FUNERAL SERVICES FOR E. J. FARLEY HELD LAST WEEK IN FARMINGTON

Funeral services were held February 13, at 2:00 P. M. in the Cope Mortuary Chapel, Farmington, N. M. for Mr. Edgar Jackson Farley, a former resident of Quitaque.

Mr. Farley died Saturday, Feb. 9 at 11:00 P. M. in the Mercy Hospital in Durango, Colo. following a heart attack. He was 66 years of age.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Quitaque.

Officiating at the services was the Rev. Pryor of Highland Baptist Church, Farmington.

Edgar Jackson Farley was born October 16, 1896 and was married to Emmer Pearl Lingo, April 18, 1920 at Nashville, Ark. This union was blessed with 12 children, all of whom survive him. The Farleys moved their family from Nashville, Ark. to Quitaque in September of 1947, living here until 1957 when they moved to Kirtland, N. M., where he resided until his death.

Survivors include his wife of the home; eight sons and four daughters; Edgar Farley, Jr. Shirley and Wayne Farley of the home; Ethel Osborne of Gallup, N. M.; Francis Lingo and Glen Farley of Aztec, N. M.; Eugene, Odell and James, all of Farmington, N. M.; Pvt. Billy M. Farley, an M. P., stationed at Fort Bragg, N. C.; Mrs. Louise Chandler and Wendell Farley of Quitaque; 20 grandchildren; three brothers, Guy Farley, Springfield, La., Knox Farley of Fort Worth and C. R. Farley of Turkey. All of the above survivors, plus an nephew, Alger Farley and his son of Lubbock were present for the funeral services. One sister and three half-sisters also survive but could not be present. Interment was in Memory Gardens at Farmington, N. M. under the direction of Cope Mortuary.

The Longhorns were taller but Joe Jacobs hustled and did a fine job of rebounding to spark the Panthers. All five of the starters got in on the scoring with Monte Stephens hitting 7, followed by Diae Ramsey with 4, Lupe Leal 3, Ervin Phillips 3 and Joe Jacobs 2.

In the boys second game they defeated the Silverton Owls by a score of 29-24. The Quitaque lads pulled out in front during the first quarter and kept their lead till the end of the game. The Panthers played real fine defense to come out winner. Once again all five starters got in the scoring column as follows: Monte Stephens 9, Ervin Phillips 7, Joe Jacobs 6, Lupe Leal 6, and Dale Ramsey 1.

CAPROCK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION EVANGELISM CONFERENCE TO BE HELD AT CROSBYTON

Dr. C. E. Autrey, Chairman of Evangelism, Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, of Dallas, will be the featured speaker at the Caprock Baptist Association Evangelism Conference to be held at First Baptist Church in Crosbyton on Thursday, February 28, 1963.

Dr. Autrey has traveled, held evangelistic conferences and preached in churches in Japan, Formosa, Hong Kong, the Philippines, in England, Finland, Germany, Italy, Lebanon, Jordan and Jerusalem, and in many other places in Israel, including Nazareth. He has written four books, "Revivals of the Old Testament", "Basic Evangelism," "You Can Win Souls," and "Evangelistic Sermons," all of which are textbooks at Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, and one of which is being used in the Baptist Seminary in Beirut, Lebanon.

Dr. Autrey is a graduate of Louisiana College and of New Orleans Seminary, holding the Bachelor of Arts and Doctor of Divinity Degrees from Louisiana College and Master of Theology and Doctor of Theology Degrees from New Orleans Seminary.

The Quitaque Panthers, defending champions of District 10-B, are still champions of 10-B, taking a 59-40 win over Matador in the District final game at Lakeview last Saturday night. Estelline took third place in the district tournney by downing Lakeview 53-28.

Lakeview won over Flomot on Thursday night to advance to the second round of play and Matador defeated Turkey that same night. Quitaque and Estelline drew bytes into the second round and were heavily favored to meet in the finals Saturday night. Matador had other notions, however, and upset Estelline 49-45 in a double overtime thriller on Friday night. Earlier in the evening Quitaque had taken a 103-33 win over Lakeview to advance to the finals against Matador.

The Panthers were hot Friday night in hitting the hundred point total for the first time this season. The Quitaque lads owned a 31-7 lead at the end of the first period, increased it to 60-20 at half time, with the reserves playing part-time in the second quarter. At the end of the third quarter Quitaque led 85-27. The reserves played most of the fourth period. They were flirting with the 100 mark but it became apparent that they were not going to make it Coach King let his starters go back in and finish out the game.

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The Matadors were ready for Estelline and apparently caught the Cubs looking ahead to the Saturday night game against Quitaque. The Matadors were all hitting and ran up a 15-2 first quarter lead against Estelline. The Cubs took up just a bit of the slack in the second period, trailing 15-24 at half time. Estelline battled to a 31-31 tie as the third quarter ended. Estelline was having foul-trouble and with four minutes left in the game the Cubs lost Teddy Barnes via 5 fouls. The Matadors were trailing 33-36 when Barnes fouled out but rallied to tie the count at 36-36. The score was knotted again at 39-39 and at the end of regular playing time the score was 41-41. In the first three minute overtime both teams managed to score a single field goal each to remain tied 43-43. During the second 3-minute overtime Matador scored six points and Estelline managed only two, the final tally being 49-45. Estelline lost four of their starters to fouls. Barnes was high point man in the contest with 22 points. In the game against Lakeview Saturday night Barnes scored 41 points. Jack Johnson was top point maker for the Panthers in the tournney, hitting for 33 points against Lakeview and 19 in the finals against Matador.

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Bi-district Game Tuesday

Tuesday night, February 26, the Panthers play Hedley for the Bi-District championship and the right to advance to the regional tournament to be held at Canyon next Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Officials of the Quitaque and Hedley schools met in Memphis Monday afternoon to pick a time and place to play the bi-district game. The choices were narrowed down to Silverton and Clarendon and in the coin toss, Quitaque won. Game time will be 8:00.

Tonight (Thursday) at 7:30, the Panthers will play a non-conference practice game with Farwell in the Plainview High School gym. The Farwell team, a Class A school is coached by Bill Mayfield. They are champions of their own district. Local fans are urged to go along and root for the Panthers. Tuesday night's game means nothing more than a practice game and the satisfaction of winning. Tuesday night's game is for keeps — the Panthers will win the right to go to Canyon and defend their region title or they will wind up a successful season. Either way, to Coach King and all of the squad the entire town and community congratulate you on winning district. We wish you good luck against Hedley and then at Regional. You have the team to do it.

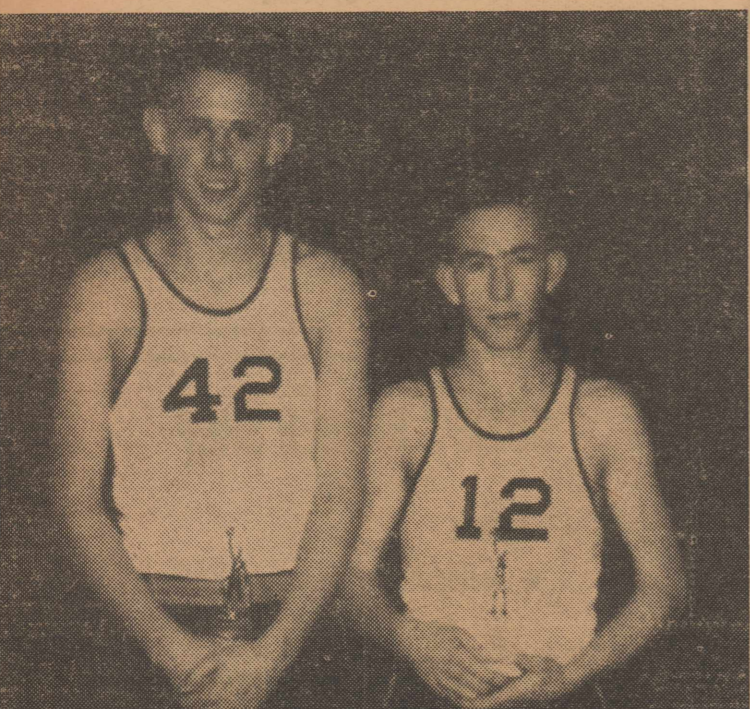
Mrs. Ollie Nall entered the hospital in Lockney Monday for observation.

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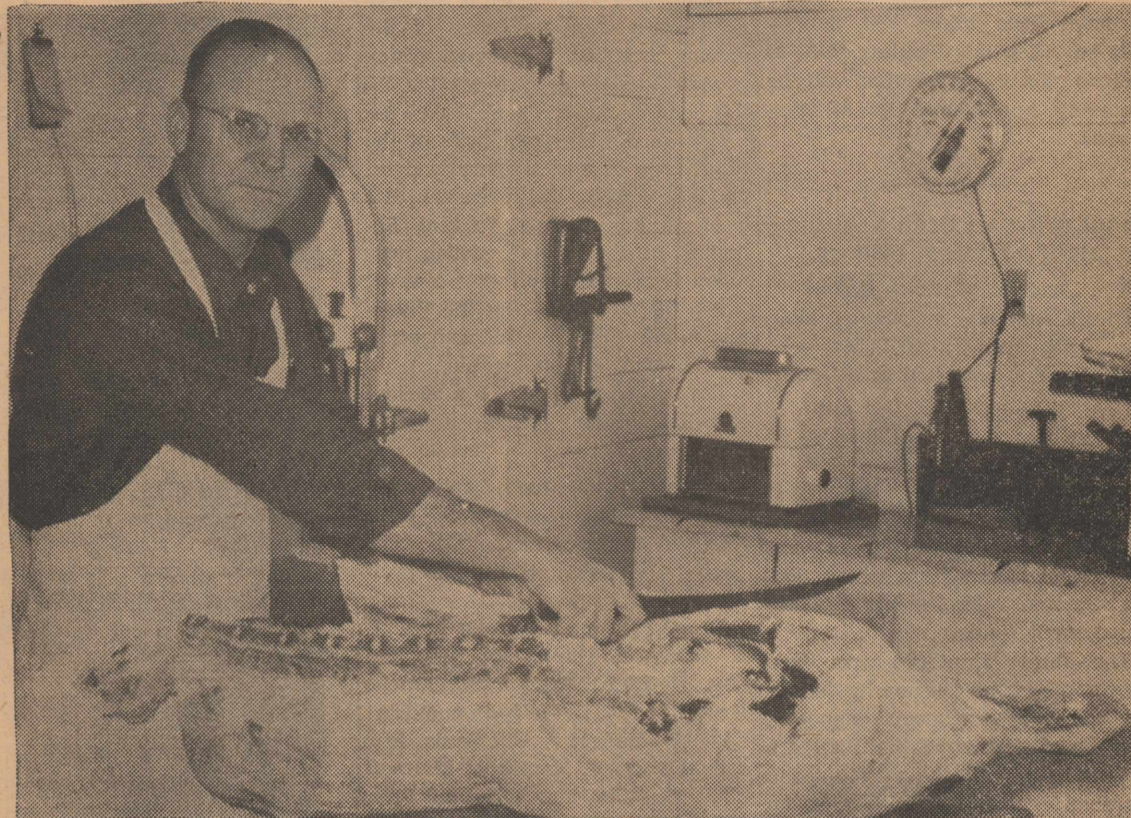

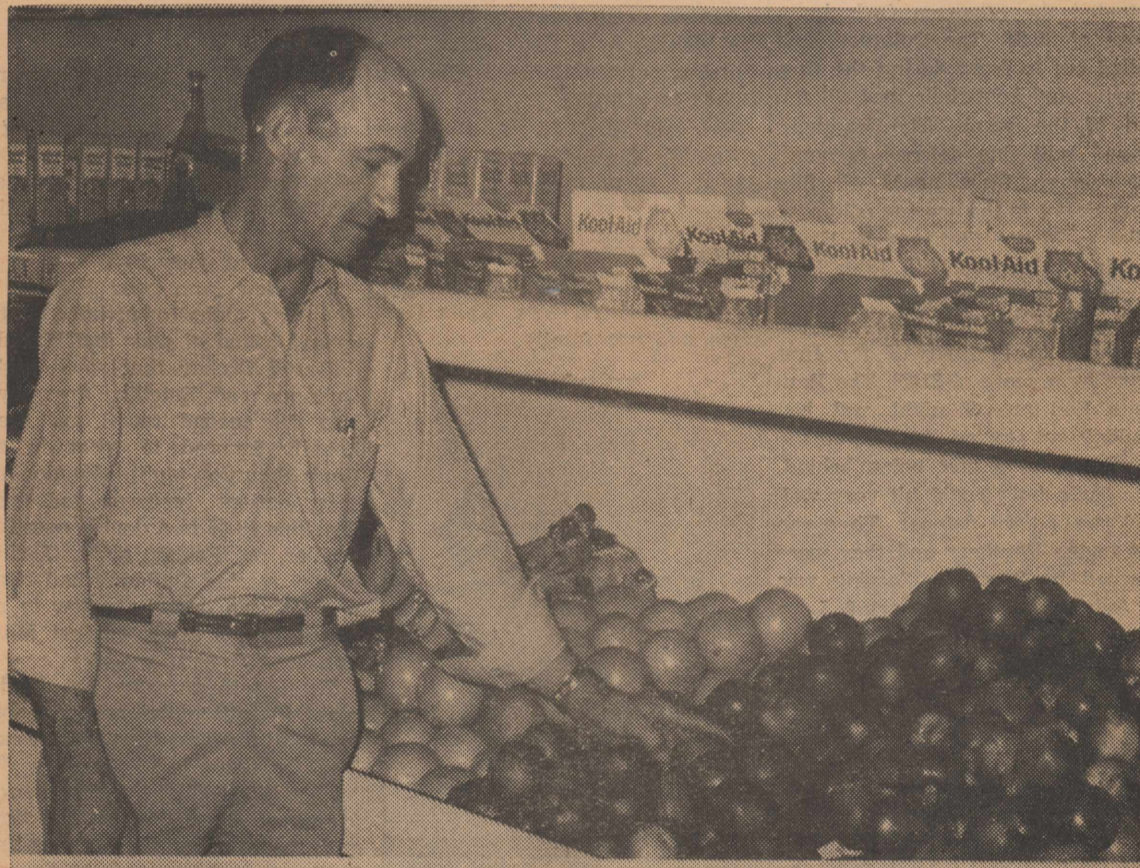

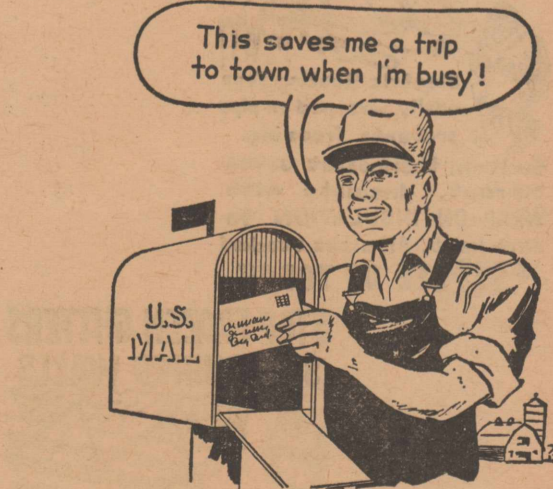
