Upper Red River Flood Control and Irrigation Dist. Board Met Here

Monty Stephens was taken to Lockney General Hospital last Thursday, suffering from a virus infection. He returned home Monday about noon. He is improved, but will have to be quiet and rest.

A meeting was held here last week in the Community Room of the First National Bank of the Board of Directors of the Upper Red River Flood Control and Irrigation District and Government officers to discuss plans for possible dam on the Upper Red River.

The committee is a three-county committee with membership from Briscoe, Hall and Childress counties. Members of the board are O. E. Bevers of Lakeview, C. C. Broughton of Childress, Carl Hill of Parnell, Arville Setliff of Turkey and O. R. Stark of Quitaque. Others present at the meeting were State Representative Bill Headley of Childress and Mr. John Thompson and Mr. I. C. Douglas, both from the State Bureau of Reclamation.

The Bureau of Reclamation has spent considerable time surveying for possible sites for dams, the flood damage along Red River, extent of pollution and other phases of the considered program.

There is a possibility that a dam will be built under a program of Pollution, Flood Control, Irrigation and Recreation. One tentative site mentioned is on Prairie Dog Fork of Red River north of Turkey. A dam there would back water up some 18 miles and would cover about 4000 acres of land. This would mean that the lake would extend back west about even with Quitaque. Several other sites were mentioned, also.

Daulton R. Martin, fireman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Martin of Silvertown, is aboard the anti-submarine warfare support aircraft carrier USS Hornet which has joined the powerful Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

The ship is on a routine overseas deployment and will participate in training exercises and good will visits while in the Far East.

The Hornet heads the most modern hunter killer group to serve in the area, and with her improved capabilities to strengthen the anti-submarine warfare of the Seventh Fleet.

New and improved aircraft account for the largest improvement in the hunter-killer group. These aircraft are making their first appearance in the Western Pacific with the Hornet. They are the Sikorsky "Sea King" gas turbine-powered helicopter and the Grumman S2F-3 "Tractor," the latest version of this fixed-wing aircraft.

-VOTERS ATTENTION-

In this issue of the Tribune there appears the full text of five of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 6). So that you may be fully informed, we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows:

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 25) - Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 9) - Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 22) - Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 46) - Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 51) - Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36) - Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 13) - Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Results from flame cultivation control of weeds will be viewed and explained during tours at the High Plains Research Foundation on Friday afternoon, August 10 at the Foundation's research farm at Halfway, Texas, located 14 miles west of Plainview. The Texas Butane Dealers Association sponsor the tours.

The tours will start at 1:30 P. M. from the headquarters building and close at 4 P. M. with an experience exchange conference in which farmers using flame cultivation will join a panel of scientists and professional flame cultivation experts in reviewing progress in this new field of farm economy practices.

Tractor drawn wagons will transport the visitors on the tours. Stops will be made throughout the 310 acre farm where the results of flaming will be shown on corn, grain sorghum, castorbeans, soybeans, sesame, peanuts, cotton, sugar beets, blackeyed peas, and green beans.

A demonstration of the use of flame cultivation equipment will be held with cotton. Included will be cotton planted June 21 and July 17, to show the results of early flaming. Cotton planted on May 24 will also be flamed.

The tour will close with an exhibit of flame cultivation at the Halfway Community Grounds. The critique will be held at 4 P. M. on the spacious lawn around the Killgore Memorial Building and Jim Hill Greenhouse.

Members of the Board of Trustees headed by Host Committee Chairman, Claud Fargason, Halfway, will show visitors through the new facilities while others are on tour.

SAVINGS BOND DIRECTOR WARNS AGAINST CHAIN LETTERS

The U. S. Treasury's State Savings Bonds Director, J. L. Adams, cautioned Texans about becoming involved in chain letters or similar schemes.

He stated that the Treasury Department disapproves of the use of Savings Bonds and Savings Stamps as prizes or awards in lotteries or games of chance involving the element of personal profit. "This has been a policy of long standing," he pointed out. The Treasury has no objection, however, to the use of Savings Bonds and Stamps in contests of knowledge or skill, such as quiz programs and athletic events.

What prompted Adams' words of caution were reports of a resurgence of chain letters involving the use of the U. S. Savings Bonds. Wherever the plan has been started in a town, banks have reported a quick depletion of the \$25.00 and \$50.00 Savings Bonds used. Adams pointed out that the Treas-

ury's objection is based upon consideration of public policy and in no way involves the legality or illegality of this or any device or method employed.

"The purchase and distribution of Savings Bonds through the so-called 'chain-letter' arrangement, which has been brought to my attention by personal inquiries to the Treasury Department, is contrary to the policy of the Treasury's intended purpose for which such Savings Bonds are sold by the Government.

"United States Savings Bonds are issued by the Treasury to permit our citizens to invest in securities of the Government and through their savings put aside regularly something for future use and benefit. It is my understanding that this present scheme serves no such purpose."

Adams would still like to see Savings Bonds purchased by thousands of Texans in every bank; however, he wants them to be purchased for themselves and their loved ones as "gifts today for a brighter tomorrow."

SAVINGS BOND REPORT

Savings Bond sales in Texas for the first 6 months of 1962 totaled \$76,720,875 which represents 102.3 percent of the 75 million dollar Freedom Bond Drive goal for Texas. June bond sales in Texas were \$11,489,268.

These figures were reported recently by Mr. Perry Whittemore, Chairman of Briscoe County Savings Bonds Committee. Mr. Whittemore also reported that bond sales in Briscoe County were \$80,857 for the first 6 months of the year. This figure represents 101.1 percent of the 1962 sales goal.

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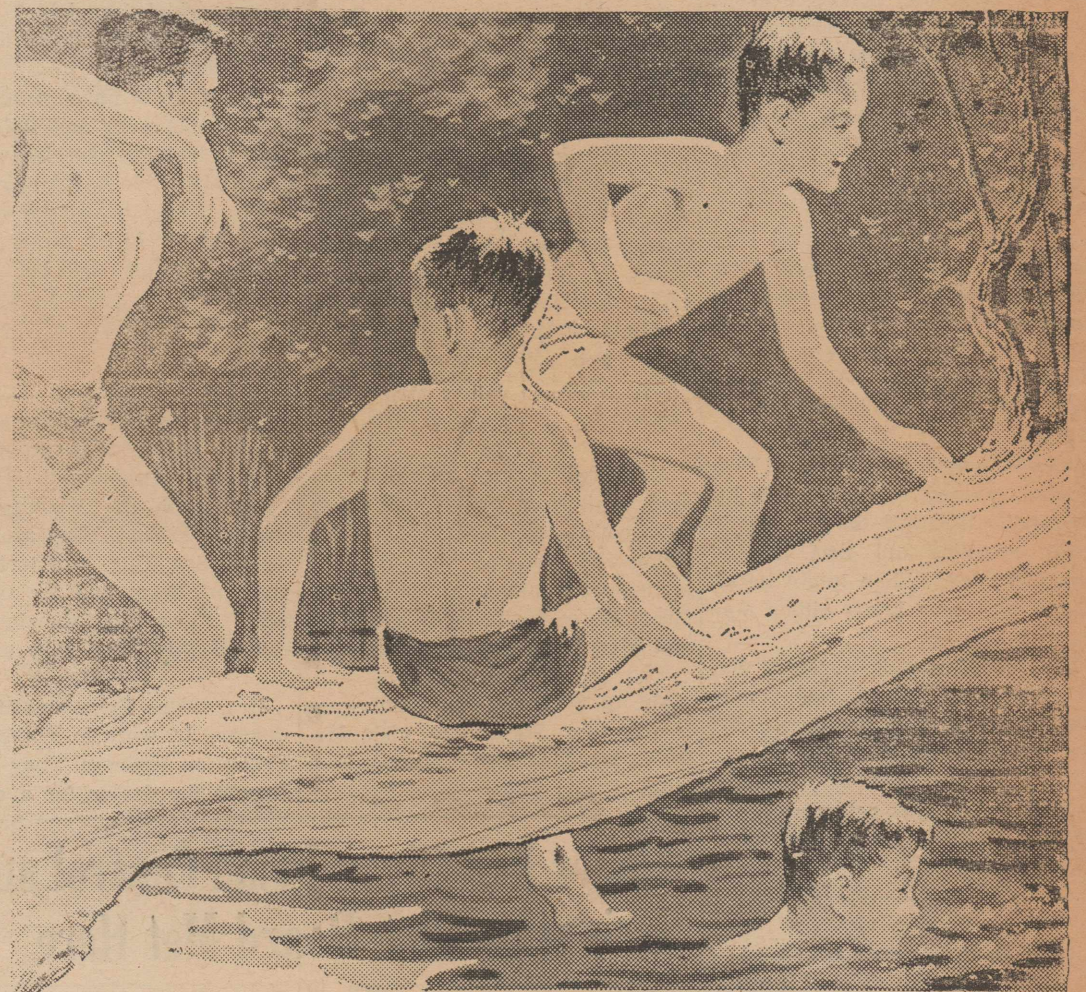
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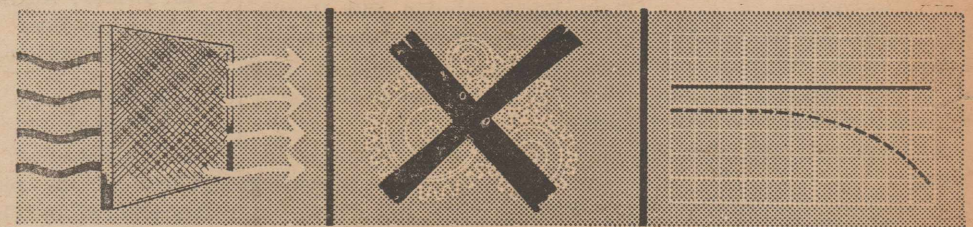

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, to its employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions of this State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions of this State."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; providing for the districting of any included city, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or severally owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district. If same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less

than all the territory thereof is included within the district's boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed five cents (5c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within the district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall not become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any district appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

"Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution so as to provide that state employees may be employed in an advisory capacity or appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with other agencies of this state, or any political subdivision thereof, and of the Federal Government, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this state shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this state or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing or paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps,

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting state employees to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency, or any political subdivision thereof, or the Federal Government, if approved by administrative head or governing board of such employee and there is no conflict of interest."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Section (b) of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

FARMERS UNION SEEKS "YES" VOTE IN WHEAT REFERENDUM
(The following story was taken from the National Union Farmer, national newspaper of the Farmers Union.)
For nine consecutive years the National Farmers Union, the state unions, affiliated local and regional Farmers Union co-operatives in the Great Plains Region, have given leadership and financial assistance to national information campaigns which have led farmers to vote favorably for wheat marketing quotas.

Despite the uncertain status of farm legislation by reason of the defeat of the Administration's farm bill, which may return the wheat farmer to the programs of the 1950's, we believe we have an even greater obligation to actively participate in the 1962 wheat referendum campaign.
At the moment, we are aware of the disappointment of farm

prove quotas. In reality, this would be a choice between \$1.82 a bushel, based on a 55-million acre national allotment, or one dollar or even less for wheat if quotas are rejected.

It is our hope that Congress will extend the present wheat program for 1963 on a temporary basis, with people over the failure of Congress to improve their economic outlook. We are also fully aware that the choices are far from the necessary of expected economic levels to which wheat farmers are entitled. Nevertheless, the choice is between reasonable controls and minimum economic floors or no controls and economic disaster.
Without any further farm legislation, wheat farmers would have a choice between \$1.82 a bushel and 50 percent of parity, provided they abide by acreage allotments should fewer than two-thirds of them ap-

or without minor changes, so the choice would be \$2 a bushel, based on a 49.5 million acre national allotment, or less than a dollar for wheat with no allotment.
