TAXES - The mail with reference to taxes has been centered on reduction of income tax. Many suggestions and recommendations have been made through the years as to methods and manners of reducing the income tax or abolishing it altogther. The present campaign is to try to obtain an increase in the deduction allowed for individuals and their dependents. The present deduction for the average American citizen is \$600 for the indivivdual and \$600 for each dependent. I am happy that this movement has begun. In 1951 I introduced legislation to increase the individual exemption to \$1,000 proposed directive on the subject and to increase the exemption for dependents to \$750. A number of people asked me why I limited the dependents' increase to \$70. My answer was that I had no objection to the bill being amended and increased to \$1,000 for dependents, but in view of the number of dependents that I had, I didn't want the bill to appear as a bill for personal relief simply because I had six children. In a subsequent year I reintroduced the bill and increased the \$750 figure to \$1,000, at the request of a number of other Members of Congress. I have continued to press for the passage of this legislation through

Avocados for Elegant Eating



Potato salad, all-American favorite, goes elegant in "Sumptu-ous Salad." Cubed potatoes, diced red apple, luscious avocado halves and sour cream dressing make hearty, "he-man" eating.

halves and sour cream dressing make hearty, "ne-man" eating. Avocados are usually very firm when they come to market. Because they can be used so many ways, it's wise to buy several at a time and keep at room temperature until eating-ripe. Smooth-skinned varieties of California avocados are ready to eat when they yield to gentle pressure in the palms of your hands. To test dark, pebbly-skinned varieties, insert toothpick at stem end; if it slides in easily, the avocado's ready to serve. Cut length-wise completely around, twist halves apart gently, whack seed sharply with knife blade, twist and lift out, then strip off skin.

SUMPTUOUS SALAD

2 avocados	1 tablespoon white vinegar
Lemon juice	1/2 teaspoon sugar
1 large red apple, diced	3/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup cooked cubed potatoes	1/2 teaspoon grated onion
1 cup dairy sour cream	72 teaspoon grated onion

Cut avocados lengthwise into halves; remove seed. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Toss apple and potatoes. Blend remaining in-gredients. Place avocado halves on lettuce-lined plates. Spoon on apple-potato mixture. Top with cream dressing. Serves 4.
