PANHANDLE-PLAINS PASTORS AND LAYMAN'S CONFERENCE TO MEET JANUARY 15 - 16

Plainview, Texas (Spl) - The 41st annual session of the Panhandle Plains Pastors and Laymen's Conference will be held January 15-16 at Wayland College, Plainview, according to Rev. Wayland Edward, Lubbock, president.

More than 600 persons are expected for the two-day conference with sessions at 7 A. M., 2 P. M. and 7 P. M. Three guest speakers will be featured: Dr. E. S. James, Dallas, Dr. Forrest C. Feezor, Dallas, and Luman Holman, Jacksonville.

Dr. James, editor of the Baptist Standard, Dallas, will deliver the sermon at each session and Dr. Feezor, former executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will give five Bible study lectures.

Holman, co-chairman of the Christian Education Crusade, will speak on "What is a College" as a feature of the first session.

At the afternoon session, Bill O'Brien, minister of music and education at Paramount Baptist Church, Amarillo, will be in charge of the music and the Rev. Luther M. Berry, pastor of First Baptist Church, Spearman, will lead in prayer. The International Singers from Wayland's International Choir will sing under the direction of James D. Cram.

Speaking on "Foundations of Confidence" will be Tom Parrish, vice president in charge of development services at Wayland.

Monday evening's session will emphasize the Texas Baptist's current Christian Education Crusade with an address by Dr. J. Ralph Grant, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Lubbock. He will speak on the "Pastor's Viewpoint of Christian Education".

The session will open with a sacred concert by the Wayland International Choir under the direction of Cram, who will sing a solo "The Grace Notes, women's trio, will also appear on the program. A. B. Reid, Abernathy, will lead in prayer.

Tuesday's first session will open with a song service led by Bill Michael, director of youth activities at Second Baptist Church in Lubbock. Michael and John Ward, minister of music and education at First Baptist Church, Plainview, will provide the music. William B. Williams, Temple Baptist Church, Amarillo, will lead in prayer. James Barbee, director of religious activities at Wayland, will speak on "Religious activities at Wayland Baptist College."

Joe Whitten, director of music and youth activities at First Baptist Church, Pampa, will direct the music at the afternoon session. Prayer will be led by Miller F. Robinson, pastor of First Baptist Church, Matador. A report of the

nominating committee will follow the address by Melvin Ratheal, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, Lubbock, who will speak on "How to Influence More Baptist Young People to Attend Baptist Colleges".

The concluding session will feature music provided by the Treble Tones women, choral group, directed by Dr. DeLage, and by the First Baptist Church, Hart.

The Rev. W. G. Burton, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Friona, will lead n prayer.

"Extending Stewardship by the Transfer of Property" will be the topic of George McClesky, Lubbock attorney.

Current officers of the Pastors and Laymen's Conference which meets each year in Plainview are: president, Wayland Edwards, pastor of the Southcrest Baptist Church Lubbock; vice president, Glendon Sanders, minister of music and education, First Church, Gainesville; and secretary-treasurer, H. 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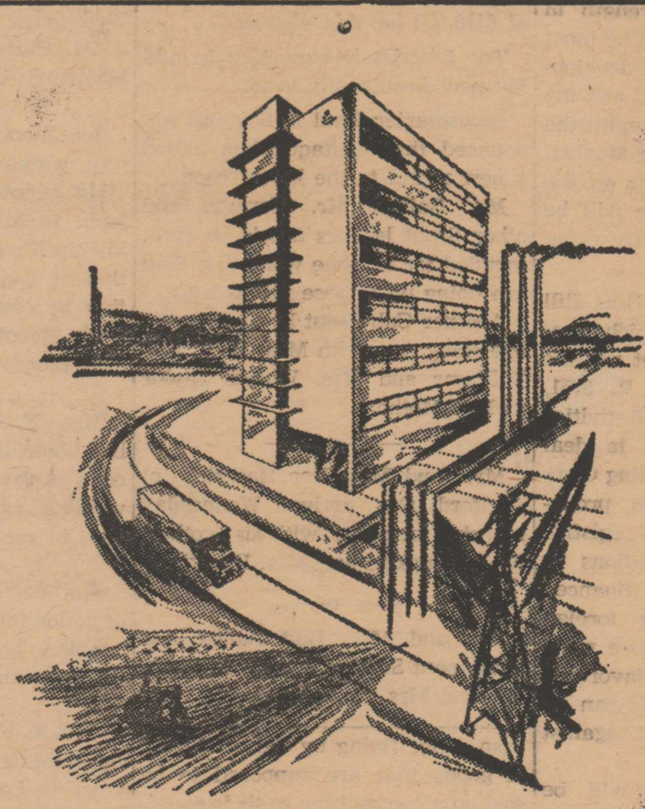

Easy Ways To Enjoy Prunes -



Prunes are a lot different from what they used to be. Today's new California prunes are soft and moist and luscious. They are tart-sweet and winy in flavor, and rich in vitamins and minerals. These prunes really require no cooking. For soft, soft juicy plumpness, just cover them with cold water and let soak overnight.

The new soft prunes just as they come from the package make delicious nibble-bites for between meals. For this, slit the box open on the long side in candy-box style and let folks and little folks dip into at will.

Also -

- tuck them into lunch boxes
- roll in sugar as a confection
- wrap bacon around them and broil as party fancies
- snip the meat from the pits with scissors and add to muffin, pancake and waffle batters
- add snipped prunes to scrambled eggs, to corned beef hash, to cooked rice and cereals and mix snipped pieces with whipped cream for dessert toppings.

Nation's Mailmen Are Potent Force In March of Dimes Disease Battle

A small, yellow envelope serving as a harbinger of an expanding war on crippling disease arrives in the mailboxes of 40 million American families this week.

It brings the "mailer" of the 1962 March of Dimes, now dedicated to seeking the answers to birth defects and arthritis while continuing its work in polio. Printed on each envelope is the confident prophecy, "Your Dimes Will Do It Again!"

Addressed by tens of thousands of volunteers in the county chapters of The National Foundation - March of Dimes across the nation, this symbol of scientific research and total medical care for the victims of these diseases promises immediate help and future hope through the generosity of the American people.

The prediction on the mailer, "Your Dimes Will Do It Again!" is a reference, of course, to development of the Salk anti-polio vaccine and to the later Sabin oral vaccine. Both were made possible, as were the medical care and rehabilitation of many of those paralyzed by polio, by public contributions to the March of Dimes. Many millions of the dollars so well used to bring about these accomplishments came to local chapters through similar mailers in years past.

Recipients of these mailers, including those in distant Hawaii and Alaska, were urged by March of Dimes leaders this week to return the mailers to local chapters as promptly as possible.

As one chapter chairman said: "Aside from financial outlays needed urgently for research and for total medical care of victims, The National Foundation - March of Dimes must expand its already existing national network of chapter-supported clinics helping those stricken by birth defects or by arthritis.

"The figures give you an idea of the appalling magnitude of

the problem. Each year in this country, at least 250,000 infants are born with significant birth defects and 21,000 die. This we must prevent.

"As to rheumatoid arthritis, fully 30,000 children and adolescents are crippled. Altogether, more than 11 million Americans suffer from the arthritic diseases. This must not happen in the future.

"When we say to the public that 'Your Dimes Will Do It Again!' it's not an empty boast. We mean precisely that. Some folks believed that the answer to polio would never be found.

But our scientists never abandoned hope and, because of March of Dimes contributions from those who believed as we did, the answer was found. Tens of thousands of lives have been saved since then, and tens of thousands saved from crippling.

"None of us, scientists included, knows when the answers will be found to birth defects and arthritis. We just know, as we knew with confidence before the Salk vaccine, that those answers will be found provided sufficient public support is forthcoming."

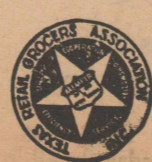
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
