



Mayfield installed level closed end terraces below the diversion. Jim Stroup installed two graded diversions to take care of outside water and stop erosion. The diversions empty on to native grass where the excess water is beneficial. He was able to install a terrac system below these diversions.

John Minarik installed a channe ype diversion to control outside vater from pasture land and county road. This diversion gives protection to an irrigated field be-

NOTES FROM THE MEMPHIS COTTON CLASSING OFFICE

With more favorable harvesting weather this past week, sample receipts increased over the previ-

kel of the Memphis, Texas Cotton Classing Office. A further increase is expected this week as the earlier defoliated cotton is being har-

About 5,000 samples were classed this past week compared with Chili Beans — Yams — Corn bread app. 11,000 during the same week a year ago. Total samples classed to date amounted to 9,082 against 27,029 last year as of the same date. This reflects the lateness of the crop this season.

The quality of cotton classed this past week showed a slight decrease in the white grades, with app. 17% in this catagory compared with 24% last week. 74% graded light spotted; 5% spotted and 4% other grades

The staple length ranged from 13 /16 inch to 13 /32 inches. The predominant grade and staple length was Mid Lt spotted, 15 /16 in-

Micronaire readings showed sharp improvement with only 5% classed as Wasty, compared with 9% a week earlier. Other readings were: 7% 2.7 and 2.9; 17% 3.0 and 3.4; and 71% read 3.5 and higher. Buyers are becoming more inerested in local production, chiefly, because of the improvement in micronaire readings, it was report-

Average prices paid to farmers on some of the grades that moved into trade channels, based on uncompressed cotton in the warehouse were: SM LT SP 15 /16, 30.-36; M LT SP 15/16, 30.12; M LT SP 31/32, 30.51. Wasty cotton was bringing 200 to 400 points of loan

What Is Wasty Cotton?

Wasty cotton may be defined as generally is penalized from two to our cents a pound as compared with sound fibered cotton of the same staple length. The misconception exists that wasty cotton prevails only with the shorter staple engths and lower grades, but this
