Cottonwood Group Receives Award

Some 37 persons and organizations, all personally dedicated to the task of saving the soil and other natural resources, received awards and public recognition last Friday night at the Region I Save the Soil and Save Texas Fort Worth Press Awards dinner.

The dinner, which was attended by approximately 125, was held in the Estacado Junior High School cafeteria.

Flip Calhoun, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Hale

County Soil Conservation Dist., who were hosts for the dinner, welcomed the group to Plainview, then turned the program over to Walter Humphrey, editor of the Fort Worth Press, sponsor of the program. He made the awards presentation. It was Humphrey who originated the idea of giving recognition for soil conservation efforts 18 years ago. The plan was originally limited to 13 counties of northeast Texas but after the first year it was made statewide. Over \$200,000 in awards

have been presented since that first year.

The Region I meeting and awards presentation was one of six held in the state this spring. Region I consists of 51 counties in the Panhandle and South Plains.

High point of the program from a local standpoint was the recognition of the Cottonwood Creek group and for their efforts in solving a water problem of many years standing. Walter Graham, in accepting the plaque for the group,

stated that the residents in the Cottonwood Creek area talked together of the problem in that area as long ago as 20 years but nothing was done about it until just a few years ago.

Humphrey said that a problem of the sort that exists in the Cottonwood Creek area is not fully corrected until every resident of the area cooperates with his neighbors.

Briscoe County had the largest delegation present at the dinner. In addition to the Quitaque group, sev-

eral members of the Caprock Soil Conservation District were present along with members of the staff of the SCS office, County Agent and Mrs. Leon Grosdidier and Editor and Mrs. Charles Sarchet of the Briscoe County News.

Fortunately this area did not receive any of the hail and flooding, such as was reported in the Bovina area.

Although the moisture totals were not as much as are needed it is a very fine start and the forecasts say there are good chances for more rain — anyway, things are looking up at least.

Commencement exercises for the Quitaque High School graduating class will be held Friday night in the school auditorium at 8 o'clock. There are twelve members of the Class of '63.

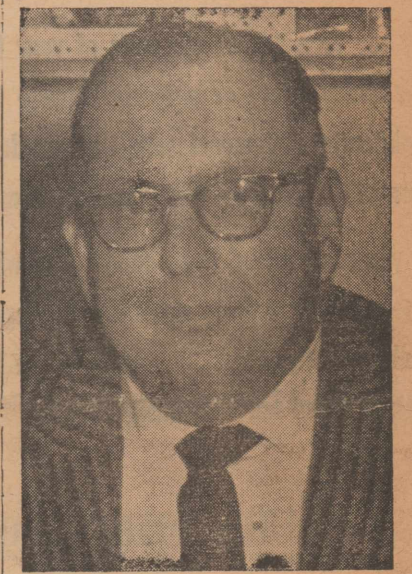

H. M. Baggarly, a very controversial figure, is a graduate of Happy High School, and holds a E. A. and M. A. from West Texas State and has done additional graduate work at the University of

Missouri and at Harvard University. He is an ex-school teacher, having taught in Tulia High School for seven years.

Mr. Baggarly served 3 years in the Navy during World War II as a Lieutenant and was an aide to Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, commander in chief of the Pacific fleet.

He became news editor of the Tulia Herald in 1946 and publisher in 1950. In 1954 H. M. Baggarly won a trip around the world for two in an editorial writing contest. In 1957 his column was judged the best in the nation by the National Editorial Association. Competition was among all weeklies and dailies.

Baggarly appeared on NBC press panel to discuss race issue shortly after Little Rock integration incident. He traveled with Lyndon Johnson during his campaign for the vice presidency.

The Tulia Herald has the largest circulation of any weekly in West Texas and has been called "the most quoted newspaper in the nation." Paid subscribers include the White House, NBC newsroom and Walter Cronkite of CBS and numerous Senators and Congressmen.

H. M. Baggarly has been organist for the Presbyterian Church in Tulia for 13 years.

A Summer Recreation Program For Youth

A supervised summer recreation program for the youth of Quitaque, both boys and girls, is the aim and plans of a group of interested men who have been meeting and talking about such a program for the past several weeks.

Tuesday afternoon of this week the group met in the Community Room of the First National Bank and organized to promote such a program if enough interested boys and girls and parents are available.

Superintendent of Schools Johnny Mason was elected as Chairman of the Board of Directors and O. R. Stark was named as Secretary-Treasurer of the Group.

The group voted to give the undertaking the official title of Youth Recreation Program. The program is aimed primarily at the school age children but there will be activities for the adults as well. Beginning plans call for baseball teams, volleyball, tennis, basket-

ball and swimming classes provided arrangements can be made for the use of a pool with one of the neighboring towns. Supt. Mason has agreed to teach the swimming classes. It might be added right here that this program will be for students of the Quitaque School system only.

A complete day by day program will be worked out for both boys and girls and a supervisor will be appointed have charge of activi-

ties at all times. If the program works out as planned the tennis courts will be lighted for night games. In addition to tennis, the courts can be used for volleyball, shuffleboard and other games.

Basketball can be played in the school gym of course.

This sort of program will need the backing of the town to make it go. There will be a need for several women to work with the

men in the planning of such a program in order to make it work for the girls as well as boys.

There will be a problem of financing too, and the more interested people who will work and support the program in every way, then the lighter it will be on everyone, both physically and financially speaking.

A questionnaire was given the pupils at school along with their

report cards requesting the boys and girls and the parents to indicate whether they are interested in and will support such a program. You are urged to please fill in the questionnaire and leave it or mail it to The Quitaque Tribune. You are earnestly requested to give this your serious consideration.

Don't you believe that a well planned summer program designed to keep your boys and girls busy

with a wholesome, healthy activity that will help them develop in the right ways is worth a little extra of your time and means rather than for them to have to more or less shift for themselves? Think it over.
