## FLOMOT SCHOOLS HAVE 94.2 AVERAGE DAILY ATTENDANCE FOR FIRST SEMESTER

The record department of Flomot School announced a much higher attendance for the first semester if the 1962-63 school year than in the past three years. It was equalled in 1958-59, but it is necessary to go back to 1955-56's 97 average daily attendance to find a higher one. This is an increase of nearly 31 percent over the attendance of last year.

Douglas Gowin, 9 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Gowin is in the Swisher County Hospital at Tulia suffering with a broken leg, sustained last Saturday morning about 8:30 when he was run over by a tractor. The leg was broken just above the knee.

Douglas was riding on the tractor driven by his grandfather, Charles Gowin. They were returning a trailer that had been borrowed from E. J. Hamilton and they were at the Hamilton house when the accident happened. Douglas had jumped off the tractor to open a gate when he apparently fell in front of the tractor, the large wheel rolling over his right leg. The trailer passed over Douglas but it was not known whether the wheels actually rolled over him or not.

Douglas' mother, Mrs. Jay Gowin, was away from their house in their car at the time of the accident and Mrs. Charles Gowin had gone to Lubbock early that morning in their car, leaving only a pickup available at the Gowin's homes. Douglas was placed in the E. J. Hamilton automobile and Mr. Hamilton rushed him to Tulia. No injuries were found, other than the broken leg, although Douglas did have bruises and skinned places on his back.

His leg was placed in traction at the hospital and doctors said that Douglas would probably have to stay in the hospital from four to six weeks, according to Jay Gowin, the boy's father.

The unfortunate accident, serious as it was, might have been fatal had the tractor run over the boy's head or chest.

## PANTHERS TOP LAKEVIEW TO CINCH FIRST PLACE IN DISTRICT ROUND - ROBIN PLAYOFFS

Quitaque's High School Panthers have cinched the top spot in the round robin part of the District 10-B basketball race. The Panthers have one more game to play but will still be in the top spot, even if Matador pulled the upset of the year Friday night and knocked the Panthers off. This is very unlikely to happen, however.

The local teams drove over to Estelline last Friday night and both teams brought home Bear-cub scalps, although neither team was very impressive in winning.

The Pantherettes win was a real weird-o affair and for a half, one of almost utter frustration, causing all sorts of wisecracks from the fans, in addition to a lot of anxiety on the part of both Quitaque and Estelline. The trouble stemmed from the fact that neither side could make a point. Janice Dudley, one of the regular Pantherettes starting forwards, was sidelined with an injured leg, but the other forwards, Jennifer Whittington, Freda Reagan and Judy Colvin, had shown that they could score, but not so Friday night. Both teams shot, shot, and shot, the score at the end of the first period of play — 2-0 in favor of Estelline. More of the same all through the second period. Score at half time, 5-2, still in favor of Estelline. None of the Pantherettes starting forwards scored a point.

Reserve forward Deborah McKay made the only field goal for the Quitaque team. The third quarter started off much the same way but Coach King sent in another reserve forward, Charlotte McKay and switched Chlonez Woods from guard to forward and found the winning combination, who went on to score a 29-14 victory.

Chlonez once again demonstrated that she is one of the most versatile feminine athletes to ever grace the hardwoods here. Playing less than two quarters at forward she racked up 19 points to spark the Pantherettes to the win. Charlotte McKay added 6 points and Deborah McKay 4 to round out the scoring for the Pantherettes.

The Panthers caught a fired-up crew of Bearcubs that were out to win over the favored Quitaque team and had to fight for their lives before downing Estelline 42-39 in a rough, loosely-called ball game.

Quitaque scored first, then made it 4-0 before the Bearcubs got on the scoreboard. The Bearcubs kept

pressing however, and tied the count at 6-6 and went on to lead 11-7 at the end of the first period. The Estelline lads, sensing a possible victory, kept pushing the Panthers and increased their lead to eight points, 18-10 during the second quarter of play. The Panthers refused to fold and battled back to lead 19-18 at halftime. Quitaque managed to hold a one-point edge at the three quarter mark, leading 26-25. The Panthers rallied at the start of the fourth quarter and pulled away to a 7 point lead but the Bearcubs kept firing away and almost caught up again, pulling to within 2 points a couple of times, but could never quite make it.

The Panthers once again did a good job of stopping Teddy Barnes, the Cubs high scoring ace, who managed only 19 points for the night. Most of his scoring came in the second half of the game. He was held to 5 points during the first half.

Jim Saul led the scorers for the Panthers with 13 points. Jack Johnson who suffered one of the coldest nights of his career, managed to chalk up only 10 points, all on field goals. Terry Woods made 8 points, Phil Barefield 6, Cappy Wise had a total of 4 and Bobo Morrison made a single free toss to round out the scoring.

Tuesday night the local teams hosted the Lakeview High teams and split with them, the girls losing 34-52. The Panthers took an easy 88-43 win over the Eagles, the reserves playing more than half the game.

The Pantherette forwards are still crippled and again were not too effective and Coach King had to call on the reserves and once again had to switch Chlonez Woods to forward to light the fire.

She tossed in 14 points to lead the Pantherettes. Charlotte McKay, who has a very nice hook shot with either hand, dropped in 10 points. Janice Dudley, who played only briefly, added 5 points to the total. Freda Reagan 3, and Deborah McKay 2. The Eaglettes Payne captured scoring honors for the evening with 22. Tuesday night's loss leaves the Pantherettes at 4 wins and 3 losses in district play and have Matador left.

The Panthers were hitting on all twelve, so to speak, in their game, that being the number of Panthers who saw action. The starting five, Jack Johnson, Jim Saul, Bobo Mor-

rison, Terry Woods, and Cappy Wise, played about 12 minutes and left the game with a 44-16 margin. Scoring-wise, the change did not make much difference, since the other seven players made almost as many points and held the Eagles in check at the same time. The final tally in the game was 88-43.

Warren Lee Merrell led the scoring parade for the Panthers with 13 tallies.

The local teams journey to Matador Friday night to wind up the round robin portion of the district playoff. The Panthers will wind up in first place regardless of the outcome of the game, as will the Matador girls.

Next Tuesday night will mark the final home game of the season for the Pantherettes and Panthers when they host the Happy High teams in the final regular games of the season. The Panthers won over the Cowboys in an earlier game while the Pantherettes took a beating. When the Panthers won over the Cowboys, the Happy lads had just wound up their football season and since that time have been coming right along and will probably give the Panthers a real stiff test. The Cowgirls have been enjoying a good season and will be tough to handle.

Next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, February 14, 15, 16, the boys District Tournament will be played at Lakeview, with the girls' tournament to be played a week later this year, also at Lakeview. At present we had not received a bracket as to the tournament schedule. Last year, however, the team in first place did not have to play Thursday and Supt. Mason said that he felt sure the same schedule would be followed this year, and since the Panthers are in first place they probably will not have a game until sometime Friday.

## COMPLETE ELECTRICAL SERVICE OFFERED BY FULTON ELECTRIC

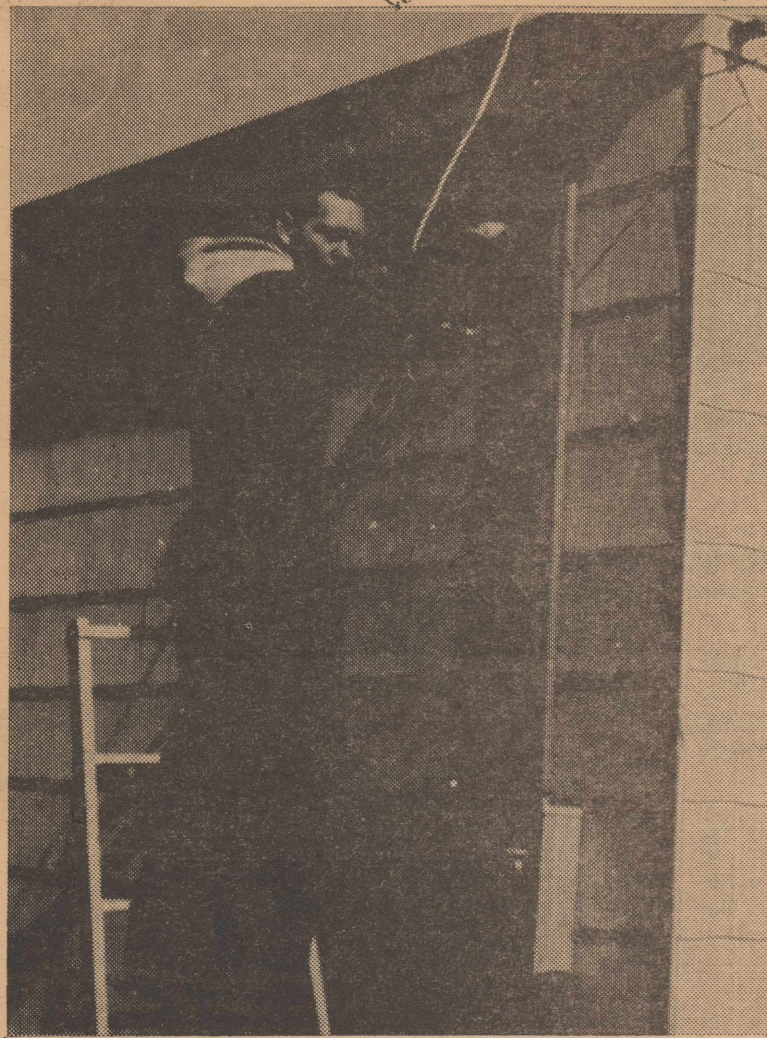


John Fulton is pictured before his service truck that's always loaded with equipment and supplies for installation or repair work when its needed anywhere in the

Fulton's business consists of many services . . . electrical contracting for both residential, commercial and business. The business also provides installation of heating and cooling systems, appliance repair and refrigeration installation and repair service. All of it together is a full time job.

Not only is he known for his work in and around Quitaque, but Fulton is also known for his efforts on behalf of his community through work in various civic organizations and through his church.
