There are a number of Bills still pending in the Congress which passed one of the Houses, but not the er. One of these, H. R. 5751, ends the Subersive Activities to make it possible to deal re effectively in controlling Comnist and other foreign propaıda, and also requires registraof domestic organizations or ibinations directed or financed by a foreign country or foreign political party. This measure passed by the House and was favorably reported by the Senate. It can be most helpful in the fight against Communism.

Another measure that will be of great help is H. R. 8465, which prohibits shipment in interstate or foreign commerce of articles imported to the United States from Cuba. This would effectively prevent any trade with Cuba, and would be in keeping with the general feeling of the people of this country as to doing business with Castro.. Extensive hearings were held on this measure before the Committee on Intertate and Foreign Commerce, of which I am a member. These hearings were most interesting and pointed up the need for this type of legislation. This measure passed the House of Representatives but has not yet been reported in the Senate. It is hoped that early action will be had.

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

—add snipped prunes to scrambled eggs, to corned beef hash, to cooked rice and cereals and mix snipped pieces with whipped cream for dessert

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
