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## West Texas Utilities Company Forms New District

The organization of a new operating district of the West Texas Utilities Company was announced today by Cal Young, WTU president.

The new operating district will be known as the Panhandle District. It was formed by combining the Quanah and Childress Districts. J. C. Randel, manager of the Quanah District and acting manager of the Childress District, has been named manager of the new district.

Randel, who has been manager of the Quanah District since 1956, assumed supervision of both districts in December of last year following the death of Allen Shahan, manager of the Childress District.

The new district will be the Company's third largest, comparable in size to the Abilene and San Angelo Districts.

The district office, which will be located in Childress, will be almost in the exact center of the Panhandle District. The district will extend approximately 60 miles in each direction: from Vernon on the east to Quitaque on the west, from Shamrock on the north to Paducah and Matador on the south.

Young emphasized that only the two district offices were involved. He pointed out that in no event would personnel in the district offices concerned lose seniority or be released.

"In our continuing efforts to hold el," Young said, "it is necessary electric rates to our pre-WWII level that we take every step, such as the creation of this new district, to cut our operating costs, reduce our overhead and to improve our operating efficiency."

Randel, in speaking of his new assignment said, "The opportunity of operating one of the Company's largest districts presents a wonderful challenge which I welcome."

"Today, when every economy of operation is necessary to keep our cost of service low to our customers," Randel pointed out, "it is just practical to maintain two district organizations only thirty miles apart."

In 1927, when the old Quanah and Childress Districts were established," Randel said, "I do not remember being a paved highway in the area and our communications, such as were available at the time, pretty well limited us to a small operating area."

"Today, the situation is entirely different. With the excellent network of paved highways crossing the territory east to west and north to south, and with the convenience

of modern telephone and two-way radio communication, we have found that district personnel can be responsible for and supervise larger areas."

"Another factor enters into this new development," Randel continued. "The areas of the two districts are very similar; the economies are closely related; and together they make a logical working unit for our operation."

"We believe that the future of the new Panhandle District holds great promise. With the wonderful ranch and farm lands providing the basis for a balanced agricultural economy; with the expansion of oil production and with the progressive community spirit of the people, I know we will be able to assist substantially in the development of the area included in the Panhandle District."

"Particularly with the various groups in the district working to solve the problem of adequate water supplies and to create a favorable climate for industrial expansion, it will be our purpose to work for the fullest industrial development of the area."

In commenting on his plans, Randel said, "Certainly it will take some time to completely merge the operations and personnel of the two district offices. Mrs. Randel and I plan to move to Childress; however, we have to first dispose of our home in Quanah and make arrangements for a new home in Childress."

The new District Manager is a veteran WTU employee, having been with the Company 34 years, most of which has been in the new Panhandle District area. In 1949, Randel was named Assistant District Manager and assigned to Vernon. He was promoted to District Manager, with headquarters in Quanah, in 1956.

A veteran of WWII, Randel has been active in the American Legion and Veteran of Foreign Wars. He also is a member of the Quanah Rotary Club and in the towns where he has served, his record as a civic worker and a Chamber of Commerce booster has been outstanding. Randel has served as a director of the Vernon, Quanah and West Texas Chambers of Commerce.

An Elder of the Presbyterian Church in Quanah, Randel is also an active member of the Masonic Lodge. He and Mrs. Randel have one daughter, Mrs. Don Haynes of Chillicothe, Texas.

## Panthers Win Bi-district

The Quitaque Panthers shot their way into the Bi-District championship and advanced to the Regional Tournament last Monday night by taking a two-point 47-45 win over the McAdoo Eagles before a large crowd in the Plainview High School Gym.

The game was close all the way, with six points being the widest margin held by either team, that held briefly by the Panthers in the third quarter. McAdoo had a five point lead at one time in the first period. It was of short duration. The lead changed hands ten times during the game and was tied 7 times.

James Starkey popped the nets with one of his pretty shots from the side to open game scoring and the Eagles' McWilliams promptly tied it up and then Powers sent McAdoo ahead with a lay up. The count was tied again at 7-7, and then McAdoo built up their 12-7 lead before the Panthers pulled up at 11-12 at the end of the first period.

The second quarter was more of the same with both team trading point for point and McAdoo still owned a one-point 26-25 lead at half time. During the third period the Panthers outscored the Eagles 11-6 and at one point it began to look like the Quitaque lads were finally off and running and they had a 36-32 lead at the end of the 3rd quarter but four of the Panthers were playing with four fouls each against them and had to play it a bit cautious. They were outscored 14-11 in the final frame but did manage to outlast the

Eagles. McAdoo had a chance to tie the game in the fading seconds when Larry Morris, the games' top scorer for the night missed a shot from about the free throw line.

The game was just as close as the score indicated in every respect. Each team made 11 free throws and the Panthers made 18 field goals to the Eagles 17. The Panthers had 18 fouls called on them and McAdoo 14.

The Panthers played their top defensive game of the year. This was where McAdoo expected to win, for they had scouted the Panthers twice this season and it happened that they caught Quitaque when they were having two of their most miserable nights defensively. Most Quitaque fans felt that had the Panthers been hitting with anything like their usual accuracy, the game would not have been close. This observer felt that the Quitaque lads should have won by at least 15 points.

Sammy Johnston led the Panther scoring with 15 points. James Starkey was next with 11, followed by Dellis Monk who canned 10 points, Phelps 7 and Jack Johnson made 4 points, a well balanced scoring attack. McAdoo's Larry Morris hit for 21 points to win scoring honors for the night and teammate John Powers dropped in 15. Bill McWilliams made 7 points and John McCormick managed for 2 points to round out the scoring for the Eagles. McAdoo has a real fine team but they are just not as good as the tall Panthers.

The greater portion of Quitaque's population was on hand to

see the game Monday night, along with basketball fans from all over the area. It was the largest crowd the Panthers had ever performed before and they put on a good show.

Friday evening at 7 o'clock in the West Texas State Field House at Canyon, the Panthers will try to continue their winning ways and their goal now is the coveted trip to Austin to play in the State Championship Tournament, the dream of every schoolboy who plays basketball. Quitaques opponent Friday night will be Flower Grove, a school near Lamesa. We have been unable to find out anything about their team, their record or who they have played. They did not have to play a bi-district game, advancing to Regional via a bye.

The Panthers will be one of the favorites to capture the regional tourney, on the strength of their record, and the ease with which they have beaten many of their opponents.

Another well-rated team that will play in the tourney is Megargel, a school located near Seymour. They boast a fine 34-2 season record and they took a lop-sided 69-36 win over O'Brien in a bi-district game Tuesday night. If the Panthers make their way into the finals at Canyon, there is a good chance that they will meet the Megargel Mustangs.

Monday nights win over McAdoo brought the Panthers' season record to 30 wins and 3 losses. Last Thursday night in the West Texas State Field House the Panthers lost

a close 61-58 game to the San Jon Coyotes, who are defending Class B champions of New Mexico and are prime candidates to repeat. The Coyotes are a smooth, classy basketball team. They threatened to turn the game into a rout Thursday night building up a 13 point halftime lead, but the Panthers came roaring back in the second half, went ahead with two and a half minutes left in the game but couldn't hold their lead and dropped a heartbreaker to a very fine team.

Elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune, merchants and friends of this year's fine Panther team offer their congratulations for winning bi-district and best wishes at Regional. Most of them have said that they are closing up shop at five o'clock Friday and will be on hand at Canyon come game time to root for them. Most fans here feel that this might be the year for a Quitaque team to go to Austin.

Here is the schedule for the Regional Tournament at Canyon this weekend.

Briscoe will open the tournament against Booker at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Megargel plays Pep at 4:15, Quitaque plays Flower Grove at 7 o'clock and at 8:15 Adrian will play Roosevelt.

The winners will play at 10 and 11:15 A.M. Saturday. The Saturday morning losers will play for third place at 7 P.M. and the Saturday morning winners will play for the regional championship at 8:15 P.M.

The Briscoe County Farmers Union will meet Monday night, February 26, at 7:30 P. M. in the Gasoline Community Building.

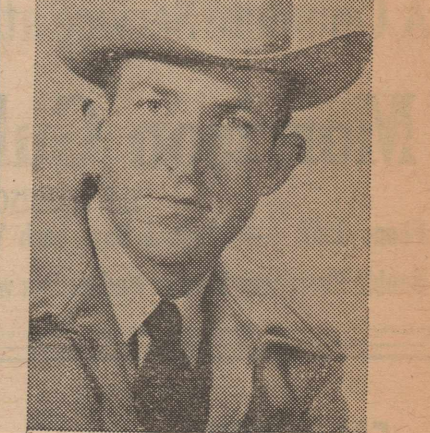
Texas Farmers Union president J. I. Naman of Waco, Texas will be the Special Speaker for the evening.

**CHILEAN MISSIONARIES SPEAK AT METHODIST CHURCH**

Last Sunday afternoon two ladies from Santiago, Chile, Senora Eliza de Elphick, and Sonora Ester Rossel arrived here for a brief visit at First Methodist Church. These two women were described to our church as "two of the most consecrated, dynamic and talented women of the Methodist Church in the Republic of Chile." Those in attendance Sunday certainly will agree that this is no mere statement.

Sr. Rossel, a native of Chile, speaks no English, but her testimony and facts about her work were ably translated by Sr. Elphick who was born in Sweden. Sr. Rossel is an approved supply pastor in the Methodist Church, was educated by her mother. Her father was a Presbyterian minister and her capabilities from this religious training enabled her to obtain help through the church to go to San Ramon, a poverty-ridden mission to carry on the work. From this humble beginning, she now has a congregation of 140. At the beginning, she had only five children as her membership. In addition to her pastoral duties, Sr. Rossel maintains a primary school in the

church for children from kindergarten to third grade. These pupils number 75, and she has one helper.

Sra. Elphick came to Chile 41 years ago as a missionary with the Salvation Army. She married a Methodist minister and twenty-one years ago she founded a home for the care and placement of children.

About 100 people were present to hear these women tell of their work. All money given was sent to further their work and did much to create interest in our area for foreign missionary efforts.

**FARMERS UNION PRESIDENT**

(Continued From Page One) which has recently been submitted to Congress.

"It is imperative to our nation that the traditional pattern of the family farm type agriculture be sustained and the whole future of this concept will be jeopardized if the new farm program has unfavorable reception in the Congress", president Naman says. "The lack of family farm safeguards in the past and the piece-

meal type farm legislation have brought about the depressed conditions of the farm economy and the comprehensiveness and imaginativeness of the new program is what is necessary to enable the farm economy to recapture its stability."

"It is necessary," president Naman says, "that we have a permanent type, long-range feed grain and wheat program to reduce carry-over as a means to improve farm income and reduce federal expenditures. This program must be locally administered by democratically elected agriculture stabilization and conservation service committees", Naman added.

"It is important that the object of this program be to improve rural living rather than to move people off the land and the land be taken out of production must be utilized for recreational and other purposes," Naman said.

The Texas Farmers Union presi-

dent said that "the overall goal of the Agriculture Act of 1962 must be to afford the farmers the opportunity to achieve parity of income with other economic groups by providing them with the means to develop and strengthen their bargaining power in the Nation's economy."

President Naman also said that "it is extremely important that farmers participate in the current wheat and feed grain sign-up since it is through this participation that they show the Congress their interest in the farm program and their approval of the successful program of the last year. They also, by so doing, lend their support to solving the problems of unmanaged production and falling income."
