## District Lions Convention In Progress This Week-end At Shamrock

Over 1,000 Lions will converge on Shamrock on April 18, 19, and 20 for the District 2T-1 Convention of the world's largest service organization. The big district convention will include delegates from over 60 Lions Clubs in the Panhandle area. The entire Panhandle area north of a line extending from Childress to Bovina will send representatives to the meeting. There are over 2600 Lions in 26 counties in District 2T-1. This represents the largest membership of any service club in the area.

The convention will begin on Thursday, April 18, with golf and bowling tournaments and will end on Saturday night with a banquet and ball honoring District Governor Sam Pagan of Shamrock. Two International Directors of Lionsism will appear on various luncheon and banquet programs during the three day meeting. International director Jorge Camunas of San-turce, Puerto Rico, will be the principal speaker for the District Governor's Banquet. Lion Camunas will stop in Shamrock on his return trip from an International Director's meeting in Tokyo, Japan. International Director David Evans of Texas City, Texas, will also appear on the convention program as will Lions State Secretary Tom Kirkham of Austin, Texas.

One of the features of the District meeting will be the coronation of the District Sweetheart to be selected from over 50 beautiful young ladies representing the Lions Clubs of the area. Miss Ruth Ann Guthrie of Pampa is currently serving in this position having been selected at the District Convention in Amarillo last spring. Miss Guthrie will serve as official hostess for this year's participant's in the contest.

**NEWS from the High Plains  
Research Foundation  
COTTON VARIETY TEST**

Thirty varieties of cotton were tested at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1962. The lint yields ranged from a high of 825.88 to a low of 452.82 pounds of lint per acre. The average was 609.5.

Each variety was planted at the rate of 32 pounds per acre with a spacing of 40 inches between rows. Rainfall received from April 1 to October 1 amounted to 19.07 inches. One irrigation of 3.24 inches was made on August 15.

There was no significant difference in yield of the first twelve of the thirty varieties tested. The yields in these 12 varied from 825 to 657. There was little evidence of disease or insect damage in any of the varieties. The 30 varieties were originally planted on April 27, but a severe hail destroyed the

complete test on May 16. All varieties were replanted on May 23 when the soil temperature was 60 degrees F.

The research was conducted by Barry Love and Paul M. Belcher of the Foundation's staff.

**USDA ANNOUNCES FEE  
MICRONAIRE SERVICE FOR 1963**

Micronaire readings on samples of cotton submitted for classification under the Smith-Doxey Program will be available on a fee basis during the 1963-64 season, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. S. C. Rademaker, Director of the Cotton Division, has announced that the fee for this service will be eight cents per sample.

This service provides a measurement of fiber fineness of cotton as determined by air-flow instruments. Fiber fineness is a quality factor important in spinning. Testing for micronaire readings is authorized under the Cotton Testing Service Act.

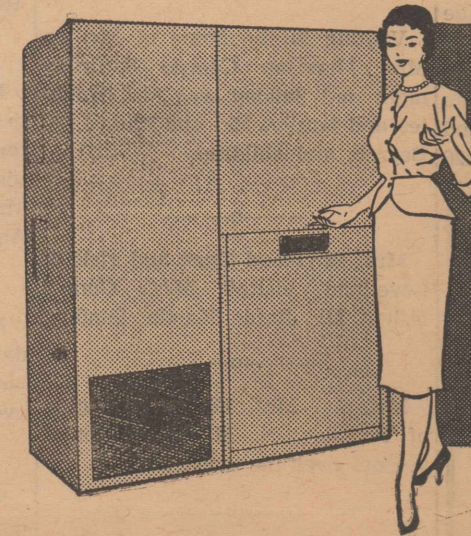
The micronaire reading service was introduced during the latter part of the 1962 season and was used extensively by farmers in West Texas and Oklahoma. Following the introduction of this service, 57 per cent of all cotton classed under the Smith-Doxey program at the Altus, Oklahoma and Memphis

Texas classing offices carried the micronaire readings.

Applications for the testing service for the coming year must be submitted by a ginner to the Agricultural Marketing Service cotton classing office serving the territory in which the gin is located. All samples submitted for classification from a gin that files an application for the micronaire service will be tested. Applications should be submitted as soon as possible but no later than July 1. Several weeks are required to install equipment and train personnel to provide the testing service. Classing offices may not be able to provide testing service to gins submitting applications after July 1 if a shortage of equipment and trained personnel occurs.

The gin that submits application or the service will be responsible for payment of the eight cents per sample test fee. Applications for micronaire readings and additional details of the service may be obtained from any local Cotton Division Classing Office of the Agricultural Marketing Service.
