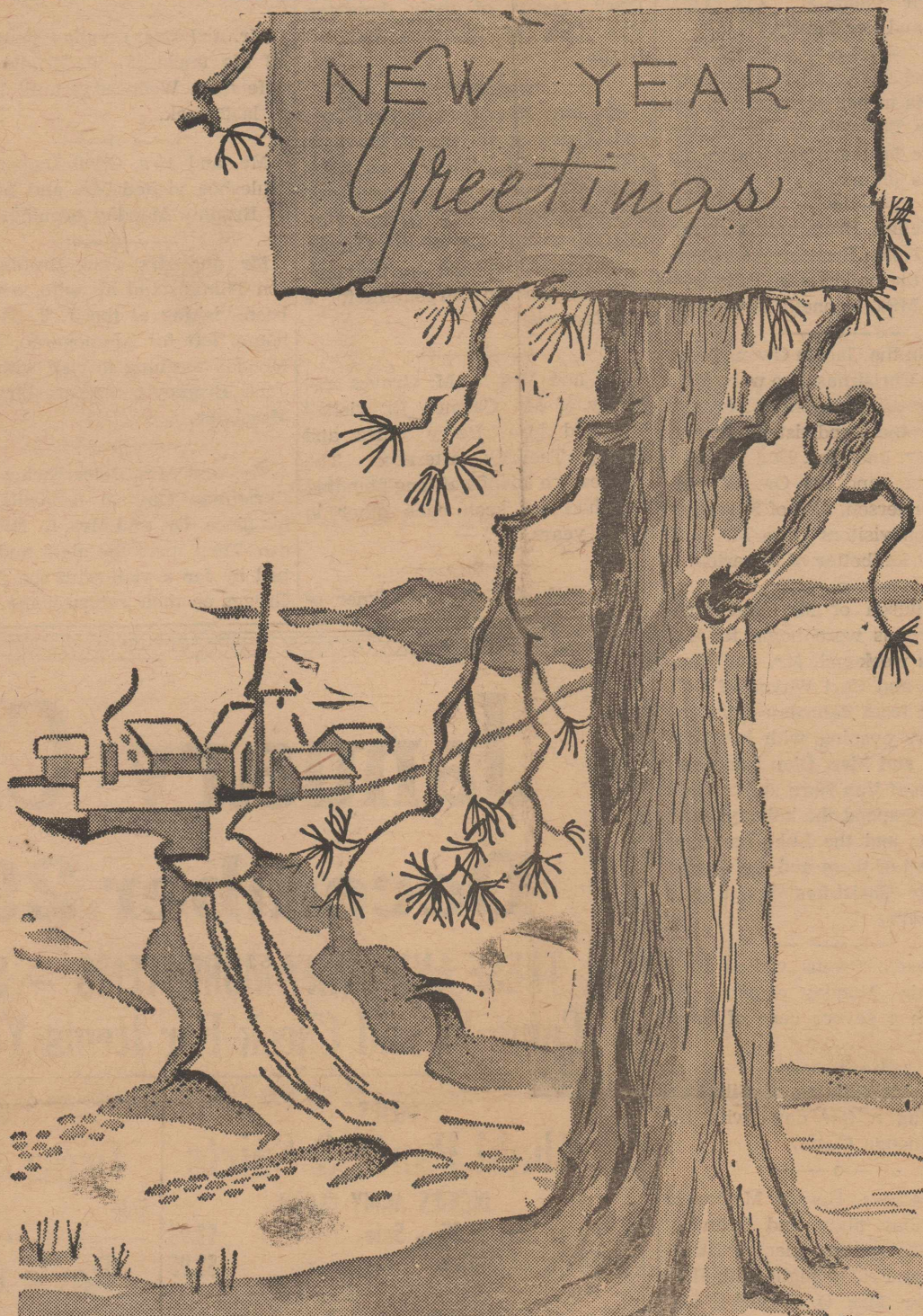

LOCAL CHURCH BUILDING FUNDS TO BE ADDED TO METHODIST PROGRAM

The Board of Directors of The Texas Methodist Foundation voted in its November meeting in Dallas to enlarge its program to include a bold program for church building.

A committee, under the direction of Mr. Erle White, Wichita Falls, president of White Stores, recommended that arrangements be made with executives of the Broadway plan to handle such a program for the Foundation on a fee basis.

According to an explanation of the plan made by Mr. Searcy Bracewell, Broadway Bond Company will provide the initial fund enabling the Foundation to underwrite local church bond programs. The foundation will not guarantee the success of a bond selling program, nor offer to pay in cash for any defaulted bonds. It will, however, replace a defaulted bond with a bond from a church which is meeting its obligations. The fund for guaranteeing the bonds will be built up out of early maturing bonds surrendered to The Methodist Foundation by churches using the Foundation's bond service. A small percentage of bonds issued in any bond program will be used to pay the foundation for this service.

Seven floodwater retarding structures will be constructed along the 8.6 miles of channel imporements on Kent Creek, according to the Tentative Work Plan which was received by the sponsoring agencies of the Kent Creek Watershed.

Several large dams will be constructed along the watershed with the largest one to be built on the J. A. Mayfield farm. Other dams will be built on farms belonging to Freeman Tate, Lem Weaver, J. K. Patnick, R. L. Brunson, S. C. Brown and J. B. Tiffin.

According to the Work Plan, the Mayfield dam will have a permanent 235 acre feet. There will be 187,000 cu. yds. in the dam, with a height of 43 feet above the dam. The dam is designed to handle an 8 inch rainfall over a 6 hour period.

The watershed comprises an area of 42.2 square miles, or 27,008 acres, and is about 18 miles in length. It heads 4 miles NW of Quitaque and extends eastward 6.5 miles SE of Turkey.

Approximately 75 percent of the watershed is composed of cropland, 22 percent is rangeland and the remaining 3 percent is roads, highways, and stream channels. Some 1813 acres within the watershed are subject to overflow damage.

Work on the project is expected to begin in the fall of 1962, or early in 1963, and estimated cost of the project, when completed is \$539,457. The Work Plan calls for a five year installation period, but the structures and channel improvements will be completed over a period of 3 years.

When the works of improvement have been completed, the annual floodwater, sediment, and other damages are expected to show a reduction of 73.8 percent. The structures will be designed to detain an average of 3.23 inches of runoff, and the acreage now subject to flooding will be reduced by 60.4 percent.

TO GET INCOME TAX GUIDES FARMERS AND RANCHERS URGED

College Station, Dec. 27 — The year of 1961 will soon be history. For many people, the end of December means the conclusion of another tax year and that tax obligations must soon be met, points out C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist.

Before tackling the tax reporting job, Bates suggests that farmers and ranchers get a copy of the Internal Revenue Service's 1962 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide. It is available without cost from the offices of local county agents or those of the Internal Revenue Service. The guide is written in easy-to-read style and includes examples of problems worked out on the applicable tax forms, Bates says.

As for the dates, January 15 is the deadline for farmers and ranchmen who want extra time for filing their final report to file their 1961 tax estimate. If the estimate is filed, Bates explains, the final date for filing of the 1040 form is extended to April 15. If no estimate is filed, February 15 then becomes the deadline for making the final tax report. These deadlines, points out the specialist, apply to taxpayers who derived two-thirds or more of their 1961 gross income from farming or ranching.

Another important consideration is the reporting of hired labor and

the social security tax on wages paid. Either of two tests determine whether or not a farmer must pay the social security tax on wages. If the worker was paid \$150 or more during the calendar year or if the worker was paid wages (on hourly or day basis) for 20 days or more during the year, the 3 percent social security tax should have been deducted from the cash wages.

Form 943 is used for reporting farm wages. The farmer - employer must show the wages paid and give the account number of individual workers. The withheld tax plus an equal amount from the employer along with the reporting form must be filed on or before January 31 or a month after the close of the year. Because every phase of the farm and ranch business can be affected by taxes, Bates emphasizes the need for a study of the Tax Guide.
