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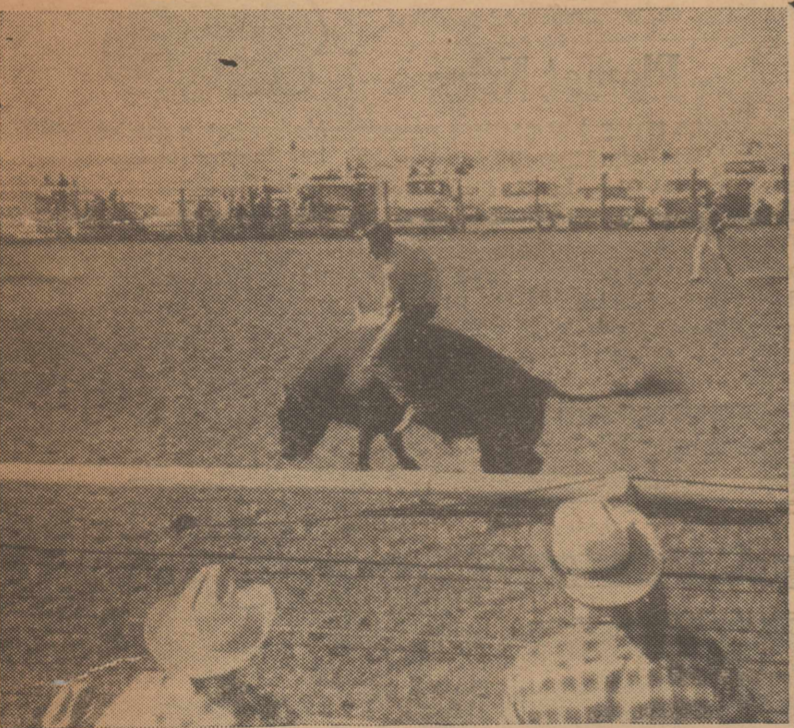
## Rodeo Draws Large Crowds

Funeral services for Grady Lee Jacobs, Sr. were held Thursday, May 2, at 3 P. M. in the First Baptist Church of Quitaque. He was dead at his place of business at about 4:30 P. M. Tuesday, April 30.

### NEXT WEEK IS NATIONAL FAMILY WEEK

The week of May 5 - 13 is known as National Family Week. Why not begin it by attending church this Sunday, together with your family.

A wheat-allotment farmer who has his whole farm in the Soil Bank's Conservation Reserve Program will still be eligible to vote in the May 21 referendum on 1964-crop wheat marketing quotas, Louie Kitchens, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has announced.

The determining factor in such a case, the Chairman explained, is not whether the farm will be producing wheat in 1964. Rather, it is whether (1) the farm has a wheat acreage allotment (preserved under Conservation Reserve Program provisions) and (2) the producer on that farm would have had an interest in the wheat that would have been produced except for the farm's participation in the Conservation Reserve or other similar program such as the Great Plains Program.)

"In other words," Mr. Kitchens said, "the law authorizing the Conservation Reserve Program in effect guaranteed that the farm would not lose any crop-allotment history because of participation in the Reserve Program. So the farm with acreage still covered by the Conservation Reserve contract which had a wheat allotment before it was covered by the contract still has a wheat allotment. And the current wheat legislation says that any producer who has a wheat allotment shall be eligible to vote, except that a producer with an allotment of less than 15 acres will not be eligible to vote unless the farm operator indicates his intention to participate in the wheat program as an allotment grower."

"The operator of a farm which has an allotment of less than 15 acres, therefore, will have to indicate his intention to participate in the 1964 wheat program as an allotment grower if he wants to vote in the May 21 referendum. This may be done by notifying the ASCS County Office by May 13. The allotment notice sent to each farm operator contains a place for indicating such a choice."

## AS CASH CROP FOR THIS AREA GUAR BEING BOOSTED

An effort is being made in this area to locate farmers interested in producing guar, a drought-resistant legume that has been planted to varying degrees in Texas and Oklahoma for several years.

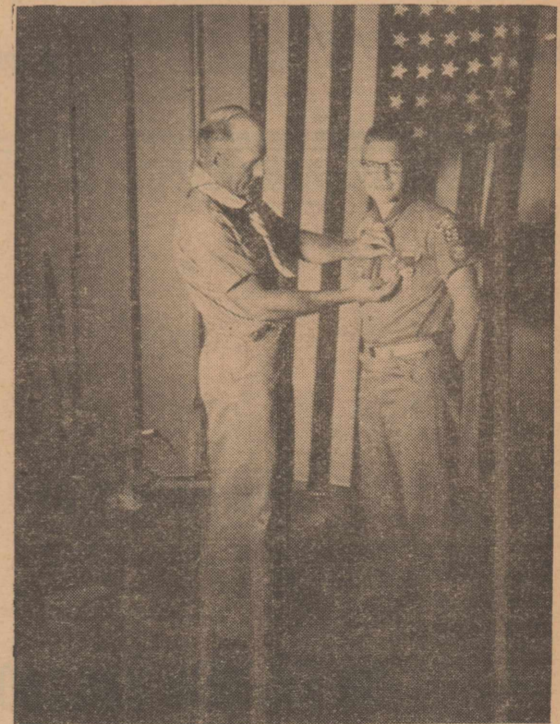
A government ruling that diverted grain acres must be planted to some type of soil improving crop, plus the fact that the General Mills plant in Kenedy is making an effort to get more acres of the crop seem to be the reasons for the unusual interest this year, according to a release from the Soil Conservation Service.

Not only does guar present good earning potential from the sale of the beans, but it is also considered an excellent land improvement crop, according to Virgil Hensen, work-unit conservationist for the Caprock Soil Conservation District.

The new cash crop for guar as a bean producing crop is based on a breakthrough in industrial processing techniques which minimizes the risk of crop damage from exposure to extended fall rains during the harvest season. Bean color is no longer a critical factor in marketing so long as the beans are fully developed and plump.

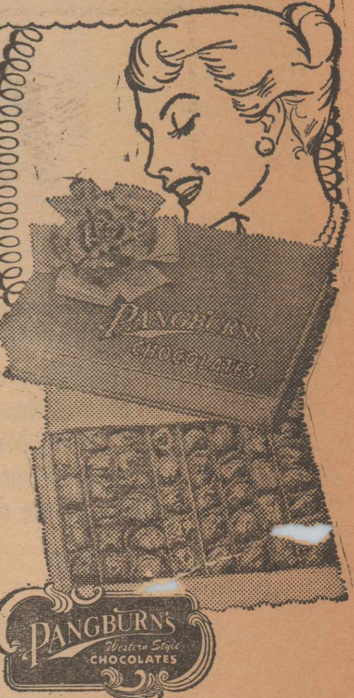

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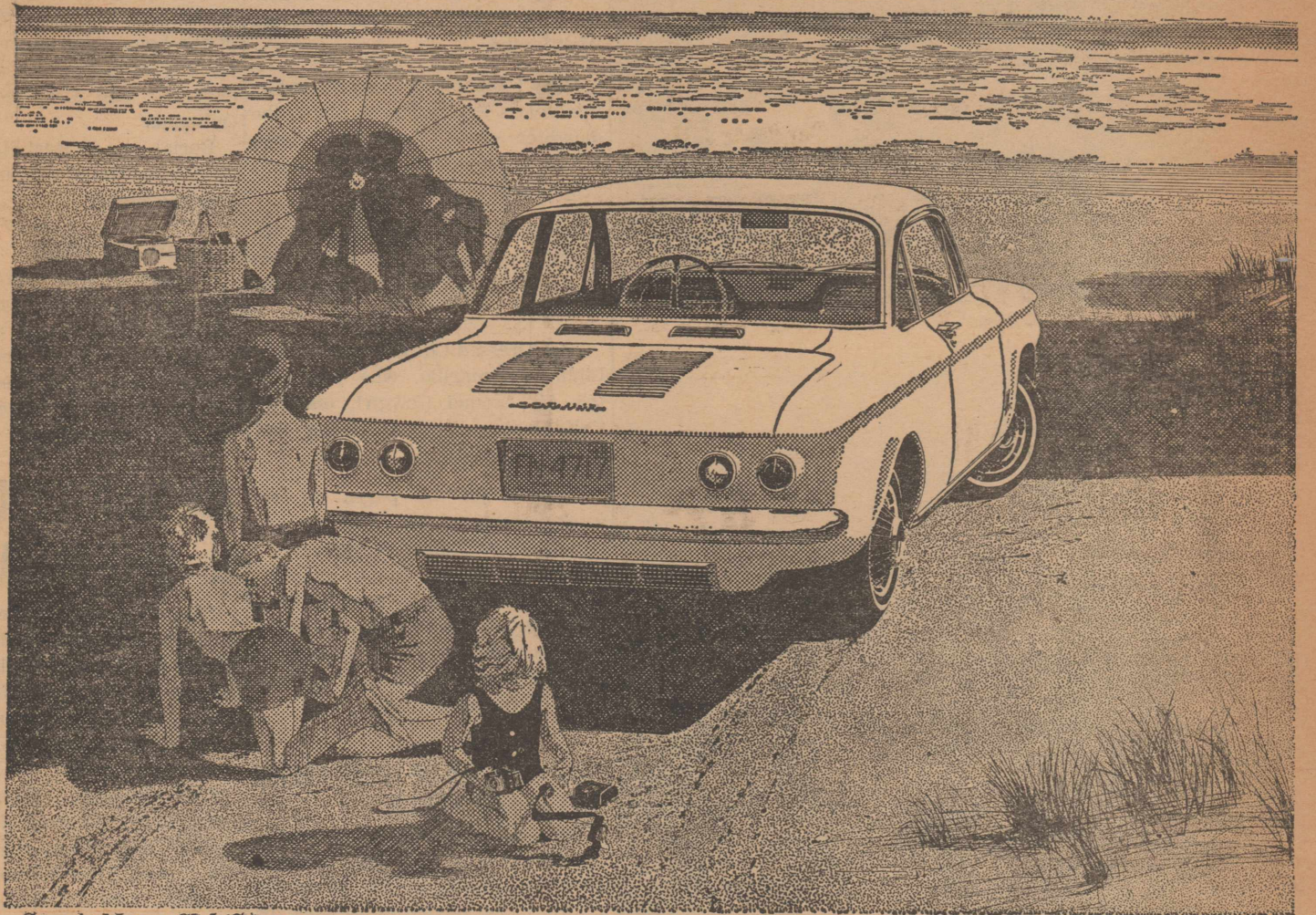

**GUAR BEING BOOSTED**

(Continued From Page One) farmers in the Caprock Soil Conservation District at one time grew guar, but discontinued the crop due to the lower prices paid for the rain-damaged beans.

John W. Stewart, field representative for General Mills' guar plant in Kenedy, Texas has been contacting farmers in the area for the past several days to get them to devote a substantial acreage to guar.

The guar plant at Kenedy was established in 1951 and operates on

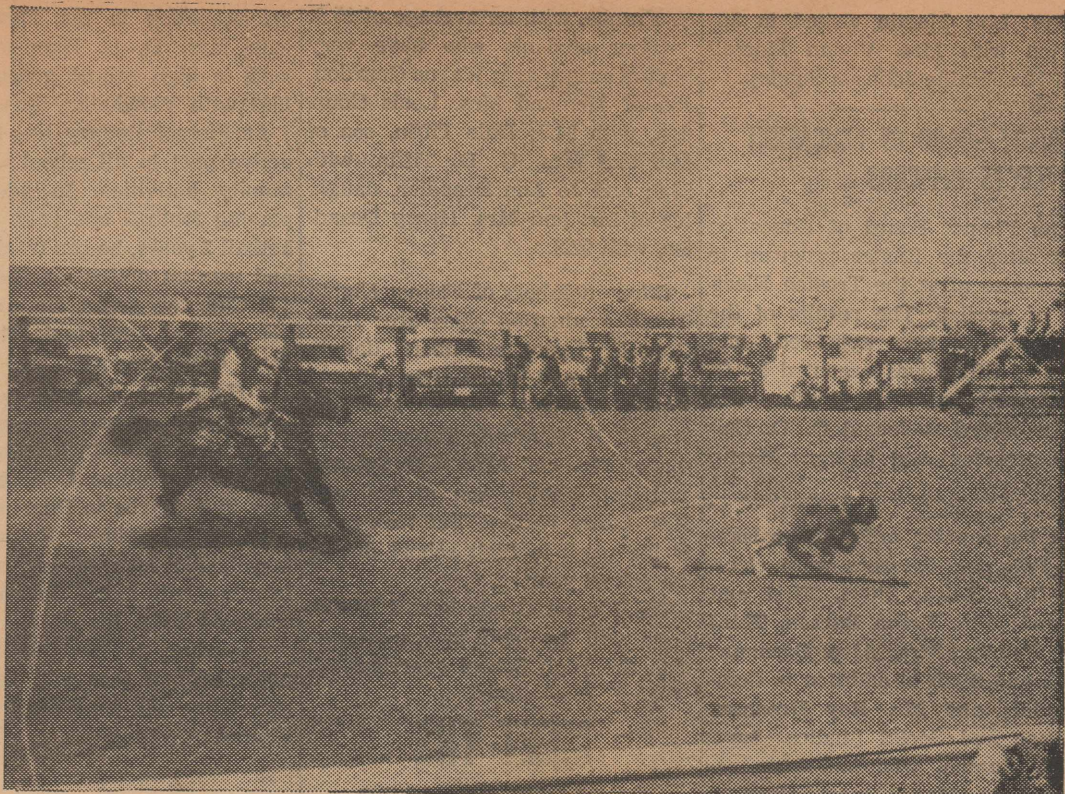
a year-round basis. Not enough of the beans are produced in Texas and Oklahoma so that some are imported each year from Pakistan and India.

The Kenedy plant extracts vegetable gum from the beans. The gum is used in a number of industrial processes such as mining production, petroleum drilling and compounds, manufacture of paper, printing pastes and other specialized uses.

The major product recovery from guar bean processings is a 35 percent protein supplement animal feed widely used by cattle feeders and feed manufacturers in Texas.

Farmers in the area who plant guar, can expect yields of from 400 to 800 pounds per acre. The crop will sell for \$4.00 per hundred, F.O.B. Kenedy, Grade No. 1. Mr. Stewart said that one of the principle reasons guar has failed to produce sufficient beans in this area is because it has been planted too early. It should be planted in late spring.

The guar plant grows to about three to five feet in height and the beans can be harvested with a standard grain combine.
