Basketball Teams Are Playing At Kress

The annual Kress Basketball Tournament gets underway Thursday afternoon at 2 P. M. with the Silverton Owlettes and the Tulia B Hornets kicking the lid off the activities.

Both the Pantherettes and the Panthers of Quitaque High are entered in the tourney and both teams will see action Thursday afternoon and early evening. The Panthers get into action first, going against Hart at 4:40 P. M. and the Pantherettes also going against Hart at 6 o'clock. If the Quitaque teams are winners of their first outing they will advance to the semi-finals on Friday, with game time at 6 P. M. for the Panthers and 7:20 for the Pantherettes. Their opponents would be the winners of the Kress B vs. Nazareth games.

Just before going to press it was learned that both the Pantherettes and Panthers took opening round victories at Kress. The Pantherettes won 37-25 and the Panthers took their game by a 47-35 margin. Both teams played Hart.

If the Quitaque teams lose Thursday, they will enter the consolation bracket and will not play again until Saturday morning.

Eight teams are entered in the tourney in both the boys and girls division. In addition to Quitaque, teams entered are Kress A and B, Turkey, Silverton, Tulia B, Nazareth and Hart.

Tournament favorites are not known to The Tribune, but the Silverton girls team will probably be strong again since they have several holdovers from last year's team.

The Panthers, in spite of having won only two games this season, probably stand a good chance of walking off with top honors in the boys division.

Improvements Are Slated For Highway 86

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$205,900.00 for highway safety and betterment in Briscoe County during 1963, announced District Highway Engineer Palmer Massey of Childress.

He said a total of 5.4 highway miles in the county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of O. V. Johnson, Senior Resident Engineer, of Quitaque.

The work is part of the 1963 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program just authorized by the Highway Commission.

Under this program, a total of 2,369 miles of U. S. and State highways will be improved. Work will be done on 356 projects in 164 counties. State-wide cost will be about \$20,640,000.

Purpose of the annual program is to continue the improvement and modernization of U. S. and State highways and for increased safety and convenience of travel.

District Engineer Massey said the following improvement project will take place in this county: State Highway 86 from Quitaque to the top of the Caprock. Widen recondition and resurface.

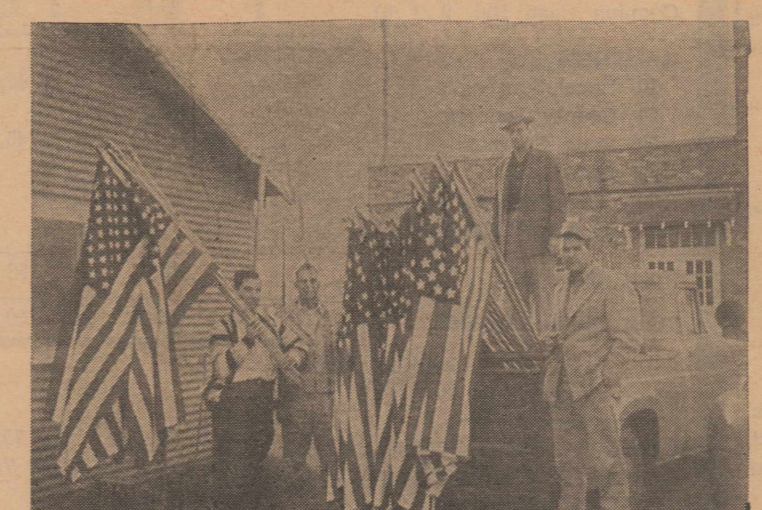
New Arrivals

HARVEST STALLED ONCE AGAIN

FLOMOT SCHOOL ENROLLED IN TRAFFIC SAFETY PROGRAM

The National Commission on Safety Education of the National Education Association announced today that the Flomot School System has been enrolled in the 1962-63 National Student Traffic Safety Program. The program is sponsored by the Commission and supported by grants from the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company and the Ford Fund. The program is entering its fifth year according to Supt. Barron.

The program is designed to help school students plan activities that will increase the safety of their schools and communities. The Commission prepares and distributes materials that serve to guide students in their planning and suggest appropriate activities. Examples of activities conducted last year include supervision of driving and parking on school property, safety checks of student and faculty cars, surveys of traffic hazards and congestion, dramatizations for student assemblies, and bulletin board displays.

Schools enrolled in the Program submit reports of their activities in the spring. In each state a team of educators reviews the summary reports and makes recommendations for the awarding of certificates and plaques.

Last year the local elevator received 75 carloads of grain and Setliff expects this year's crop to yield around 70 carloads.

HIGHWAY PATROL REPORT FOR MONTH OF OCTOBER

The Highway Patrol investigated 1 rural accident in Briscoe County during the month according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

This wreck accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$500.00.

The rural accident summary for Briscoe County from January through October of 1962 shows a total of 22 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 2 persons killed and 14 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$13,480.00.

We are on the threshold of November and December which signals the start of our Holiday season and the cold grim "Traffic Facts." During the last five years there has been a total of 11,902 traffic fatalities in Texas. Of this total, 2,354 or 20 percent were killed during the months of November and December. For the year thus far there has been 1,841 traffic fatalities as compared to 1,766 for the same period of 1961, an increase of

75 or 4 percent with deadly December yet to come.

"These cold grim traffic facts alone are a challenge for every responsible citizen throughout this state to join in an all out effort to stop this needless tragedy this Holiday Season.

This can be done by obeying all traffic laws and being a defensive driver; that is, be prepared for the unpredictable actions of the other driver," stated the veteran Patrol Supervisor.

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DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY ADVISES MOTORISTS TO WINTERIZE DRIVING ATTITUDE

"Winterize your driving attitude" is the advice handed Texans today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

Musick, quibbled on how motorists can best prepare for the hazards of winter driving, said staying out of trouble in traffic often depends on the driver's attitude.

"This is especially true of winter driving. While winter driving demands more skill, it takes a greater amount of patience," Musick said.

The safety director who is of the school that "accidents don't just happen, they are caused" said the driver who loses his temper in traffic is "asking for it."

He labels speeders and tailgaters as the safety offenders that are the most likely to cause trouble in traffic during bad weather.

"These drivers are so anxious to get ahead of the next fellow, they do not even stop to consider the existing conditions," he added.

"What they fail to recognize is that while they are growling about 'the way the other guy drives,' they forget how to drive safely themselves."

Musick said another key to safe and skillful driving during bad weather is keeping a proper speed at all times so you can avoid sudden stops and starts.

"Look ahead and watch your speed so that when a traffic situation requires slowing down or turning, you can do so gradually," he continued.

"Apply brakes gently - not hard enough to slide the wheels. Use the gas pedal lightly. At the first sign of a rear wheel spin, ease off the gas."

He also said that following distances should be increased.

"Stopping distances are much longer on slippery surfaces. If the driver ahead makes a sudden stop on dry pavement you may have to stop on an icy surface. Be prepared for such circumstances."

Among other things Musick advises motorists to do for safe driving in bad weather is to keep automobile windows clean and clear for good visibility.

"Be sure wiper blades are in good condition and arm pressure is adequate. Replace blades if they streak and make sure your defroster will clear away fogging and ice" he said.

Musick emphasized that now is the time to give motor vehicles a good safety check for winter.

"Tires should have enough tread left for good traction, particularly in snow, and brakes should be adjusted with linings free of grease and dirt."

He warned that a rusty, leaking muffler or exhaust pipe can be a carbon monoxide hazard, especially if an automobile is held up in traffic or stalled in bad weather.

"Seepage of gas into a car is more likely to occur when the engine is running and the car is standing still. A car idling in a garage can produce enough carbon monoxide to make the air deadly in a few minutes," he explained.

"Motorists should get plenty of fresh air when driving and should keep in mind that carbon monoxide poisoning can make a person helpless before he realizes he is affected."

The director said safety experts highly endorse the use of automobile seat belts at all times, but point out they are of added value when driving on rain slick or icy roads.

Why all the talk now about ice and snow in Texas?

Musick says anyone who has lived in Texas a couple of winters, can answer that question.

"In Texas, we enjoy many Indian summer days, but it doesn't take an old timer or a meteorologist to know that a Texas-size 'blue norther' can blow in any time and tie up plenty of traffic. Especially in Texas, a driver has to be prepared for sudden changes in weather," he concluded.

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGER'S WASHINGTON REPORT THE FARM DECLINE

Some revealing facts were made public recently by the Department of Agriculture. They were the statistics that have been developed with relation to the change that is taking place in rural America.

The farm population, as such, has been declining for a number of years. Some have said that this is a natural transition and nothing to be alarmed about. Perhaps their analysis is correct, but I have always felt that one of the basic strongholds of America and our philosophy of life has been the family-size farm. Not alone because it constitutes the hallmark of independence and free enterprise and produces the food and fiber necessary to sustain its occupants, but more so because of the character, integrity, and understanding that it instills in the boys and girls there brought up. Big cities are fine, but to me the real strength of our nation has always been in the small towns and rural communities where people know each other and one another's problems. It is in these areas that one knows and better understands the workings of nature and the responsibilities that each human being must assume in being as self-sufficient as possible and in lending assistance to others in temporary need.

It seems to me that history records congested areas as fertile fields for socialism, communism, and other ideologies contrary to individualism. Perhaps I am in error, but I think not. If I am correct, and I think history will bear me out, our responsibility would seem to be to curtail the off-farm migration, and to take such measures as necessary to keep the population spread out; to avoid congestion of human beings and the resulting demands for socialistic practices and measures.

The report to which I refer reflects that there are only five states presently relying on farming for 15 percent or more of their employment.

In 1860, there were 31 million people in the United States. Today, there are 189 million. Yet, the farm labor force is no larger now than it was 100 years ago in 1860. Fifty percent of the nation's remaining farms are too small to provide an adequate living for the people living on them. Since 1944 the farm population has decreased from 18 percent of the total population to 11 percent. While the total population increased during that period by some 50 million persons, the farm population decreased by some 5 million.

It might be noted that there is a difference between farm America and rural America. There are many people presently living in rural areas who are not farming. In fact, there is a total of 5.5 million skilled and semi-skilled blue collar workers living in rural areas, compared with 3.5 million farmers and farm workers. In this connection, it might be pointed out that many of the non-farm rural inhabitants live in close proximity to metropolitan areas in which they find employment. The statistics show a total of 999 counties in this country having no town with more than 2,500 people, and 1,196 counties having no town larger than 10,000. Hence, being a rural American does not by any means refer to a farmer or farm worker. A great number of those counted in the rural population and actually residing in close proximity to the metropolitan areas contribute to the congestion that continues to breed demands for government welfare programs that could prove much more costly than farm programs.

This year marks the hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Morrill Act, which led to the establishment of land grant colleges such as Texas A&M College.
