College Station, March 22 — Corn and grain sorghum producers must decide soon whether or not they will participate in the 1962 Feed Grain program, reminds C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist. March 31 is the deadline date for declaring intent to comply and notice must be given in writing to the County ASCS before that date.

Bates points out that non-cooperators may plant all the corn or grain sorghum acreage they wish and the grain produced may be either fed or marketed. If it is sold it will bring only the market price since no government support price can be obtained. They can get support Church Lay Leader and Church prices for oats, however, if this grain is placed under loan.

Growers who do comply must divert at least 20 percent of their feed grain base into conservation use. For this land they will receive payment equal to 50 percent of normal production. In addition, as cooperators they will be eligible for price supports on the normal production from reduced acreage.

Producers who need assistance in figuring the possible effects of the program on their net farm income should see their county agent, says Bates. County agents have copies of budget forms which can be used to figure alternatives and how the decisions may affect net profit

#### EARLY PLANTED COTTON DOES BEST

College Station, March 22, - Cotton planted on April 3 in field trials at the McGregor Substation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 1961 produced almost three times as much lint an acre as cotton planted on May 15. O. J. Tippit, farm superintendent, said early planting has proved effective over the years when early insect control is carried out.

In the 1961 tests, two varieties were used with little difference noted between them in yields when planted on the same date. The April 3 planting yielded 452 pounds of lint an acre compared with 158 April 15 plantings produced 342 pounds for the May 15 planting. pounds of lint an acre compared with a yield of 274 pounds for May

Gross returns per acre based on int at 30 cents a pound were \$135. 60; \$102.60; \$82.20 and \$47.40; respectively for the four different planting dates, Tippit said. Hoeing costs on the April plantings were 73 cents an acre compared with 55 cents for the May dates. All plant-
