

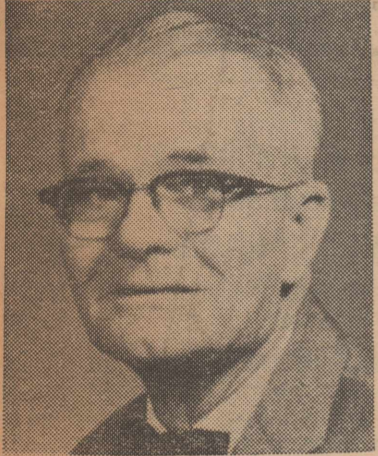

Funeral Services Held Friday For Jack Holcomb



Funeral services were held last Friday, April 13, at 2:30 P. M. for Jack Holcomb, in the Church of Christ at Turkey. Mr. Holcomb died Wednesday morning, April 11, at 11 o'clock in North West Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Officiating at the funeral services was J. B. Shelburne of Amarillo, assisted by Jack Hutton of Turkey. Interment was in Dreamland Cemetery at Turkey with arrangements under the direction of Roberts Funeral Home, Inc., of Quitaque.

Active pallbearers were Wayne Whittington, James Brunson, Jim Stoddard, H. F. Champion, Ralph Carter and Buster Chadwick.

Honorary pallbearers were Willie Bradshaw, Jim Beeson, Ollie J. Leonard Lusk, W. J. Carter, Dick Hooks, Orlin Stark, Pete Rice, Love and Hubert Dyer.

Thomas Holcomb was born September 20, 1900, at Cleburne, Johnson County, Texas, the son of Frank and Nancy McGown Holcomb.

He was married to Miss Reona Lacy at Turkey, October 7, 1927. Mr. Holcomb operated a Dry Cleaning Shop at Turkey for a number of years. The Holcomb family moved to Quitaque in 1946 and operated the Dry Cleaning Shop here until 1952, when they moved to Amarillo. Mr. and Mrs. Holcomb remained in Amarillo 8 years, returning to Quitaque in 1960, where they again went into the Dry Cleaning business and worked at that until poor health forced them to give up the business.

Jack Holcomb had a very narrow escape from death last September 9 when he was returning from Silverton and his car plunged down a deep ravine coming down the Caprock. He was taken to a hospital in Amarillo following his accident and while he was in the hospital he underwent major surgery and from that time until his death he spent much time in and out of the hospital.

Jack Holcomb knew much pain for many years but was not one to complain about his lot. He loved to be with people and never tired of visitors. The overflow crowd of people that filled the Church at his memorial service was an indication of the esteem in which he was held by his many friends all over this area.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Jerry Lynn of Amarillo; one daughter, Mrs. Leon Giesecke of Houston; three brothers, Drew of Turkey, Joe of Fort Sumner, N. M., and Marshall of Paducah, Texas; four sisters, Mrs. Mary Perkins of Turkey, Mrs. Katherine Means of Poolville, Texas, Mrs. Jewel Segers, New York City, and Mrs. Invia Pfaff, Mitchell, South Dakota; and four grandchildren.

Kent Creek Watershed Application Is Signed

The last and formal signing of Kent Creek Watershed application by the sponsoring agencies, the Kent Creek Water Control Improvement District, the Caprock Soil Conservation District, Hall County Commissioner's Court and the Hall County Soil Conservation District took place here last Thursday.

Approximately 25 people were present at the meeting. Around 40 review drafts of the Watershed Plan had previously been sent out to various government agents and other interested parties inviting them to attend the meeting. Purpose of the meeting was to discuss the plan and all its phases. A member of the Survey Team of the State Soil Conservation Service presided at the meeting and answered and discussed all inquiries.

The plan was accepted and formally signed by the agencies.

The plan will now be submitted to Congress for approval, and that approval is expected to come by July 1st.

Within the next few days members of the Kent Creek Watershed will begin work to secure the necessary easements for structure and channel improvement.

After easements have been secured and application has been signed by Congress, advertisements for bids for construction of structures will be run. It is hoped that actual work will begin on the structures by January 1st.

The plan sent to Washington calls for 7 structures to be built and over 8 miles of channel improvements, to include concrete drop structures. Improvement work will continue past Highway 70 in Hall County but all the holding structures will be in Briscoe County.

The work is estimated to cost more than \$540,000, set up over a five year completion period. Three structures are slated to be built in 1963.

Among those agencies represented at the meeting were: the State Soil Conservation Board, Ft. Worth and Denver Railroad, Federal Housing Administration, Texas Highway Dept., Briscoe County Agent, Soil Conservation Service, Interested parties residing in the Watershed, and members of the four Sponsoring Agencies.



M. C. Harbeck, a representative of the Watchtower Society, is here to direct this week's ministerial activity for the Quitaque Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, 3 blocks north of the Bank.

During the past 51 years Harbeck has been a minister of the Jehovah's Witnesses, he has appeared on Jehovah's Witnesses' national and international assembly programs held throughout the U. S. and Europe.

Being fluent in the use of the

Harbeck will conclude his week of activity Sunday, 3 P. M., when he speaks on the subject, "Is This the World's Last Generation?" This lecture will be given April 22 at the Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses, 3 blocks north of the Bank, Quitaque, Texas.

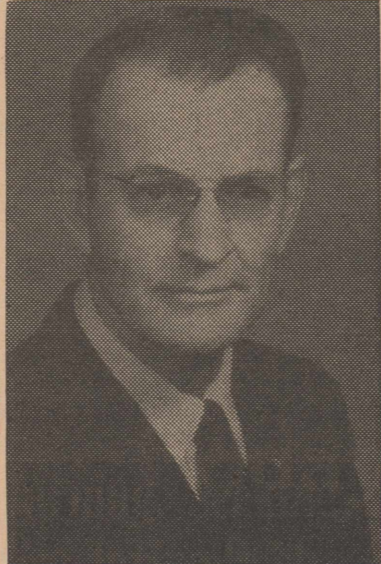
