TEXAS FARMERS HAVE BIG STAKE IN FOREIGN AGRICULTURAL TRADE
College Station, March 22 — The world market continues to be a highly important outlet and source of income for Texas farmers. They supplied the export market with products worth \$447 million in the 1960-61 fiscal year, ranking just behind California among all the states, according to a recent U. S. Department of Agriculture study.
The principal commodities produced for export by Texans included cotton, grain sorghums, wheat, rice and livestock. "It is a real tribute to the efficiency of Texas farmers that they were able to make this contribution to helping feed the world's consumers," said David Brown, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "We need to continue to keep our eyes on events affecting foreign markets because they have a real dollars and cents meaning to Texas agriculture even though our farms and ranches are a long way from

foreign markets," Brown added.
U. S. agricultural exports are running at record levels. Last year \$5 billion worth of U. S. farm products were exported. Sixty million acres of U. S. cropland are producing for export. This is about three times the harvested acreage in Texas.
The USDA study, in appraising the stake Texas farmers have in foreign trade, showed that the State's equivalent share of the nation's crop exports included 2 million bales of cotton, 46 million bushels of grain sorghum, 39 million bushels of wheat and 6.4 million hundredweight of rice.

On the basis that foreign trade is a two-way street, Texas also plays a part in the imports of agricultural products. Many are non-competitive consumer items such as coffee, tea, cocoa, spices, bananas, etc. Although competing agricultural products also come in from abroad, Texas' agriculture is far ahead in the exchange since the State's share of exports is more than three times its share of competing imports.
Many agricultural commodity groups are working closely with USDA in efforts to expand exports even more. One of the big national objectives at this time is to arrive at an international trade program that gives U. S. agriculture better bargaining power so it can sell even more actively in foreign markets.

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGER'S WASHINGTON REPORT POLITICS
The word "politic" is defined in Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary as "of or pertaining to civil government." It has also been de-

defined as the science of government, the rules of conduct by which men must live. History records many attempts in this field of endeavor, none of which has been free of flaws. Throughout the ages, most of these attempts have resulted in dismal failure. It might be said that as a result of these dismal failures and in revolution against them, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States were born. At the time of the creation of our great country, one of the leading political lights of England gave us a life expectancy of not more than 50 years. Others have predicted our disintegration from year to year, from decade to decade and from century to century. In a few short years, this country, under the Constitution, which has relatively few amendments, will have survived for 200 years, and it is my prediction that the forecasters of doom, both of this generation and those of the past, will be as disappointed at the end of the 200-year period as each has been in the falsity of their own individual predictions. Man lives by challenge, and it can never be said that this country and our people have failed to have our fair share of challenges. With each, we have grown stronger. Today we are faced with perhaps our greatest challenge. It, too, will be met and dispensed with as have all others to the greater glory of our nation and our people. We must never lose faith in our own country, in our own people and in the philosophy of government written into our Constitution.

Much has been said in recent years as to the preachings and the doctrines of those who lived in the early days of our country and who fashioned many of the concepts and the philosophies which have guided us through the years. Perhaps the two leading schools of thought were represented by two great Americans who saw eye to eye on many subjects, but who were in direct conflict on others. I speak of Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton. I thought it would be well to sum up in this newsletter a few of the beliefs of these great men as compiled by historians and presently documented in the history of this country.
ON POLITICAL PHILOSOPHY, Jefferson believed in innate worth, rationality, ability and equality of man regardless of education or wealth, as being capable of self-government. Hamilton on the contrary did not believe in the masses and public opinion. He was a great admirer of hereditary monarchy and of the propertied classes.
On the question of minority rights

and special interests, Jefferson vigorously defended the rights of the minority through proper application of a Bill of Rights. He placed great faith in the common people and vigorously opposed the entailing of estates and perimogeniture. Hamilton is recorded as being a little concerned with individual rights as subscribed to an aristocratic Senate to check popular assemblies.

Both men saw eye to eye on complete freedom of the press and its wide utilization.

On the general subject of government, Jefferson believed that union was essential to the safety and prosperity of the States; that government was necessary to prevent men from injuring each other, and the less government the better. He opposed government by an elite but wholeheartedly endorsed the proposition that it should be by and for the common people. Hamilton is reputed to have believed in a strong permanent union and a strong Federal government central government to insure that union.

On the machinery of government, Jefferson believed that the President should serve not more than two terms (you will remember that this is the 22nd Amendment to the Constitution adopted in 1951). He believed in a complete separation of powers and a full application of the Bill of Rights by the judicial branch of the government as an essential means of safeguarding personal liberty. Hamilton subscribed to election of the President for life and election of Senators for life or good behavior. He believed that the power of judicial

review should be exercised to declare void unconstitutional acts of State and Federal legislatures. (It might be remembered that it is this power fixed in the decision of Marbury vs. Madison by Chief Justice Marshall that is the present source of the tremendous power of the Supreme Court.) Hamilton also believed in high property qualifications for voting.

There are many other matters that are of great interest with relation to the thoughts of these two great Americans, and it would be well for those who are interested in our government to review the history of that era. It will be most revealing and will certainly point out the beginning of philosophies that were adopted after vigorous and bitter debate and argument in a country under government of the people and for the people. It will reassure everyone that if we will proceed in accordance with the dictates of the Constitution, we need have no fear of our country disintegrating.
