Watershed Funds Are Cleared By Bureau

CHARLES BARRETT TO RECEIVE LONE STAR FARMER DEGREE

Three members of the Quitaque Future Farmers of America Chapter, will attend the State FFA Convention in Fort Worth, July 18-20, according to Bob Saul, President of the chapter. The three day meeting of representatives of over 800 FFA chapters throughout the state will include the awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization.

Members of the Quitaque chapter attending the convention are: Charles Barrett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Barrett, Bobo Morrison, son of Mr. and Mrs. Murry Morrison, and Clyde Dudley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eual Dudley. Charles will receive his Lone Star Farmer degree at this convention. Charles Barrett has also been elected by chapter members as delegate of the Quitaque Chapter to the state convention. Bobo Morrison will serve as alternate delegate.

Among the important business to be transacted at the convention will be the election of a state president from the ten state officer nominees, who have been elected by members in the ten areas of the state. Voting delegates to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City in October will be elected. In addition, delegates will elect a sweetheart from the ten candidates elected by the areas and will select the top talent team in the state.

Nearly 800 members from the 38,000 membership of the organization will receive the state's highest award, the Lone Star Farmer Degree. The membership will confer Honorary Degrees on adults who have contributed in an outstanding way to the accomplishments of the organization. A Vesper Service will be conducted on Tuesday evening, preceding the convention sessions. Lyle Carpenter, Uma, Colo. immediate past president of Future Farmers of America and Bob Murphy of Nacogdoches are among the speakers to address the 3000 farm youth convened in the Hotel Texas Grand Ballroom in Fort Worth, July 18-20.

Elmer Berryhill, Jr., Vocational Agriculture Teacher, will accompany FFA members to the Fort Worth convention.

SECOND SUMMER SESSION SET AT CLARENDON JUNIOR COLLEGE

One of the most successful summer sessions that has been staffed at Clarendon Junior College, during the past several years, will be completed July 13. The second session of the 1962 summer term will begin July 17 for students enrolling in American History, July 18 for students enrolling in Texas Government and state constitutions, and July 25 for students who wish to enroll in beginning or intermediate typing.

Classes in the courses will meet twice a week, from 7:00 to 10:00 P. M., until week of August 20 to 24. Air conditioning is available in class rooms. Each of the above courses when completed will credit the students transcript with three semester hours of college work. Students from Groom, McClean, Childress, Turkey, Quitaque, Estelline, Memphis, Wellington, Samnorwood, Flomot, and Clarendon are enrolled in the first six weeks term, and several inquiries from other districts have been received in regard to the second six weeks session.

Dean Oliver J. Abel, who is director of the summer sessions, asks that any new student who wishes to begin summer school at the start of the second summer session, please contact him at their earliest convenience.

Sponsors of the Kent Creek Watershed Program, its membership and all interested parties received the welcome news Monday that a big hurdle had been cleared in the Watershed Program.

Early Monday afternoon the Tribune received the following telegram from Washington, D. C.: "Gaston Owens,

Quitaque Tribune, Quitaque, Tex.: I have been informed by the White House that the Bureau of the Budget has cleared for transmittal to Congress \$451,000 for the Kent Creek Watershed.

The working plan was submitted to the Bureau last month and the sponsors feel that approval of the plan by Congress will come soon after the Bureau's approval.

The plan calls for seven to be built along Kent Creek. They will be located on the Jim Mayfield, Lem Weaver, Freeman Tate, J. K. Patrick, R. L. Brunson, S. C. Brown and J. B. Tiffin farms. In addition to the dams there will be eight miles of channel improvements along the watershed.

Sponsors of the project are the Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement District, The Caprock Soil Conservation District and the Hall County Conservation District and the Hall County Commissioners Court. The project will reach into Hall County.

Some of the dams along the watershed will back up enough water to form good sized lakes to add to the growing number of lakes being formed in our area.

School Integration Vote Set For July 21

Saturday, July 21, is the day that has been set for the date of the election on whether the Quitaque Independent School District will continue with the Dual System or will integrate with Frederick Douglas School.

Arguments for and against the proposal will be heard from now until the election. Mr. Johnny Mason, Superintendent of the local school system, presents the following facts for consideration by the patrons of our schools:

Several things need to be considered in the forthcoming election recently called by the Quitaque Board of Trustees to abolish the Dual System in our community. If abolished by a majority of the voters, it will mean that the students in Frederick Douglas, and

those attending high school at Childress will all attend the regular schools instead of separate schools.

One fact that needs to be considered is that we did not have enough students attending school regularly at Frederick Douglas last year. The state requires that we have at least 15 students in daily attendance in order to be allowed one teacher under the "one room school law." This of course, means that the state could cut off all funds paid to support the school if it chooses to do so. We have applied for an emergency operating permit for next year, but as yet we have not received official permission to operate the school with state aid.

Another fact is that the accredited

taxation committees who have visited our schools the past three years do not look upon our situation at the Frederick Douglas school with favor. To quote one of the officials he said, "Your colored school and its facilities are in very, very poor condition." However, they did not recommend integration, nor did they encourage us to keep the school under present conditions.

Should the state not grant us permission to retain the school, with their financial support, we would face the possibility of either losing accreditation of all our schools (which would mean that our graduates would not be accepted in any college or university) or we would have to bear the expense of operating the school from local taxation. This would mean an ap-

proximate tax increase of some 15 percent to raise at least \$8,225.

Too, due to the fact that we did not have as many white students enrolled, we also lost one white class-room teaching unit. Therefore, we are already obligated to hire one teacher out of the local fund and desperately need to hire two. The state will not give us permission to hire a white teacher-unit on an emergency basis because we do not come under the "one school-room teacher law."

Due to the financial situation of our school, the trustees felt that the decision should be left to the people as to whether to abolish the dual system or perhaps raise taxes again this year some 15 percent. That decision will be made by you at the polls on July 21, 1962. Please vote!

IN AUTO CRASH HAD CONNECTION
WITH LOCAL PEOPLE**

gan, who was to be married in
Beaver Sunday, were killed in the
crash.

Rep. Karnes died in Beaver
County Memorial Hospital one
hour after the 6:30 p.m. accident.
He suffered head and chest injur-
ies.

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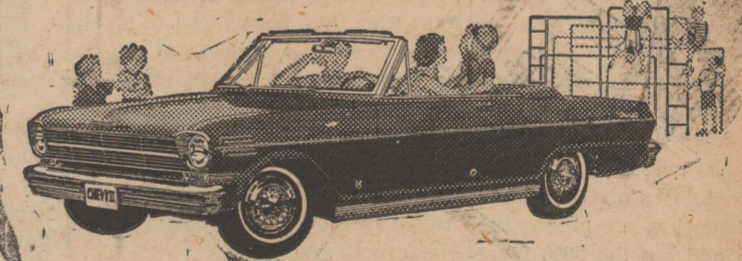

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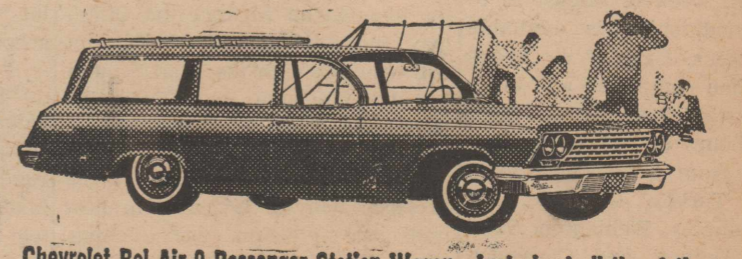

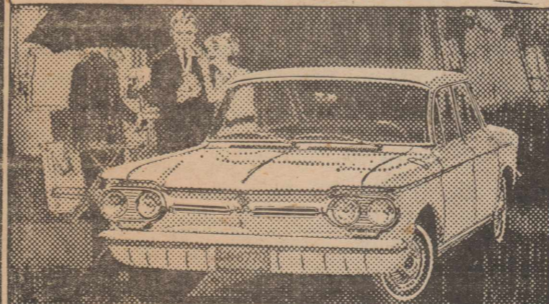

The mother of the bride wore a coral dress with beige accessories, and the groom's mother wore a beige dress with white accessories.

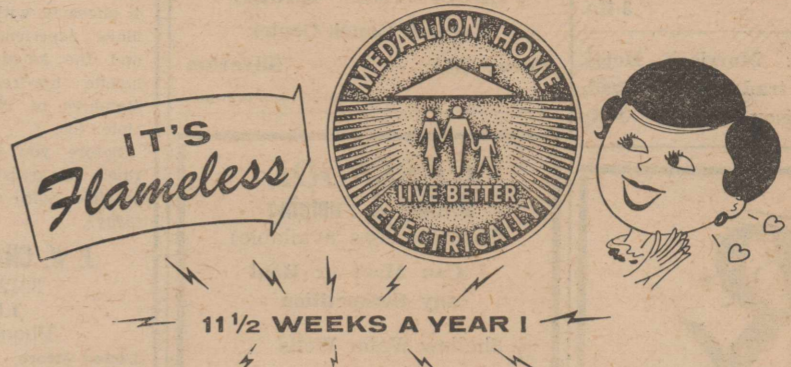

FERTILIZER GOOD BUY
 Many farmers and ranchmen who are looking for a good buy in production items are finding it in fertilizers. The use of this item of production is one of the best ways to reduce per unit production costs and increase net in-

come, says Cecil Parker, extension farm management specialist. The price of fertilizer did not increase during the period from 1951 to 1960. But, during the same period, wages for hired farm labor increased 34 percent, farm machinery costs increased 29 percent and real estate taxes 62 percent, added Parker.
 Texas farmers and ranchers are realizing that fertilizer is a good buy because they increased the amount purchased during this period 23 percent, and there is room for additional increases in fertilizer use.
 In considering the use of additional fertilizer, a soil test should be made. A soil test will tell the amount of additional plant nutrients required for a given level of production. Also, it indicates the proper balance between plant nutrients for optimum growth and yields.
 The form of fertilizer from which the recommended plant nutrients are obtained will have some influence on their price. Study the various forms and analyses in order to save on fertilizer costs but be sure to buy the kind and amount needed and don't just buy fertilizer, explains the specialist. To determine just how good a buy fertilizer is on your farm, be sure to leave a check plot, recommends Parker.
 Local county agents can supply information on fertilizers and assist in planning a fertilizer program for your farm or ranch, advises Parker.
