



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

Taxes All of the talk in recent days about taxes and the chance for a tax cut bring to my mind the need

for some substantial tax revision. I feel that under the present tax laws many inequities could be erased by some quick amendments. Any tax law, like any other type of law, is subject to human errors. It is only after administration of the law begins that many of the unseen errors become obvious.

As an example, let me cite the case of a young man who was supporting his several sisters and also his mother. The father had absented himself and completely failly. Hence, the mother and the sevsustenance.


